Digital Media Classroom



Beginning Monday, August 23rd, the Digital Media Classroom will be open Monday through Friday from 10am to 7pm. This will increase our weekly hours of operation from 30 hours to 45 hours. Plans are in the works to add weekend hours soon.

We've installed industry-standard 3D, video editing, and desktop publishing software over the summer. New titles include: 3ds max, Lightwave, Maya Unlimited, Bryce, Poser, Avid Xpress Pro, Final Draft, MovieMagic, and QuarkXPress.

The Digital Media Classroom (DMC) is a UTA-community resource offering expertise and facilities to assist, support, and promote the use of digital technologies in teaching, learning, and research at UTA. In keeping with this goal, projects pursued in the DMC may be either academic or non-academic in nature.

The DMC is located in the basement (room B29) of the Central Library. No reservation is required in order to use

the DMC, but the computers in the DMC can be reserved in advance. These reservations can be made by contacting DMC staff at (817) 272-1345 or dmc@uta.edu.

The DMC is primarily a self-service learning and multimedia production facility, but staff on duty can provide limited assistance with the available hardware and software. If more in-depth assistance is needed, then a visit to the DMC should be planned to take advantage of scheduled DMC staff expertise. Alternatively, an appointment can be arranged with DMC staff.

This will bring up a form, that you need to complete, telling us what you need delivered from our collections.

Fourth Biennial Virginia Garrett Lectures on the History of Cartography

Friday, October 1, 2004,

Lectures begin at 10 a.m.

The artistry and beauty of maps is the theme of the fourth Biennial Virginia Garrett Lectures on the History of Cartography, entitled "Mapmaker's Vision, Beholder's Eyes: The Art of Maps." Speakers include Dennis Reinhartz (UTA), Patricia Gilmartin (University of South Carolina), Denis Cosgrove (UCLA), Lucia Nuti (University of Pisa), and David Woodward (University of Madison, Wisconsin).

They will explore the many ways in which maps reflect the connection between cartography and art.

In addition to the Garrett Lectures, the Texas Map Society will hold its fall meeting at UTA on Saturday, October 2. Both meetings will be held on the sixth floor of UTA's Central Library. The Garrett Lectures are underwritten, in part, by the Virginia Garrett Cartographic History Endowment. Database Information

American Film Scripts: 1940-1999. Updated regularly. This work in progress provides full text access to film scripts of significant movies and is also a bibliographic and biographical database of directors and writers. This database would be useful for film studies, popular culture, ethnic and gender issues, diversity studies, language and linguistics, writing, American history, anthropology, sociology, and psychology.

Early Encounters in North America: Peoples, Cultures, and the Environment: 1534-1850. Updated regularly. This work in progress documents the relationships among peoples in North America from 1534 to 1850. It focuses on personal accounts of traders, slaves, missionaries, explorers, soldiers, native peoples, and officials. Source materials include narratives, diaries, journals, and letters.

North American Immigrant Letters, Diaries, and Oral Histories: 1940-present. Updated regularly. This work in progress is composed of the personal narratives of immigrants to North America, including Canada. Included are letters, diaries, autobiographies, and oral histories. The primary focus is on the period from 1890 to 1920. It supports research in history, sociology, ethnic and diversity studies, women's studies, labor studies, and literature.

The Aerospace & High Technology Database: 1962-present; full text: 1962-present (some sources). Updated

monthly. Known as the Aerospace Database, the online version of International Aerospace Abstracts. Indexes AIAA meeting papers, journal articles, reports from NASA and other US and international agencies. Covers basic and applied research in aeronautics, astronautics, and space sciences. Also covers technology development and applications in related fields such as chemistry, geosciences, physics, communications, and electronics. Note: To retrieve conference papers, click on "Full-Text" link, then on paper title in new window.

EBSCO now provides "Title History" for renamed journals

In an effort to provide EBSCOhost users with a more comprehensive picture of the database content for particular publications, EBSCO is pleased to announce the availability of a new "Title History" feature in select EBSCOhost databases including Business Source Premier and Academic Search Premier.

The "Title History" refers to when a particular title has experienced one or more name changes over the course of its publication run. For example, *Journal of Economic Literature* was first published in 1963 under the title *Journal of Economic Abstracts*. Five years later (1968), the publication name was altered slightly to its present title, *Journal of Economic Literature*. The Title History section of the Publication Detail screen lists all of the names under which the journal has been published along with the respective dates of coverage for each as available on the database.

From the Publication Detail Screen, a researcher may elect to view the dates of coverage for either one particular variation of the journal name that they are interested in, or the entire run of the publication's history.
