

So we wait. Ten minutes for a professor, five minutes for an instructor and 30 seconds for a TA.






Then together — always together everyone gets up to leave. Down the stairs we go, a herd of bodies and books.

When I got ready for bed, I had


to choose between the dog or the guinea pigs, for sleeping companions; so I chose the guinea pigs. Their box on the dresser was five inches from my head.




After that, memorizing the North American geosynclinal cycles in the comparative quiet of the student center snack bar is so simple that it is almost obscene.





Students Resigned To Lineup, Holdup

Registration is one of the biggest hassles of any academic year: hours of waiting in line for closed courses and money spent for books never opened. Nevertheless, thousands of students continue to wade through the mess each semester.

This fall 14,028 enrolled, a net gain of 463 from the previous year. Men outnumber women three to one through the junior year, then the ratio doubles to four to one by the senior year. The average age of all students is 21, but there is a wide variance of ages.

Two 16-year-olds registered this year, while 1,375 students were age 31 plus. Forty-two foreign countries were represented by 596 students, and 310 students came from states other than Texas.

Delaware, Maine, South Dakota and Wyoming were the only states not represented. In Texas, the largest number of students reside in Tarrant County, followed closely by Dallas County. Also, a large number of transfers matriculated from senior colleges such as UT Austin, North Texas State, Texas Tech and Texas Christian.


After orientation, girls were pushed through four sets of parties whereas fraternities held informal parties or smokers during the week.









ABOVE: Mourning the death of Israeli athletes, a special Olympic Moratorium was held in front of the library.

The trail of blood from the Munich massacre left the campus stunned and somber. About 150 students attended a simple ceremony in front of the Library mourning the dead Israli athletes killed by Arab guerillas. The memorial consisted of three brief speeches and a moment of silent prayer.

"We are not here to raise a political question, nor to argue the Arab-Israli dispute," one of the speakers said. "Revenge is a senseless thing and only hampers the quest for peace and understanding."

Revenge just adds loss to loss, drives people further apart and perpetuates this filthy, deadly game of hate." Linus 'Staged'


Peanuts characters came to life on UTA's stage this year with the communication department's production of "You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown."



In addition to displaying articles dramatizing their history and culture, the students perform native skits and dances at various campus functions.















Boobs Big In Art Show


Artists came from colleges throughout the state to show their work, which included mammoth plastic boobs and an oversized pencil.

Artists were given the opportunity to sell their wares, and the university community was exposed to fine arts.








And then over to the bookstore for a little last minute "business."




OPPOSITE, BELOW LEFT: Dr. Robert Amsler checks the mechanics of an umbrella before placing it on the auction block.

Nickel Ice Cream 'Fairly Successful'




Late summer showers and soaring temperatures dampened the success of the first outdoor Organization Fair sponsored by the Student Activities Board.

He went on to say that the organization is more concerned about non-smokers (pot-type) than smokers, "because we want middle Americans to understand."


Beans/Bread Aid Starving






Politicians, Poets, Philanderers

A montage of speakers visited the campus ranging from radical educator Max Rafferty to mild mannered housewife-columnist Erma Bombeck.

Ramsey Muniz, gubernatorial candidate, spoke on his two recurring themes — unity and determination. The La Raza Unida nominee, guest of the Association of Mexican-American Students, came as part of La Raza Unida Week at UTA.

"Raza Unida is not just a party for the 'mexicanos' — we welcome the blacks, the whites, Oriental-Americans, poor, anybody who wants a change," the lawyer said.

Dr. Max Rafferty, controversial educator believes that Progressive Education has produced people who can riot but cannot read, and understand pot but not Plato. He said progressive education has failed to achieve its prime goal the development of self-motivated, responsible adults. This failure is a major reason for the current unrest in the nation's ghettos and campuses.

U.S. Senator Fred Harris of Oklahoma commented that liberals have been treating the symptoms of problems instead of the cause. "So what must liberals do? They see that poor need houses, food, and health care. We give them food stamps and we build houses rather than attack the problem. By giving them money to buy their own houses and their own health insurance."

Clad in a work shirt, blue jeans and tennis shoes, Rod McKuen charmed the Homecoming crowd with his famous raspy voice. Following his readings, concert format included a "Rapping with Rod" session. Never knowing his father, McKuen was born in a Salvation Army hospital. Beginning work at age 11, he received four and onehalf years of formal education and he never had the luxury of an adolescence.

Referring to this childhood, the controversial poet said, "It's not so bad being born a bastard; some people work all their lives to become one."

Appearing on the same ticket were syndicated columnists humorist Erma Bombeck, and Dr. Lindsay Curtis, a medical writer. Mrs. Bombeck covered such subjects as sex, her husband, a sports nut, her sons "Cain and Abel," and her daughter, whom she said " has a sense of humor like Jane Fonda."

"We weren't naive or anything, we had a birth control pill 20 years ago," she said. "We just called it garlic."


Dr. Curtis spoke on "Why Sex?" and said its purpose is "to strengthen the bonds of marriage." "If sex is satisfactory it provides the grease for the machinery of marriage. Too many people have sex on the brain and that's a funny place to have it anyway."

Early in the spring semester, Yale professor Cleanth Brooks used three poems of Thomas Hardy in his explanation of "What a poem can tell us."

"A poem does not tell us all it knows," Brooks said, "It deals with implications and speaks in parables."

Sex came to the campus again during the weekly lectures of author-gynecologist, Dr. Earle Marsh.

"There is no help for someone in deciding what they should do sexually except inside themselves," Dr. Marsh said.

Snow Covered Registration


A rare occurrence, snow fluttered to earth, Jan. 10, to the amazement and delight of students — at least until they had to get to the campus and register.

Due to the severe weather, many students were stranded across the state. Late registration fees were waived, but that seemed little consolation when it took six hours to enroll.


So the snow was unexpected and its timing was off. The fun outweighed the inconvenience.












Afro Week A Tribute To Blackness

Also on the week's agenda were a black fashion show and display in the Minorities Cultural Center of work by area black artists.




BELOW: "Oh No!" wails Dawn Lawrence. "Who forgot to bring the football?"

UTA yell leaders speak loudly and carry the big stick they captured at the '72 National Cheerleading Association Camp in Hattiesburg, Mississippi.


In addition to the coveted spirit stick representing the center of MAV power, the group received one white and three blue ribbons for their achievements during the summer clinic.



Revamping Ends Frustrating Losses

Although expectations were soaring at the beginning of the 1972 football season, all hopes seemed headed for a quick descent my midseason. In fact, it looked as if the Mavericks were in the process of duplicating their record of two seasons ago when they were winless for the year.

But, in one of the most remarkable turnarounds in UTA annals, the Mavs rejuvenated a porous defense and added the missing spark to a faltering offense to win their last five in a row as they finished the year with a 5-6 mark.

Key to the comeback was a 195pound junior named Dexter Bussey. After sitting out the first part of the slate, Bussey gained a starting berth and responded with five 100 yards plus rushing performances. In one contest, the elusive halfback gained 225 yards to set a new school record.

But Bussey wasn't the only sparkplug in the overhauled offensive engine. Quarterback Vic Morriss took the reigns from Bobby Hill and guided the Mavs to second-place in the Southland Conference. Add to Morris and Hill the tough inside running of fullback, Sid Sims and the result was a versatile, wellrounded running attack.

When the passing game was needed, however, ends Jack DeGrenier, Royce West, George Cox and Bill Eden provided capable hands. The front line was manned by guards Danny Parrent and James Dominey, tackles Steve Stone and Alvin Mayeaux and center Larry Donaldson.

