




There is no place for homesickness on our campus. Newcomers do not remain strangers; but they enter into every phase of campus life with enthusiasm, vigor, and happy confidence.




KNOWLEDGE . . .





In that storehouse of wisdom the collegian may find the answer to many problems, someone he likes to study with or even a coke date.




CONTENTS





H. A. D. DUNSWORTH

The year by year advancement and growth of Arlington State College, as reflected in each succeeding issue of the REVEILLE, is a source of pride and gratification to us all.





The Rebs wound up the season by winning the Pioneer Conference Championship with a 27-to-13 win

over their arch-rivals, Tarleton State.

Three Rebs were selected to the Dallas News All Texas JC eleven— Guard James Keck, Linebacker Ken Forehand and Halfback Vavra. 


