CALVIN LEE, a 147-pound, 5'8" Comet from Comanche, created a sensation in the Pioneer Conference, Pasadena, and various and sundry other places this season. He was unanimous choice for All-Pioneer Conference and was selected for the first team of the NJCAA's All-America squad.

California football fans will be talking of his performance in the Junior Rose Bowl game for years to come. He gained 79 yards in nine tries for top honors in the rushing department, and scored all 20 of the Rebel points. In the opening minutes of the game, when Compton was apparently moving for a quick touchdown, he intercepted a pass and chilled the Tartars with an 82-yard scoring runback. He was elected by the working sportswriters as the outstanding player of the game and received the Paul Helms Trophy emblematic of this honor.

His best night, however, came against San Angelo, when he carried 28 times for 173 yards and scored 26 of the Confederates' 32 points.

Despite being sidelined for two games except for conversion duties, he led the league in rushing, with 797 yards on 128 carries, and scoring, with 98 points. He tallied at least one point in every game.

NORMAN DENNEY, 200-pound guard from Waco, was selected on the National Junior College Athletic Association's first team All-America squad.


The blonde giant was a transfer from Southern Methodist and a very welcome one. He was one of the smartest, most mobile guards in the conference.

Denney threw the key block far downfield on Calvin Lee's 82-yard TD scamper in the Junior Rose Bowl and was very much in evidence as a downfield blocker on most of the Rebels' long gainers.

ASC'S ALL-AMERICANS


BERNARD OTTO, two time All-Pioneer Conference tackle, was the only Rebel to play in the first annual JC All-America Grid Classic in Jackson, Mississippi, and was instrumental in helping his team to a 7-6 victory.

Otto has been the mainstay of the Confederate line for the past two seasons and finished his third campaign in a Blue and White uniform with the Tarleton game. He was ineligible for the JRB Classic because of his third-year status.

TOM BEASLEY, 190-pounder from Breckenridge, came to the Rebels as a transfer from Rice Institute. Came along fast in the latter part of the season to gain a starting berth and a place on the honor squad. Snagged four passes, second only to Rowland among the ends, for 106 yards.






GERALD FOLTYN, the real workhorse of the Rebel team, played the full 60 minutes on five occasions, including the JRB game. Despite his small size (5' 9", 168 pounds), he was a bruising runner and could be counted on to pick up the short yardage when it was needed most. Was second to Lee in rushing with 398 yards on 104 carries.

JUSTIN ROWLAND led all Confederate pass-snaggers by a large margin, grabbing 13 for 207 yards. One of these resulted in a touchdown. Punted for the injured Bobby Manning in the Victoria game. Also in this game, he intercepted four passes and returned one of them 55 yards for the clinching touchdown. He is from Hamlin.






JACK TERRY, playing his third season in a Blue and White uniform, had possibly his best year. He scored the only Rebel TD in the Del Mar game, and returned a Ranger kickoff 95 yards on the longest Confederate scoring play of the year. Terry, Lee, and Foltyn formed a three-pronged running attack which was all but unstoppable.

COACHES

CLAUDE "CHENA" GILSTRAP had his greatest Rebel team this season since coming to Arlington in 1953. WHARTON WAS EASY


Wharton's Pioneers provided a dry run for the entire season even before the school year had begun. Time after time it was the same story—Lee rambles, Rebs romp.


The defense had a great night, too, holding Wharton to three first downs, all

Lee heads for pay dirt against Del Mar


Del Mar's powerful Vikings put the first blemish on the Rebel record by holding them to a 7-7 tie in the first home game of the season.

ACS had to shove Paris back time and again before they could finally come away with a 19-13 victory.



BUT NMMI WASN'T




One of many TD's against New Mexico.

The Confederates put on their customary



SCHREINER DIDN'T SCORE



SAN ANGELO WAS GREAT . . .




San Angelo just wasn't in it.

BUT NOT GREAT ENOUGH





Hanson about to get a 6-point block.


In 1954 Ranger upset the Rose Bowlbound Rebels to start them on the downgrade which skidded them out of contention for the loop championship, much less a bowl bid.


the Rebs were down. Everything Tarleton did turned out right, and nothing clicked for ASC.


Floyd Stone led the Rebel scorers with


18 markers, followed by 14 from Dean Sinclair and 10 each by Cleo Haddock, Kent Bolding, and Lee Chambers.






RANGER



SCHREINER


KERRVILLE, Feb. 2—This game consisted of two halves as different as night and day, and Schreiner had the most fun, winning 82-72.

