








EXECUTIVES

He is quite often seen about the campus at College Station and always fits in with any discussion that takes place among the students.






DEAN E. E. DAVIS


LA DOCENA

HOME ECONOMICS CLUB






BULL PEN SOCIETY




become of higher than Corporal rank. However, distinctions which are based on meritorious achievement are applauded nowhere more highly than in the Rear Admirals' Club.

The Tennis Club was organized in 1930 with the purpose of sponsoring a tennis team each season and of offering every now and then some social diversion for the members.







DRAMATIC CLUB


The Dramatic Club, organized in November, 1931, is the only club on the campus which furthers one's interest in the drama.