And when the Mavs went for a field goal, R. A. Coppedge, the team's leading scorer, came in to do the honors. Sophomore Joe Whitney handled the punting chores.

Providing the roadblocks to the opponents offense were ends Ted Williams and Sam Beavers, tackles Warren Johnson and Arthur Paxton, linebackers Hiram Burleson, John Brown, Randy Yates and Glenn Byrd, cornerbacks Ernest Baptist, and Preston Clemons and safties Eugene Ayers and Ed Favors.

Of the two starting units, only six regulars were lost to graduation which should mean the beginning of a winning tradition at UTA next year.



Opener Starts Losing Skein

At Southern Mississippi for their first gridiron encounter, the Mavs found that the Southerners' hospitality wasn't especially to their liking. In fact, they were treated to a rude 38-17 defeat, which was to be the first of six consecutive losses.

During the tilt with the Southerners, UTA gave away three fumbles and four interceptions as Coach John Symank tired each of his three transfer quarterbacks in the quest for a productive field general.


Offensively, the bright spot for the Mavs was the punting of Joe Whitney and the place kicking of R. Á. Coppedge, who split the uprights from 37 yards out in the losing effort.


Touchdowns came on a second period two-yard blast by halfback Dexter Bussey and a 16-yard pass from Bobby Hill to Jack DeGrenier in the final stanza with 58 seconds left. Coppedge kicked the PATs.


In its second game, UTA played Oklahoma State but was surprised to learn that the Cowboys had replaced their boots with track shoes. The Stillwater crew rushed for a whopping 580 yards in a 21-3 victory over the Mavs.

'Poke quarterback Brent Black did most of the damage with 173 yards on 12 carries and one TD. He was joined by halfbacks Fountain Smith and George Palmer who rushed for 121 and 99 yards, respectively.

Coppedge booted a 38-yarder for UTA's only score.





Rockets Hop Frogs Blast Past Mavs

Thinking the third time might be the charm, UTA entered the Toledo contest with new confidence. For 25 minutes the adage looked as if it might come true as the Mavs built a 17-0 lead behind a sparkling performance by the specialty teams and the offense before finally falling 38-24.

Although they gathered only 168 yards on offense, the Mavs tagged on another 235 in returns, highlighted by a 67-yard punt return by Rodney Hinton. UTA even produced some tallies through the air on a Bobby Hill pass to Felley Donaldson from 13 yards out. The other UTA scores came on a one-yard bootleg by Hill and 30-yard field goal by R. A. Coppedge who also kicked the extra points.

But the Rockets launched their offense in the second half and, behind tailback Joe Schwartz's 188 yards rushing, managed to overcome the Mavs.

In the "County Championship" with the TCU Frogs, UTA gave the Southwest Conference squad the scare of their life as the Arlington crew jumped into the lead in the early moments of the tilt, which was the first time that feat had been accomplished by the Mavs since the series began. But the Frogs put warts on UTA's hopes as they padded their slight 16-14 halftime lead with a second-half outburst to take a 38-14 decision.

Hill was UTA's highlight, hitting two touchdown passes of 46 and 39 yards. Highsmith and Donaldson were on the receiving end of the scores.




CENTER: What the game of football all boils down to is a little simple planning, as illustrated by the elementary patterns on the blackboard.

Staunch Defenses Stop Mavs

In their fifth loss of the season, UTA went out in style, throwing a record-setting nine interceptions as the Louisiana Tech Bulldogs proved their number two ranking in the NCAA college division was no fluke.

It was the first Southland Conference tilt for the Mavs but Tech had already played most of its conference foes early in the season and clinched the crown with a 35-14 victory over the Mavs.

Defensive backs John Causey and Larry Griffin did most of the damage to UTA as they picked off the stolen air mail deliveries. The Mark was two short of an all-time NCAA record but was enough to set a SLC mark.


Jack DeGrenier was the highlight for the Texans as he scored both TD's, one on a 14-yard pass from Craig Holland and the other on a three-yard run. R. A. Coppedge kicked both extra points. After five straight defeats the Mavs finally found an opponent who was also winless as they traveled to New Mexico State. But UTA was denied their first victory as the Aggies slipped by 17-12.

Despite two century-mark performances in rushing by Sid Sims and Dexter Bussey, Aggie middle linebacker Tom Minzak & Co. continually thwarted UTA's drive to paydirt.

The only times the Mavs did manage to cross the magic marker were on a 77-yard drive engineered by Bobby Hill that culminated in a two-yard scoring run by Sims, and on a one-yard ramble by Scott Highsmith.

But UTA had one last chance with 3:35 remaining as they got all the way to the NMSU 36 before relief quarterback Vic Morriss fumbled.

The contest ended in a free-for-all as the Aggies ran out the clock.



Win Spurs Mav Spirit

The start of the greatest turnaround in UTA annals came with the home contest against Southwest Louisiana. After six consecutive losses alterations were made in the lineup and a new spirit was born.

A defense that had looked like a permeable membrane in previous contests finally solidified and the offense, although they scored only once, began to become a cohesive unit.

The result was a 7-0 victory that gave the Mavs their inital baptism in the win column. And fittingly, it was a cornerback named Ernest Baptist that helped shut out the Ragin' Cajuns.


Not only did Baptist break up two passes in the end zone, but he also set UTA's only score on an interception. And when USL had a fourth and goal it was none other than Baptist and linebacker Hiram Burleson who stopped the threat that could have meant a tie ball game.

The Mavs score came early in the contest as quarterback Vic Morriss used a key interception to start a 47-yard drive. The sophomore quarterback immediately set the drive in motion with a 15 yard toss to Royce West, who made a leaping catch on the sidelines.


Sid Sims, Jack DeGrenier and Dexter Bussey then ate up the yardage through the middle. Bussey capped the drive with a tackle-breaking six-yard scamper around right end for the TD. Reserve tackle Gil Haro did the honors on the PAT.

After that it was all defense for both teams. The next Cajun threat came with two minutes left as USL got possession of the ball at the UTA 29.

On first down USL quarterback Mark Speyrer tried to hit Lafayette Mitchell on a safety valve but another interception, this time by linebacker Randy Yates, put the game out of reach as the Mavs went on to chalk up their first victory.






Mavs Find Winning Habit

UTA finally found a habit they didn't want to get rid of as they extended their win streak to two in a row with a 36-22 victory over Abilene Christian.

During the contest two records were set by Mav gridders.

R. A. Coppedge broke a conference record by kicking five field goals, plus booting three point-



afters to account for 18 of the Mavs' total.

A UTA school record was broken by Dexter Bussey in rushing as he carried for 225 yards. Bussey's chunk of real estate bettered a mark set in 1967 by Danny Griffin. It was also the third best in SLC history.

But the main thing about the win was that the Mavs finally found the scoring touch as they hit paydirt on eight of 12 possessions under the leadership of quarterback Morriss. The sophomore transfer from TCU was also the game's second leading rusher with 96 yards on 24 carries.

Another factor in the win was the Mavs rejuvenated defense. Although the closeness of the score didn't indicate it, the contest wasn't really in doubt as the Arlington squad held the Wildcats in check most of the game while the Mavs built up a 27-0 lead before ACC scored.

Leading the defensive was linebacker Hiram Burleson who received assistance from John Brown, Eugene Ayers, Warren Johnson and the rest of the regulars.


The stars were Ernest Baptist (two pass interceptions), linebacker John Brown (20 tackles) and freshman safety Eugene Ayers (nine tackles, a blocked field goal and a fumble recovery).