Ted Cromer racked up 20 points in the first half and the Rebs led at intermission, 43-33. Schreiner's high scorers, on the other hand, had been held to 15 during this period. All-Conference Bill Klingaman had 10 and Cecil Rucker had five.

The second half was a different story, however. The Mountaineer sharpshooters started hitting the bucket and Cromer was held to two points during this period, thereby providing the margin of victory.

ARLINGTON, Feb. 16—Arlington State lost control of a slim lead it had held almost throughout the game to be downed by Schreiner Institute, 78-68. The two teams exchanged almost goal for goal until a scant four minutes remained. Then the Mountaineers caught up and the game broke wide open. The two teams then employed no set offense, just whoever gets close enough to shoot—shoot. Schreiner got closer, oftener.

Ted Cromer led Rebel scorers with 16 points, but lost high game honors to Bill Klingaman, who netted 31 points. Cromer was assisted by Kent Bolding's 13, Cleo Haddock's and Dave Campbell's 12, and Floyd Stone's 11 markers.



SAN ANGELO

ARLINGTON, Feb. 9—The Rebels held a six-point lead over San Angelo at halftime, but it didn't ruffle the Rams' mohair. The eventual Pioneer Conference and National JC champions racked up 54 points in the second period and won easily, 85-64.


San Angelo finished the national tourney with a 33-2 record, but neither of the losses was at the hands of a junior college team. The Rebs gave them about as much trouble in two games as anyone.

Cleo Haddock topped Reb shooters with a 16-point total, followed closely by Ted Cromer with 14 and Floyd Stone with 12. SAN ANGELO, Feb. 23-San Angelo had

to employ a late stall to preserve a 72-62 victory in the return match. The Rams held a narrow margin throughout the game until deep in the final period. Their half-time lead was only 37-33.

The Rebs turned on the steam early in the second half and moved within two points of the undefeated Rams, 54-52. That was as close as they got.

Dean Sinclair turned in the top performance for A.S.C., scoring 20 points before fouling out midway through the last half. Ted Cromer and Floyd Stone netted 14 and 10 respectively for the Rebs.



TARLETON

STEPHENVILLE, Feb. 5—Tarleton's whitehot Plowboys took an early commanding lead and staved off a second-half Reb rally to win, 85-74.

The Farmers made 13 of the first 16 field goals they attempted while A.S.C. was only normal. The Rebs could never climb out of the hole, although they outscored Tarleton the second half.


Ted Cromer led Rebel scorers with 19 points. He was followed by Floyd Stone (16), Dave Campbell (15), and Kent Bolding (12).

Plowboy Bragg Stockton sank 10 of his 15 attempted field goals and wound up the night with 24 points to lead all scorers.

ARLINGTON, Feb. 26—The last one was the best. The Rebels and Plowboys hooked up in a torrid scoring duel which left spectators limp and went into two overtimes before A.S.C. won, 92-90. It was the last game for both teams and gave them both 3-5 conference records.

Kent Bolding sank two free throws with 37 seconds left in the second overtime to give the Confederates the victory.

At the end of the regular game and the first overtime, also, A.S.C. led by two points and Tarleton tied it up with seconds left to play. The second time, Burch Swafford's shot was in the air when the buzzer sounded.






favorite's role in the annual conference meet, which was set for the A.S.C. cinderpath on April 27.



In the important relay events, Coach Lane went into the final phase of the season with set teams made up of:







December 8 will long be remembered in Arlington and Pasadena. That was the day the 13-point underdog Rebels beat Compton's mighty Tartars, 20-13, and became the first Texas team to ever win a game on the west coast.


The Junior Rose Bowl victory was sweet indeed. It erased much of the sting caused by the Tarleton debacle and gave the Rebs a claim on the title of National Champion, which Compton had worn for so long.

Calvin Lee was the big story in Pasadena just as he had been in Texas all year long. He set two Rose Bowl records and received the Paul Helms Outstanding Player Award. His 20 points were two more than the previous high and his 82-yard runback of a pass interception shaded the old mark of 57 yards.

The runback was a very opportune one. It came on the third play of the game, after Compton had moved from their own 12 to the ASC 27 on the kickoff return and two running plays. Lee scored on the dazzler and kicked the extra point.

On the second play of the second quarter the little speedster tallied again, this time traveling a mere 15 yards. In the third period he ended the scoring for the day by taking a Bob Manning pass for 24 yards and the final TD. Again the conversion was good.

Sandwiched in between Lee's second and third touchdowns, Compton scored twice and had a 13-13 tie at halftime, but the Rebel defense smacked them down in the second half and prevented them from getting back into the game.
