

It will take you approximately 20 minutes to complete the questionnaire and 20 minutes to complete the negotiation task. The pre-negotiation practice session will last 10 minutes. The post-negotiation questionnaire should take 1-2 minutes. You are free to ask questions at any time.

NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS

100 individuals will be participating in this study.

PROCEDURES

Please do not put your name, Maverick ID, or any identifying information on the questionnaires; it is completely anonymous. All your responses are confidential.

If you consent to participate in the study, you will be given a questionnaire packet with various political surveys as well as non-political questions (e.g., demographic information). After completing the questionnaire, you will begin the negotiation task in which you will be negotiating with someone from the opposing political party.