But the unsung heroes were on the offensive line. Tackle Alvin Mayeaux, guard Danny Parrent and center Larry Donaldson blasted giant holes in the defensive line that enabled halfback Dexter Bussey to go over the 100-yard mark for the third time in the season.

Scoring duties were handled by Bussey and R. A. Coppedge. Bussey ran for two TDs on runs of nine and 23 yards while Coppedge kicked both PATs and two field goals of 38 and 42 yards.

The WTSU score came with 5:22 left in the contest on a five-yard run by Mike Wartes. Arcadio Rivera kicked the Buffalos' point-after.






TOP: Bussey runs a gauntlet during the contest with the Cardinals, which the Mavs won by a slim 10-3 margin.

UTA Defense Cages Cards

Defense again came into the spotlight during the Lamar tilt as linebacker Hiram Burleson led the Mav assault with 19 tackles in a 10-3 victory.

Although the field conditions were sloppy, Mav defenders found the weather excellent for digging trenches. And dig they did. The Cardinals were held to 188 yards total offense while having two passes picked off and two fumbles recovered, plus winding up with a minus six yards in returns.

Two freshmen backed Burleson in the trenches. Eugene Ayers led the youth corps with 10 tackles while Ed Favors snared both of Lamar's interceptions. Joining the three in heroics were Randy Yates and Ernest Baptist with three pass deflections between them and Ted Williams who recovered a loose Cardinal ball.

It was Dexter Bussey who again provided the score. Finishing with 114 yards rushing for the night, Bussey also got UTA's only TD on a one-yard burst in the first period. R. A. Coppedge was true on the PAT and added a 22-yard three-pointer for insurance in the fourth quarter.

Lamar's field goal came on a 29yarder by Jabo Leonard in the third quarter.

Season Finale Pleases Team

The finale of UTA's season might have marked the end for the six starting seniors on offense and defense, but it culminated on a sweet note as the Mavs won a 7-6 squeaker over Arkansas State to take second place in the Southland Conference.

Fullback Sid Sims closed out his career with 112 yards rushing against the Indians while another senior, Jack DeGrenier, bid farewell after catching 13 receptions for 183 yards during the year.

On defense, and Sam Beavers, linebacker Randy Yates and cornerbacks Ernest Baptist and Preston Clemons played their last down as UTA gridders.

But the final season was more than worthwhile as the Mavs finished in style.

Dexter Bussey again went over the century mark and scored UTA's only TD on a five yard run in the first quarter. He sat out the second half due to an injury but his tally, and R. A. Coppedge's point-after, provided the needed margin.

The Mavs had their worst scare in the waning moments of the final period as Kearney Blalack dashed for a 27 yard score with 47 seconds left.

But the Indians weren't satisfied with a tie and went for two points on a conversion attempt by ASU's Stan Winfrey. Linebacker Hiram Burleson, with help from tackle Warren Johnson and end Ted Williams, stopped Winfrey a yard short to preserve the victory.

Considering the fact that the Mavs opened the slate with six consecutive losses, five straight victories weren't bad. With the string placing second in the conference, it has to be considered a winning year.



Basketball — 1972-73

Though expectations were soaring before the season, what followed in the first five games definitely wasn't anticipated. Opening against Oklahoma City, the young Mavs learned the worth of having four returning starters as the more-experienced Cowboys squeaked by 82-81.

In UTA's second contest at College Station, Coach Barry Dowd's troops proved they could hang in there as they had to overcome a first-half 15-point deficit to stay in the game with Texas A&M. UTA rallied to 77-all with less than four minutes remaining.

Then the bigger and more experi-

enced Aggies ran up eight straight points and were never in trouble again.

After the first two opening defeats, Northwest Louisiana paid a visit to Texas Hall and was served a helping of what UTA had been experiencing on the road, dropping an 82-81 loss to the Mavs.

Hoping to pull up to the breakeven mark, UTA played its fourth tilt at West Texas State. Another close contest went to the opposition as the Aggies won by five, 85-80.

The Mavs then met Southwestern and staged a second-half surge to take a 92-84 win.





UTA evened its won-loss record Dec. 23, surprising a tough Hardin-Simmons club 81-76 in overtime.

Perry Littleton and Larry Moore continued to lead the squad, both from the floor and under the boards, while Ronnie Marsh, Louis Marshall and freshman Rickey Hughes gave solid performances.

But it was following the Hardin-Simmons encounter that UTA began to skid, dropping its next six contests, all on the road. Average Mav scoring reflected the win drought before the slump, 83.3; after, 67.3.

Georgia Southern led the parade as they lashed the Mavs 73-69. South Alabama followed suit with a 73-67 triumph. Southwestern, which the Mavs beat by eight in their first gettogether, added insult to injury with a lopsided 84-66 victory. The next

defeat was the one that hurt most, as UTA lost its conference opener to McNeese 89-76.

The 76-point showing was virtually a three-man show as Marsh hit for 26, Moore 22 and Hughes 14. The Mavs were outrebounded 43-34 and took only six free throws to the Cowboys' 22.



Still Down, Coming Out

The Mavs who recorded No. 5 loss in a row barely resembled the sometimes-ragged squad of recent weeks past.

Although they lost their second Southland Conference encounter, a 79-73 decision to Southwestern Louisiana, thereby losing five verdicts in a row, the Mavs were playing competitive basketball.

If they were awed by USL's No. 13 national ranking, they didn't play like it as they took a 38-30 halftime lead to the dressing room, Dwight Lamar, the defending national scoring champion, was limited to only nine points in the initial period.

Ronnie Marsh, who finished with 25, and Larry Moore were instrumental in the showing, as Marsh provided great outside shooting while Moore handled the inside.

The next scrap was an SLC contest against Lamar University and all it did for the Mavs was drop them a little lower in the standings. They lost 87-81.

Centenary was next and the losing streak of six was broken as UTA thumped the Gentlemen in a 74-72 overtime victory. The Gents' 7-foot freshman, Robert Parish, had been averaging 24 points and 19 rebounds per contest. He was limited to 16 points and nine grabs by the defensive efforts of Larry Moore.

McNeese followed and the Mavs were ready. Playing on their home court for the second game in a row, they knocked off the visitors 80-77.


The difference came at the foul stripe. Even though McNeese outscored from the field, making 38 goals to the Mav's 36, the visitors sank only one from the free throw line.


Ronnie Marsh led the attack with 23 while Moore looped in 20.

Tech's highly touted Mike Green was the main spark plug in the Dogs' engine, hitting 11 of 19 shots from the field and finishing with 25 points and 12 rebounds.

Ronnie Marsh led the Mav attack with 22 points while Larry Moore finished the night with 15.

The next contest with Arkansas State definitely wasn't for the purist. Neither team could muster an attack, but UTA somehow managed a 62-60 win. Artistic or not, it did move the Mavs one notch higher in the conference with a 3-4 record. The season slate went to 7-11.


Wayne Warren, who had seen


Teamwise UTA also had a hot night, shooting 57.3 per cent from the field.


LEFT: Ronnie Marsh gets a firsthand demonstration of the old adage "what goes up, must come down" during a contest at Texas Hall.

First, Last; Road A Jinx

West Texas was the next visitor to Texas Hall, and the Mavs avenged their loss at Canyon, handing the Buffaloes an 87-85 double overtime loss.

The game wasn't an artistic success as the Mavs committed 18 turnovers to West Texas' 24.

