

Wanda Thomasson is a freshman who is majoring in English. She assumed responsibility of assistant editor in September 1955. Future plans are indefinite.



Social Life of the Girls' Clubs

The girls' social clubs activities for a year begin with the "rush teas," at which the old members choose the girls they wish to invite to join their club. After this is decided, each club issues bids and holds an initiation banquet for new members. Each new member has a "big sister," an old member, who attempts to help her "little sister" in any way she can.

The clubs usually sponsor a candidate for all school elections and carry on publicity campaigns for that candidate.

Social activities for the club usually include a major and a minor party each semester.

New members may be inaugurated at mid-term if the club has fewer than thirty-five members enrolled.

an entertaining marching show which included a salute to Ranger. The musicians left the field in a moving formation of the letters "ASC."



Coach Claude Gilstrap

Claude Gilstrap, head football coach and athletic director at Arlington State College, brought Rebel rooters another outstanding season in 1955, compiling seven victories against three losses and finjshing second in the Pioneer Conference.

In three seasons at Rebelland, Gilstrap has posted 23 wins and lost only six games. Last year Gilstrap's squad beat some of the top junior college competition in the state of Texas, was upset by two conference members in the closing stages of the grid race, and lost the loop title in the final contest.


Out of the hectic and unforgettable campaign emerged Coach Gilstrap as the "Junior College Coach of the Year," one of the highest honors a coach can attain in sport circles. The sports award for coaches was Gilstrap's second such award. Before coming to ASC the popular mentor won the honor in 1948 while coaching at Paris Junior College.

It was this Rebel coach who saw his playing days in the midthirties as an end at Schreiner Institute and the University of Texas. He started coaching in 1937 at Leverett's Chapel High school and later moved up in school boy ranks to positions at Wharton high and Cleburne high. "Chena" then jumped to junior college circles by coaching at Paris Junior College and Schreiner Institute before coming to Arlington State in 1953.

BOBBY LANE: The latest addition to the Arlington State coaching staff who was a former Arlington State student in 1952-53 and trainer for the football squad. After finishing his studies here, Lane went to Texas Christian University where he received his degree. But he never left the trainer's job at ASC.

While going to TCU Lane was made a full-time trainer. This year he became track

coach. The former Cleburne, Texas, boy married an ex-Arlington State student in 1954.

BURLEY BEARDEN: A former line star at Trinity University who later became a coach at Grand Prairie high before coming to Arlington State in 1946. For eight years at ASC he was combination math professor and line coach. In 1954 Bearden became a full-time professor of physical education.

During his years here Bearden has been a very prominent factor in the success of Arlington State teams. He is the man who "separates the men from the boys" in preparing the big Rebel lines and has always been successful in providing ample material for those forward walls.

TOMMY TINKER: Started coaching for Rebels at Arlington in 1940 and left only during the war for a short period. Tinker serves as coach of backfieldmen and ends, and he scouts the opponents during football season. He has been head basketball coach during his entire reign at Arlington State, turning in many outstanding teams on the courts. Several of his basketball students leaving ASC have gone on to the larger institutions for stardom on the hardwoods.

During the spring months Tinker heads the golf and tennis teams keeping ASC in top contention for championships in the minor sports. During his playing days at Tarleton State Tinker was an outstanding football back and basketball star; he later played basketball at Texas A&M.

WHARTON 28 A.S.C. 7

ARLINGTON, Tex., Sept. 15—A powerful Wharton junior college football club won an impressive 28-7 victory over the Arlington State Rebels here Thursday night in a non-conference encounter.

The visiting Longhorn Conference opponent scored in the opening period when Quarterback Bruce Ueckert plunged over from the two yard line.

Arlington State began moving the ball in the air after the Wharton score, but a pass was intercepted on the seven by Halfback Dudley Rench who raced 93 yards for a touchdown.

After the kick-off the Rebs again took to the air. In six plays from his own 35, Quarterback Jimmy Hardin completed passes and the final one from the 30 yard marker to Halfback Alton Grimes was good for six points. Grimes kicked the point after.

Wharton came back the second half with a seven point lead and tallied in the third and fourth quarters to clinch the victory

The visitors' big line held Arlington to 58 yards rushing and eight first downs. The Rebels completed nine of 18 passes for 122 yards.





PARIS, Tex., Oct. 1—Arlington State's Rebels displayed a stout goal-line defense here Saturday night and gained a slim 12-7 margin over the Paris Dragons in the Rebs' first victory of the 1955 season.

With only four minutes to play and ASC ahead by five points, the Dragons had the ball on the Rebs' one—yard line and a first down. The Arlington forward wall tightened and held back the on-thrusting Dragons for four tense downs to preserve their lead.

Arlington State produced its first score in the first quarter when Charles Yates climaxed the opening kick-off drive with an 11—yard run around left end. The Rebels started the drive on their own 74—yard line and scored in 11 plays.








The Rebels started making a rout of the game in the third quarter with Jack Terry scoring twice, Wayne Rogers and Jimmy Gates each tallying once.



ARLINGTON, Tex., Nov. 19-It took a whole year before the Arlington State Rebels could get revenge on their sister school, but a 26-7 victory over the Tarleton State Plowboys here this afternoon before a near-capacity crowd completed the Reb's long awaited mission.

Back in November of 1954, the Plowboys had upset ASC, 27-20, and knocked the Rebels out of contention for a post-season bowl bid, the Pioneer Conference championship and the coveted Silver Bugle.

It was a long wait for ASCers. The grudge contest went something like this:

Tarleton took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter after covering an Arlington State fumble and going on for the score.

Hardin completed a pass to Hunnicutt from the same yard line, on the same pass play, and the big end probably carried the same two defenders over the goal line. Bruce again kicked the point after.

Shreiner Is Troublesome Opponent For Rebels





It was the Spring semester before the Arlington State Rebel basketball team started to winning games consistently. And it was after mid-term that the Pioneer Conference knew it had a darkhorse

challenger for the cage crown.

Transfers bolstered the Rebel squad at the start of the Spring semester, although the Rebs won their share of contests at the start of the year. The new players, Lee Chambers, transfer from SWTSC; Curtis Hill, from Texas A&M; Dean Sinclair, University of Houston transfer; and Justin Rowland, ASC football player, gave ASC the added offensive and defensive strength it needed to be a contender.

And with the added strength, Arlington State won the conference championship, placed fourth in the National Junior College Region V tournament at Amarillo and closed the season without a single defeat on its home court.

One of the transfers, Dean Sinclair, won All-Conference honors on his offense and rebounding display. The Mount Vernon boy also was placed on the All-Tournament team in the Region V meet at Amarillo.

Ted Cromer, ASC's 6' 7" freshman center, played his first year of college ball and was probably the most improved player as the season progressed. He led the team scoring with 300 points in the season for a 13.6 average per game. Cromer also was placed on the second team All-Conference squad.

Little Charles Yates, Rebel football player from Mount Vernon,

won second team honors on the All-Conference squad. His scrappy playing and ball handling gave added strength on the outside.



Tinker's crew won a Pioneer Conference basketball championship for the third time in six years the loop has been an organization. San Angelo was the 1955 champion.







Robert Fischel, Rebel sprinter for the second year, has never lost a race at the 220-yard distance for ASC. He wins his share of the 100 yarders and runs a strong leg on the relays.

Before the Pioneer Conference meet at Stephenville, Arlington State made good showings in junior college competition over the state. The Rebels placed second in Laredo's Border Olympics with Fischel scoring most of the ASC points and taking second in individual honors.



Fischel Wins In Southwest Recreational Meet At Fort Worth.