In the first overtime West Texas owned a two point lead with seconds remaining, but Rickey Hughes hit a 25 foot jump shot to knot the score at 74, and send the game into a second overtime.

Hughes led the Mavs in scoring with 20 points, scoring 16 in the second and two overtime periods.

Abilene Christian made the mistake of coming to Arlington for UTA's final home game. The Mavs put on their finest offense show of the season, crushing the Wildcats 106-72.

UTA led by only four at half-time, but ran away from ACC in the second period, pouring in 57 points.

The Mavs got balanced scoring from four starters. Ronnie Marsh led the attack with 20 points, followed by Littleton with 19, Moore with 18 and Hughes with 18. Moore led the Mavs with 12 rebounds, while Marsh grabbed 11.

The Mavs' final three games were on the road, against Oklahoma City, Arkansas State, and Louisiana Tech.

Oklahoma City again edged the Mavs by one point, 84-83 as the Chiefs' high scoring duo of Ozzie Edwards and Marvin Rich combined for 71 points and 18 rebounds.

The Chiefs led by as many as 13 points in the first half before the Mavs closed to within ten at half-time.

In the second half the Mavs stormed back behind the shooting of Ronnie Marsh and led 59-57 with 13:08 remaining.

UTA grabbed the lead once more, 79-76 before Rich and Edwards each scored a basket in the final minute giving the Chiefs an 84-81 lead. Marsh hit a jumper to bring the Mavs within one and after OCU missed in a one and one situation, Marsh missed a jumper at the buzzer.

Marsh led the Mavs with 31 points and Littleton and Moore chipped in 15 and 14 respectively.

Hughes, who had 20 and 18 points in the two previous games, was held to three against the Chiefs.




Louis Marshall and Marsh paced the come from behind effort. Marshall scored a career high 18 points and Marsh added 16, 12 in the second half.


The game marked the final appearance for seniors Moore, Bell Barnett, John Gilligan and Marshall.


Lady Jocks Go Courting




RIGHT: Coach Ed Bellion issues a stern order during a UTA victory. Bellion directed the Mavs to an undefeated regular season and a playoff berth.

UT Austin, nationally third-ranked University of Tennessee and Southwest Conference champion SMU marked 1972-73, Doug Russell's third year as head swim coach.

Going into the season, Russell had a dual meet record of 16-6.


After an opening loss to UT Austin, the Mavs reeled off six straight wins, defeating LSU, TCU twice, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State and Houston. In preparing for the NCAA meet, the Mavs closed the season by crushing Texas A&M before falling to Tennessee and SMU. The Mavs finished the season with a 7-3 dual meet mark.

Several Mav swimmers fared well at the NCAA meet March 22-24.


Bill Miller, a freshman from Santa Ana, Calif., is Russell's first recruit with a national reputation. This season Miller was ranked fourth nationally in the 1,000-yard freestyle, fourth in the 100 free, second in the 200 free and first in the 500 free.

Miller was one of six freshmen on the team, along with Steve Batchelor, Tom Lea, David Perkins, Mike Staten and Tim Kreiner. Eight sophomores, one junior and three seniors rounded out the squad.

The sophomores were Rick Dunham, Mike Gross, Paul Haines, Robert Kelsoe, Doug Pitts, Robbie Smith, David Spencer and Bruce Walls. Charles Spencer was the lone junior while Liam Ball (a member of Ireland's Olympic team in '68 and '72), Randy Tucker and Bruce Weaver were in their senior year.







Intramurals Not A Drag

Under the guidance of director Jim Garrett, intramurals continue to grow at UTA.

Plans are in the works for a new IM building, and several new sports were added during the year.

Co-Recreational sports, such as tennis, volleyball, bowling and softball, were introduced and women's sports also were popular.

After an absence of seven years, individual sports returned to the 'murals program, among them basketball free throws, a fishing tournament, a turkey trot (cross-country race) and bicycle racing.

Drag racing was again a success, with UTA still the only university in the nation to offer the sport as a 'murals activity. Garrett plans to hold regional and national championships in the future.

Record numbers of teams entered the various sports, including 46 flag football and 88 volleyball squads. The Phi Delts captured the football crown, while the Iran Club won the volleyball championship for the second straight year.

Twenty-one men's teams entered the bowling competition and 10 women's groups rolled for honors. Phi Delta Theta won the male crown and PEMM Packers the female.


Basketball was the first sport slated for the spring semester and 65 teams participated, with the independent Toads and Phi Delts waging a fight for university honors.


















Dr. Harrison Returns To First Love

Before the ink was dry on the new faculty directory, rumors drifted across campus that President Frank Harrison had been offered the top post at the UT Health Center in San Antonio Medical School.

Within a month official announcements from Austin confirmed that Dr. Harrison had accepted the newly created position. Later announcements precipitated more moves: Vice President Bob Price began packing for San Antonio and Vice President Wendell Nedderman was named acting president at UTA while a search committee interviewed candidates for president.


Dudley Wetsel of the UT Dental School in Houston was appointed to fill Price's post as vice president of fiscal affairs. Wetsel's appointment is permanent.

To keep the administrative directory complicated, Graduate Dean W. A. Baker is acting vice president of academic affairs and maintains an office on both the second and third floors of Davis Hall since no replacement has been named for him.

A chamber of commerce dinner and a faculty reception honored Dr. Harrison at the conclusion of the fall semester and of his seven-year tenure at UTA.

As president, Dr. Harrison, who holds both a Ph.D. and M.D., encouraged expansion of the Graduate School and development of health related programs. He made drastic improvements in the Health Center and performed "major surgery" on the football program.

In an attempt to open lines of communication with the student body, he organized the President's Advisory Committee, a group of student leaders who meet regularly with top administrators to discuss current campus problems.





Nedderman Takes Reins

If Dr. Frank Harrison holds the record for having been the smallest UTA president, his predecessor is undoubtedly the tallest. At 6' 4" Acting President Wendell Nedderman towers over most of the faculty and some of the basketball players.

Although the two men have worked closely together for the last seven years, it's too soon to compare Nedderman's style of leadership with Harrison's. Nedderman is quick to point out that the university will not be kept in a holding pattern while a search is made for a permanent president. He hopes to continue developing programs related to urban problems.

Having served as dean of engineering and academic vice president, he is familiar with UTA problems and procedures. A 13-year resident of Arlington, he also has close ties with local civic leaders and professional societies. He would like to see the university and the community work together on projects of mutual benefit.

He believes that the sole purpose

of administrators, staff and faculty is to help the student.

Having joined the faculty in 1959 as the university's first dean of engineering, he helped expand the engineering school to one of the 20 largest in the nation.

Reared in Iowa, he earned his B.A. and Ph.D. degrees in civil engineering at Iowa State University. He also received a master's degree from Texas A&M where he taught ten years before coming to UTA.

He views the changes here since his arrival as "fantastic." In 1959, the only new building was the engineering building, he said, which was really a "concrete reinforcement built around four original buildings."

Two of his four sons are enrolled in college, one of them a graduate student at UTA.

After office hours, Nedderman is serving as an assistant to son Howard in a research project involving construction. His duties include mixing concrete and cleaning the lab.





Concentrating this year on law and order, the UT System opened its own police academy in Austin where police officers are trained for the 17 component institutions.


The UT Board of Regents includes an ex-ambassador as well as a former first lady.

Architecture

Demonstrating their skills as master designers, the architect faculty transformed a plain vanilla elementary school building into striking headquarters for their instruction.

Vibrant interior colors help establish the tone for the program which has mushroomed into the second largest in the state with an enrollment of approximately 600.

The faculty is reinforced with adjunct professors who are practicing architects in the Metroplex area.


The department emphasizes ecological needs in urban planning. Under sponsorship of an HEW grant, they initiated an environmental awareness course taught on the beginning level with students partticipating from other fields of study.




















Art





With exhibitions throughout the year, the art department hopes to expose the student body to more than a few paintings.

For a time, the gallery of the art building was wrapped in plain brown paper in a tunnel-like structure, enabling students to crawl through with pencils, crayolas, etc.

"We had hoped by this gallery wrapping to draw students out of themselves putting them in a situation, hopefully to produce a creative response to a strange environment," said William Turner, acting chairman.

A new course in color enables the

student to broaden his familiarity with the various departments and the different processes of art. Taught by five different teachers, the course is planned to develop and expand the concepts of design and color.

Demonstrations given by the physics class helped illustrate the effects of light on various materials by the use of refractors.

Research in the department consists of creative output. "The diehards are in ceramics — up at the art building every night," said Turner.

Communications





With a new \$8.1 million Fine Arts Complex in progress, the communication department is expanding its curriculum and its faculty. Beginning this year, the department can confer degrees in speech, drama and journalism.

Courses are available in radio and television with lab facilities at Cooper Center.

Four productions gave drama students professional experience and the university community lively entertainment. For the second year, Mary Lou Hoyle staged productions during the noon hour in the student center. Audience response justified the effort and proved that commuters like drama when they are exposed.

Expansion of journalism from a minor to a major attracted enough working journalists to fill a night class each semester. Theory and reality collided in class discussions and in the publication of the campus newspaper, two magazines and yearbook.

A \$5,000 gift from a Dallas businessman financed basic equipment for an instructional darkroom for photojournalism, a new course offered for the first time this spring.

Richard Slaughter, who retired in December after 36 years in UTA theater, was named professor emeritus by the university faculty.

Education

Teaching teachers to teach is an arduous, complicated procedure.

With the Texas Education Agency establishing guidelines for certification, the university education department is constantly correlating local programs with state purposes and philosophy.

The sweeping changes scheduled by TEA for completion by 1977 are requiring major revisions by many major departments, most of whom are less than excited by curriculum directives from Austin.

Teaching certificates may be earned in 12 fields at UTA.

Students are admitted to the program by special approval of the education department and the department of their major field.


When both departments judge


the student competent, he is permitted to register for practice teaching. For most people, this means a different wardrobe style since most public schools have fairly rigid dress codes for faculty members.

After a period of observing, the student teacher is charged with full responsibility for several classes. Faculty members from the university work with public school instructors to improve the quality of teaching.


The apprentice teachers return to the campus for the final weeks of their course to discuss and evaluate their experiences. No one is certified until he has succeeded as a practice teacher.


In reality, students assigned to the practice teacher have the final vote although no formal ballots are cast.

English

The largest department on campus and one of the oldest, the English department offers degrees options in classics, linguistics and comparative literature in addition to the basic plans.

Three members of the department — Professors Emory Estes, Stanton Garner and Noel Polk — are working on the definitive edition of the works of Harold Frederic. The first of the 15-volume series is expected to be printed by the TCU Press next year, each volume being edited by a different American literature specialist.

Dr. James Merriweather, textual bibliographer and William Faulkner critic from the University of South Carolina, spent two days on campus inspecting textual bibliographic procedures for the Frederic edition, the only approved project for the Southwest region sponsored by the Modern Language Association Center for Editions of American Authors.

The department publishes three literary journals: American Literary Realism, edited by Dr. Clayton Eichelberger; The Arlington Quarterly, edited by Professor Maurice Carlson, and World Literature Written in English edited by Dr. Robert McDowell. A number of graduate students and faculty members work with the three publications, all of which have an international circulation.


In addition to departmental publications and faculty research the department is working to streamline basic courses. Beginning next year, freshman English students may choose one of several themes to explore in an introductory course emphasizing thinking and writing.

All English majors have a faculty counselor to assist them with academic planning and problems. Dr. A. V. Goyne coordinates the counseling program.

Each year the department sponsors guest appearances of noted writers and critics. Recent speakers were Dr. Cleanth Brooks, Dr. J. Millgate and Allen Tate.

Foreign Languages

The new approach to foreign languages provides for individual interests. In addition the intensive courses enable students to concentrate on the language.


Fifteen students are enrolled in the intensive course. Begun this year is a "Mini Intensive" course giving the student more freedom to take other courses.

A "tracking system" of languages, which involves the study of a language within a student's major is being instituted. Engineer students would take a different section than would an English major and they would both learn different aspects of the language that pertained to their field. This allows the student to become more involved and more interested since he is working with material that is of direct significance to him.

Summer language programs abroad are conducted in three different languages. Portuguese, Spanish and Russian are offered with the Soviet Union program in its fourth year. Students receive six hours of credit.

A linguistics program is being developed on the graduate level in association with the Summer Institute of Linguistics, which is building a new campus south of Grand Prairie.


History

The department of history and philosophy offers a broad spectrum of courses ranging from ancient Egypt through Greece and Rome, Renaissance Europe, the emergence of Africa and Asia, the impact of Russia through contemporary American history.

Current research topics for department members include "Social Analysis of Philadelphia during the 1790's," "Analysis of Popular Culture and Protest Songs," "Saloons of the Old West" and "The New Deal in the South."

The annual Walter Prescott Webb Lecture Series is also sponsored by the department. Last summer the Taft Institute, a six-week intensive study course for high school teachers, was hosted here.

Beginning next year, the department will offer a minority studies program degree.

Government

Dr. Hagard, a Piper Award recipient, is one of the ten outstanding faculty members in Texas colleges and universities, and Dr. Dawson are publishing the third edition of their American history text.

The new ecology offering is an example of departmental branchings out to complement the annual Gout Emphasis week presentation. In addition, the department plans to work closer with related areas such as the Institute of Urban Studies and the Department of Sociology.


Although most people pay to attend college, ROTC students earn money for participating in military science. Under a program which provides

Under a program which provides scholarships, books, uniforms and an additional stipend of \$100 per month, the men of the ROTC receive training in leadership, organization, motivation, and discipline.

Special attention should be given to the many civic services rendered by the corps. Among the long list of activities is the newly organized summer drill clinic which aids in the instruction of high school cadets, spanning a five-state area.

Recently, the Board of Regents approved a minor in military science for the 70-year old program.


With a new major under its belt, the PE department may be going for the black belt. But there's more to it than that.


The department, which this year achieved degree-granting status, is teaching women's self-defense with an eye toward avoiding trouble as much as fighting out of trouble.


Self-defense gets top billing on stage of new PE acts, including coed fencing (foiled again!) and folk dancing.

For the muscle-minded there's kinesiology, the study of how muscles interact. Lloyd Bridges freaks can scuba dive or synchronize swim.



Psychology


The strength of any psychology program lies not in lecture but in experimentation and observation. That's good at UTA if you're a student, bad if you're a rat.



Lifestyle of the lions in Lion Country Safari came under scrutiny, too.


Of more immediate human value, perhaps, was the student work with mentally retarded persons on ways to determine and improve behavior patterns.

The effects of crowding on society was another topic of discussion. Dr. James Baerwaldt could use his department as a model. The number of students in psychology courses had quadrupled from 366 in 1960-61 to 1,600 in 1972.

Music





Long rehearsals, demanding classes, and flawless performances all combine to create a comradeship among musicians that is seldom found elsewhere on campus.

All music majors are required to take private lessons in addition to theory and group music classes.

The department sponsors bands and choirs including the Madrigal and Holiday Singers, and the Symphonic and Marching Bands.

Performances by these groups and faculty members are given throughout the year. Gerald Tate and Dorothy Nelson were presented in voice recitals and Jo and Harvey Boatright in a joint flute and piano recital.



Sociology

With emphasis on expansion, progress and contemporary problems, the sociology department is making curriculum changes to allow more labs for students working offcampus. The department would like to work with the new federallyfunded town — Flower Mound established in Denton County.

An intern class in social welfare meets on campus initially, with students then going to various agencies to work in the field — poverty, delinquent homes and the handicapped.

Concerned with contemporary problems, the faculty is engaged in several projects — Dr. Jess Lord, social behavior and marijuana; Dr. Joyce Williams, definition of black communities; Dr. Bill Stacy, social role of females; Dr. Lee Taylor, development of manpower planning careers; and Lloyd Rudowski, social behavior and art museums. The department has received a grant to pursue a project entitled "Community Development in Social Work."

One faculty member, Dr. Thomas Hays, will travel to Egypt in 1973 to work on "Origins of Pre-Dynastic Egypt," a project funded by the graduate school.

The sociology department hopes to offer a master's degree program soon. "We want to develop a professional atmosphere in the department of sociology," says Lee Taylor, department chairman.

Aerospace Engineering

Aerospace became a seperate department this year with Dr. Jack Fairchild as the acting head of the department. Previously Aerospace and Mechanical Engineering has been a joint program.

With 110 students in the undergraduate program and 10 in the graduate program, the department is involved in research projects such as the design of an airplane powered by a man and a helicopter control system designed to simulate helicopter flying.

Dr. Fairchild worked on Fin and Fan research, which concerns the use of ducts to create a shroud around the propeller of a helicopter in order to help prevent damage.

Dr. Fred Payne worked on an Atmospheric Turbulence project, in an attempt to better understand turbulence on pollution in large cities.

Dr. Donald Seath studied the nature of the wake generated by the wing tips of an airplane during flight. Wing tip Vortex Studies are designed to see what can be done to decrease the wake from an airplane's wing tips, in order to prevent serious accidents, such as one airplane flying into the wake of another.

Don Wilson was involved in Magnetogasdynamics Research in conjunction with the NASA Lewis Propulsion Center in Ohio. The research concerned the use of electricity conducted through liquid. This would be a way to furnish power more efficiently and could be used as an alternative to nuclear power. This power can be brought on very quickly, and is relatively clean.


Dr. Joseph Dalley dealt with photoelasticity research, including the use of optical techniques to study the stress pattern, or to map the pattern.

The department hosted the North Texas section of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics technical conference, and the student branch hosted the 21st annual student paper competition, sponsored by the North Texas Section of the AIAA.

Civil Engineering

Questions about our environment are crucial to future survival, and people are turning to the field of civil engineering for some of the answers.

Civil engineering is designed to provide a working knowledge of the principles of materials and basic sciences. The department describes its work as the engineering of constructed facilities, with more impact on our environment than anything else.

Much of the instruction involves planning, designing and construction of new facilities emphasizing environmental problems for areas such as transportation, public health, housing, sewer systems, waste treatment, water resources and stream pollution. The department now offers a new graduate course in technology of mass transportation, which provides training in urban transportation.

Opened in August, the Construction Research Center is directed by Dr. Richard L. Tucker. "The goal for the center," says Tucker, "is to allow the construction industry to tell us their problems and we'll try to solve them."

Industrial Engineering

Standing out as the only department in the school of Engineering with a fulltime female faculty member, Industrial Engineering seeks to solve not only the problem of sex discrimination but those of transportation and man's performance under varied conditions.

Drs. Herbert Conley, John Fox, and F. A. Meier conducted research sponsored by the Urban Mass Transit Association of the Department of Transportation. They concentrated on improving the capacity, the ridership, and the maintenance management of public transportation.

Fox also completed an environmental chamber to be used in the studying of human performance under various conditions.

Professor Kurt Schembers developed a computerized accounting procedure for use with a mini-computer in small businesses.

Advanced courses, emphasizing the analytical aspects, cover topics from operation research to human factors to production measurement, computer science, systems design and control theory.

Electrical Engineering

Electrical engineers are searching for ways to lift trains from their tracks, freeze portions of the brain and develop routes for transportation.

In an era of increased specialization, electrical engineering is offering a spectrum of areas to choose from. The student can now concentrate on power systems, electronics, serio-mechanisms or systems analysis through the selection of technical electives.

A number of instructors are involved in research. Dr. C. V. Smith, for instance, is currently researching magnetic levitation through a grant from the federal government. With the use of magnetic fields, heavy objects can be lifted with ease. This innovation would allow an entire train to be lifted from its tracks.

A Thermo-Electrical Cooling Device is the pet project of Dr. K. R. Rao and Gale Hoyos, graduate student of medicine. The device would allow small portions of the brain to be chilled without affecting surrounding cells — a breakthrough for modern brain surgery.

Dr. Mo Shing Chen is making a computerized study of the best routes between any two points in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Considered will be time of day, traffic conditions and road conditions.


All this activity is opening the path for students in other departments. Electrical Engineering now offers a course for non-majors whose work requires the use of electrical equipment. The fundamental principles of electronic devices, circuits and components are being taught in regard to their use in instrumental research and acquistion of data.

Initiating a self-instruction laboratory and designing a sailboat capable of speeds two and a half times that of the wind speed are two projects of the Mechanical Engineering Department.

The labs, consisting of sight and sound presentations via audio-visual equipment, enable students to conduct experiments without an instructor.

"The procedure will cut the amount of needed teacher supply and will enable the labs to be open at almost all times," said Dr. Carl Files, chairman of the department.

"All of the presentations will be produced by the instructors. Dr. Charles Blackwell, professor of mechanical engineering, will make most of them with the aid of other teachers."

In a hydrofoil project, the department produced a craft expected to be the world's fastest sailboat. With a unique design, the two-passenger prototype is anticipated to reach speeds of fifty miles per hour in a




twenty mile per hour wind.


Other projects include a cast basalt research, design projects, mechanism deflection and heat transfer. Using simulated moon rock, the students cast drills and structural parts for buildings by firing the substance in a kiln.

Also during the year, Dr. David Hullender, assistant professor of mechanical engineering, was named Young Engineer or the Year by the Fort Worth Chapter of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers. Dr. Hullender was faculty advisor for the development of the ideal urban vehicle. The propane powered car placed fifth in a field of 65 during national competition.

Economics


Every business administration student is exposed to the wonders of economics as major, minor or required course.




Accounting

Practical experience in the business world can be gained from the new Entrepreneurship class offered by the accounting department.

The class is involved in the formation of an actual corporation to market a specific product — in the fall a new type of paint roller, in the spring a mutual investment fund with students arranging their own financing.

The objective of the department is to enable the student to pursue a career in private, governmental or public accounting with seminars and computer labs provided to enhance classroom instruction. A special accounting lab is staffed by an advanced accounting students to help with tutoring.

Business Administration

"The purpose of the business department is to produce a student whose education is relevant both in the short term and the long term. "We want our curriculum to be relevant to the needs of the business community and to society," says Dr. Donald Cantwell, head of business administration.

A variety of speakers and field trips supplement class lectures and lab assignments for the department.

A 24% jump in enrollment reflects the increased demand for business

degrees and the prestige of the department.

The 34 faculty members are assisted by 21 part-time graduate teaching assistants and lecturers from area businesses.

An advisory board of business leaders act as consultants for curriculum development and career placement. They meet with faculty and students.

Experimental classes have been introduced in information systems and basic statistics.




Biology

With more people enrolled in biology than in any other subject, the halls of the Life-Science Building are bound to be crowded.


And crowded they are with 1,500 biology majors moving to attend classes in vertebrate embryology, pathogenic bacteriology, parasitology and human sexuality, to mention only a few of 38 different subjects offered under the heading of biology. These subjects, taught with lectures and labs, produce graduates destined for professional schools of medicine, dentistry and medical technology.

Using their own research to create interest and to teach scientific methodology, instructors are involved in a number of projects. Dr. Louis Bragg is working with a plant growth chamber, Dr. C. C. Hall with dust mites, and Dr. Thomas Hellier is studying the effects of hot water effluents in lakes. To help with such research, three department-owned boats are utilized on area lakes.

The ecology movement is seen as a factor in the biology upsurge over the last few years, and Dr. W. R. Meacham, department chairman, expresses hope that this interest is not just a fad.






Other innovations include graduate courses in flame chemistry and a chemistry course in forensics that is related to the Criminal Justice Department.

Making people aware of the geology they will encounter in urbanization programs is a goal of the department.


Dr. Charles Dodge, acting chairman of the department, coordinates research on the effect of geological features of urban growth and development. He also works with community groups on matters such as waste disposal systems and environmental pollution.

Since additional space was obtained in the Life-Science Building last year, geology operations have mushroomed. The extra space enabled the addition of new courses and larger labs. Three courses — oceanography, geology of the U.S., and geology and cultural evolution were added to the curriculum this year.


Next year, the department will add three new non-major courses aimed at business and liberal arts majors. They will be geology of Texas, geology hazards, and geologic time.

Math



Surprisingly, students have begun to take more math courses than are required, the courses being largely on the advanced level.

A new program instruction class has been introduced to help meet the needs of large classes. A class of 115 people meets for lecture and then divides into groups for more individualized teaching.

Math clinics continue to provide aid for floundering students in all classes ranging from basic to advanced courses.

Several areas of mathematics are being researched by the faculty. Faculty study is concentrated in algebra, number theory, statistics, analysis and numerical analysis.

The department is introducing a new bachelor of arts degree in physics. The program will give the student more freedom in outside course selection and hopefully better prepare him for contact outside his field.

The beginning physics' classes meet occasionally in Doug Russell Park to put into practical application some of the laws of motion they have learned.

During "UTA Time," a laser light and a scotch tape insignia were used to demonstrate light refraction. UTA written with scotch tape was rotated and the light was refracted to create a prism-like effect.

An astronomy course, developed for non-science majors, bolstered enrollment in physics this year.




Urban Studies


For the "save the society" advocate dedicated to the preservation of all that is pure and clean, more is required than merely wanting to be humane. A good education will help, and that's where the Institute of Urban Studies can supplement good intentions.

Established five years ago by the Texas Legislature, the institute strives to apply its research and graduate work to public service and communications in the fields of education, research and service. Seeing the need for a balanced program, the institute has defied the code of most universities by pressing into all three fields full force, giving no prominence to any one.

The activities of the Institute of Urban Studies range from a field trip to Chicago for the purpose of evaluating the make-up of that city, to an intensive study into the possibility of establishing regional criminal information centers. This year criminal justice courses boasted 700 undergraduates and 40 graduate students.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROGRAMS

Institute of Urban Studies The University of Texas at Arlington

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN CRIMINAL JUSTICE Preparation for dealing with people as individuals is a central objective of this curriculum which emphasizes the roles of law enforcement agencies in a democratic bociety. Legal and organizational characteristics of the criminal justice system are viewed from the perspective of societal objectives, and skifts ingarted by the program emphasize the broader purpose of law enforcement.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS: 124 semester hours of credit, including 36 hours in the criminal justice major.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

1. Graduation from an accredited high school 2. Satisfactory score on the Scholastic Aptitude Tast of the College Board unless over 25 years of age.

FINANCIAL AID: Loans and grants are available under the Law Enforcement Education Program.

MASTER OF ARTS IN URBAN AFFAIRS-CRIMINAL JUSTICE

This program draws from public administration, law, sociology, business administration, hsychology, and political science to offer students a comprehensive multidisciplinary course of study. Current research and innovative techniques for tutlizing modern technology serve as the basis for the entire program. Students may have opportunities to participate in criminal justice research projects.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS: 36 semester hours of credit, with 30 hours of coursework, and 6 hours of thesis or internship.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

A.3.0 (B) grade point average on all junior and senior work.
 Z. Baccalaureate Degree from an approved institution.
 Satisfactory score on GRE aptitude test.

FINANCIAL AID: Loans and grants are available under the Law Enforcement Education Program. Graduate assistantships may become available for qualified students during the Fall semester.

Graduate School

Graduate faculty and students toil at the top of the academic hier-archy.

The 73 full members of the Graduate faculty are selected on the basis of their competence to supervise theses and dissertations. Another 197 associate members serve on thesis committees.


All graduate courses are taught by the graduate faculty.

With 20 elected members, the Graduate Assembly is the legislative body of the graduate faculty. The assembly is apportioned by college as follows: Liberal Arts, six; Science, four; Business, five; and Engineering, five.

Graduate teaching and research assistants are selected on the basis of departmental recommendation. They work as lab assistants in the college of Science and teach freshman courses in mathematics and English.

The University is authorized to grant two doctorate and 24 master's degrees.





Graduate School Of Social Work


Students in the four year-old Graduate School of Social Work practice what is preached in class.


Theories learned in class are applied in hospitals, clinics, public schools and other areas. Research is constantly underway in such areas as the impact of diagnostic labeling of mental patients and the benefit of early marital counseling.

Located in Swift Center, one block from the campus at Cooper and Abram streets, the school began its counseling program in 1970. Graduate students serve as counselors, with a professional staff of supervisors that includes faculty members.

This year a six-day seminar on volunteer service for members of the Junior League of Fort Worth and a group of community leaders was conducted. The program focused on training and understanding volunteers' jobs in various social agencies and community service work.

Director of the school is Dr. Fernando G. Torgerson. He took office in September, 1967, to start the program after the Texas Legislature established and funded the first graduate social work program in North Texas.

Studious Go A-Carreling





In fifty years of existence on campus, the UTA library has created several small puddles into one giant splash.

From a leaky building, which housed three librarians, two staff members, six student assistants, and some 15,000 literary volumes, the learning center has evolved into a seven-story, 1.5 million dollars building, equipped with all the modern conveniences including an employment of 19 librarians, 40 supporting staff members, 59 fulltime workers, and 96 student helpers.

In addition, the library contains

over 375,000 books, 104,000 microfilms, 279 government periodicals, and technical reports, 3,307 magazines and 44 newspapers. It is also a depository for the state's AFL-CIO records and documents.

The opening of the new Cultural Center, the obtaining of Board of Regents, Jenkins Garrett's collection, along with the Audio-Visual department and the spacious sixth floor lounge area, has proven that the library is not only a place for bookworms, but also a center for studying, relaxing, and occasionally catnapping students.



Election '72 created more work for





Review, once the property of the English department, is presently in student ownership.


The Review is a one-man operation, appearing annually with art, photographs and literary selections. Unlike the Prism, the Review contains selections done only by UTA students.

Although many institutions have suffered a yearbook fade, a poll here this year showed 95 per cent of the students surveyed want the Reveille to remain in full operation.







Open Wide, Say Ah-h-h


The Health Center is no Medical Center; it's not intended to be. Then, it's no small scale country practice either.

Some UTA citizens expect a full blown hospital in toto. This is not the case. The Health Center is, however, advancing rapidly in the number of personnel and the services rendered. Four general treatment rooms, longer office hours and an expanded staff enabled the center to see twice as many students this year as last.

The center has added a lab technologist, making it possible to run blood counts, urine tests, blood chemistry and some bacteriology research.







This year Minor and his staff advised new and returning students to purchase books and supplies before or during registration for quicker and better service.






LEFT: During the first days of classes, students wait more than an hour to get into the bookstore.


Black hats customarily belong to the bad guys. Not here.

Receiving her training in Austin and joining the staff last August, Mrs. Simpson, became the first woman hired to enforce campus law and order.



It takes patience and sometimes the muscle of the 137 men of the Physical Plant, tending a \$50 million layout spread over 297 acres.


For grass and trees and righted stones, for road repairs and 150-watt bulbs (two per semester): a salute to the campus custodial engineers.

Every morning students walk into buildings that beam with sparkling windows and floors, and nearly clean chalk boards and erasers.


Unfortunately the 45 buildings on campus are not invaded each night by three-inch elves who scrub and polish until dawn.

This massive task is accomplished by Building Services Supervisor Guy Moore and his 80-man squad.

When the buildings are cleaned, articles left behind by students, such as billfolds, coats, textbooks, contact lenses and slide rules, are recovered by Moore's staff.

"We use yearbooks to find owners of any property with identification, such as rings with initials," said Moore. "Once we returned a \$500 diamond ring to a girl on the same day we found it and before she had to tell her parents."

"If it takes too much time to contact an owner, we either turn the item over to Lost and Found or run an ad in the "Shorthorn."







Aid For Financial Ills

Four years of learning causes some financial problems to arise. Students can be assured that the department of Financial Aid is around to help.

Each year the university grants a number of scholarships to qualifying students, those who have completed 30 or more semester hours at UTA and have a B average. Scholarships are also awarded by the Texas Education Association to highest ranking graduates of any of the state accredited high schools.

The most used of financial assistance is the federally supported Work Study Program. Students from low-income families can find parttime employment on campus.

Other means of assistance comes from various loans, and grants. These include the short-term loan, emergency loan, Connally Carrillo act and the Education Opportunity Grants, commonly known as the EOG.

Long term loans for state universities offered at UTA are Henson-Hazelwood College Student Loan program, National Defense Student Loan and the Federally Insured Loan program. Open daily except weekends, Food Service also caters banquets and lunches for campus functions.












Marching Band






Business Council

Dr. W. B. Nelson, dean of the College of Business, sponsors the group.








Brotherhood is our watchword and continues to provide unity of spirit beyond graduation.







Biological Society


For persons interested in the life sciences and how they relate to today's world, the Biological Society offers a variety of opportunities.



During the summer, they volunteer for mission work all over the world.


The purpose of the group is to share the Christian message with interested students and faculty members and to provide a place for Christian fellowship and growth. Membership and participation is open to people of all denominations.




Navigators

The group also participated in an Intercollegiate Workshop Weekend in Dallas during Passover in 1972.





The Newman Club, a religious and social organization, works with the University Catholic Community to provide several activities.


Members entertained Arlington's elderly, sponsored parties for orphans, read Mass at the Wesley Foundation and had impromptu socializing.



CSI



Forums Arts and Films




This small squad of ready-men can be seen taking tickets at basketball games and performing assorted services.

A variety of Pakistani dishes were served, followed by a cultural movie and variety show.



That came by accident. I usually dance around at games anyway. At one game I did the majorettes' routine with them. I got carried away and it stayed around. People really like it.


Besides Sam Maverick, is there any other function of Mr. UTA?

I was also pleased to see several UTA students in the stands. There were probably 70 to 100 that just dropped in to watch.




The food was inexpensive, good and there was a wide variety. And it's interesting to eat as the scenery goes by at 50 miles-per-hour.


















There Are Horses, And Then There Are Horses .

In most yearbooks a space is usually reserved for the editor's farewell, explanation, apology or whatever. I have decided just to share some of the events that have gone into the making of this yearbook.

Things got started last summer when I had to make the decision as to what format the book should have. Should it be poster size like last year's book or how about paperback or what about making it round and sealing it in a coffee can? After three minutes of deliberating over the yearbook surveys, I came to the conclusion that UTA was not ready for another innovative book. Neither was I.

The next task was to choose a staff. For a school this size we could have used about ten full-time people. We found five dedicated parttime staffers plus assorted photographers. Shorthorn writers helped with copy and so did student publications secretaries.

With such a small staff, everybody did everything. If the football coach called for our sports editor, he probably got one of our secretaries or one of the custodians who made our night life interesting.

During the first couple of weeks we set about organizing the clubs on the campus. The blind . . . At the meeting we held for club leaders we suggested that the groups plan imaginative poses for their group photos. One fraternity called to ask if they could pose wearing only T-Squares. Let them, I said, let them. We're still waiting for their second call.

It was also interesting to watch people react to a yearbook editor. Some people, no matter what their age, will do anything to get their photo in. For instance one student asked if he could pay me to use his photo - one which showed his good side.

As a matter of fact, Dean Wayne Duke on his way through student publications offices always made a point of stopping by to ask if his photo would be in the book. Of course, he wasn't really serious . . .

Then there was the case of HKN and all of the other missing persons. HKN were the initials we found on a picture packet from the photo studio — nothing else, just HKN. We searched our directories but no leads. We finally ran an ad in the Shorthorn to get the name.

Then there were the other missing people. We had their names and photographs, but we could find no official record of them at UTA. Maybe these missing people are just a troupe of passing gypsies who read our posters and rushed to the Student Center to be photographed for the Reveille.

I remember other things like the time a foreign student heard that clubs could approve their pages before they were sent to the publisher. The student wanted to know if he could come down and check the spelling of his name because last year it had been misspelled. I had nightmares of long lines of people streaming into our already chaotic office. God help us - and He did many times.

On another occasion, a foreign student and his friend walked up to our vearbook survey table where a Long Hair was standing. The conversation went something like this: Foreign student looking at a yearbook - What are these people? They look like a bunch of hippies.

His friend - No, that's a fraternity. Foreign student - What's a fraternity? Long Hair - What's a hippie?

I wanted to share these stories with you because like the rest of the book they may give you a few laughs, and maybe some insights.

I deliberately tried to keep the theme of the book light — no heavy profound statements about the world. I have not lived long or hard enough to be genuinely, believably profound.

Many skipped classes, missed holidays and messed-up weekends made this book possible. This is not a "one-person" book - many people contributed to it.

The people I want to thank first and most sincerely are my staff members - Carrie Morgan, Bill Janscha, Jill Richter and Kathy Kennedy. Thank you all for your time and especially for patience with me.

Bud Tomlinson has to be the perfect art director. He listened patiently to our brainstorming sessions, then retired to his art board to give life to our suggestions.

I can speak for the entire staff when I say that working on the book was hell . . . sometimes. But I can also say for all of us that the challenge that it gave and the opportunity it afforded us to learn and grow was well worth the cost.

I think I'll close now because I have nothing more to say. Besides I fear an attack of philosophizing coming on; so I'll just spare you.

We hope you enjoy the book and can laugh a little at it because that's what it's for. Also, if you have taken a dislike to it - shove it into your bookcase and drag it out ten years from now - it may not matter so






