A regimental commander's duties are primarily those of command and supervision of all activities of the Regiment. He is responsible for the theoretical and practical training of his Regiment. In all these requirements





## ATHLETIC COUNCIL




# FOOTBALL

This year with a thorough knowledge of the game and of his players he turned out a team which went through the season undefeated in conference competition.

With his men he is patient and friendly but is ever firm, and he always demands the highest type of sportsmanship; it is through his leadership and example that the Aggies this year won such an enviable record for clean play and sportsmanship.

As line coach Mr. Dunsworth is largely responsible for the football team's fine showing this year. The fundamentals in which he drilled the linemen served them in good stead and enabled them to finish the year with flying colors.

In addition to his aid in turning out a championship football team, he has full charge of N. T. A. C.'s track aspirants, and though it is not well known, the Aggies have a track team to be proud of. Two of its members hold conference records, and the team as a whole is always a fine one.





In 1929 the Junior Aggies won the Junior College football championship with wins against Wichita Falls, Paris, and Gainesville Junior Colleges. It was then a small conference. Since then the conference and N. T. A. C. have grown with the times, and in the season of 1934-35 we find that the Aggies again have annexed the crown. During the preceding season they drilled on fundamentals and perfected their team play so well that at the beginning of the current season they were already far superior to their conference opponents.

N. T. A. C. won the conference championship by virtue of victories over Weatherford, Decatur Baptist, and Ranger Junior Colleges. The season ended with the 0-0 tie played with John Tarleton, leaving N. T. A. C. a game ahead of her old rival.

To be the best in anything requires courage, ambition, skill, and the will to win. Our team this year had these traits and they and their coaches have our sincere congratulations.

N. T. A. C. opened the season with the Texas A. and I. Javelinas at Kingsville. The Javelinas, representing a senior college, beat the Hornets 7-6 in desperately contested game. Later in the season this team from Kingsville played Texas A. and M. to a 7-7 tie, thus showing what brand of football the Aggies played in going down to a 7-6 defeat.

WESLEY BOYER was the team's captain. As a halfback his play was outstanding. As a captain his leadership and personality were vital to the team's success. He was chosen on the All - Conference Second Team and is co-captain elect next year.



The following week Wesley College was taken into camp by the score of 25-12. After the Aggie starters gained a decisive lead, the second team was sent in so that all could have as much actual playing experience as possible before the conference season began. By this time the team was rapidly rounding into shape and was playing in mid-season form.

In their first conference game of the season, the N. T. A. C. Aggies opened their championship drive with a hard fought 6-0 victory over the Weatherford Junior College Coyotes at Weatherford. The Coyotes put up a stubborn defense and it was not until the third quarter that the Hornets were able to break through with the lone score of the game.

The Aggies entertained the Simmons Freshman team on the home field the following week. Prepping for the game with Paris Junior College, N. T. A. C. won

handily from the Frosh by a score of 9-0.

LEONARD APPLETON, a tackle, was one of the most dependable men on the team. In a goal line stand or a last minute rally he could be counted on to put forth his best efforts to turn the tide.


MADISON COUNTS was on the squad last year. This season he earned the reputation of playing most of the time in the enemy's backfield. He was outstanding as a defensive guard.

JOE ELDER, another reserve halfback last season whose play was characterized by fine defensive work and a fighting spirit at all


EARL HUNTER played halfback last year, but this year was chosen for the difficult quarterback position. His excellent choice of plays and his educated toe were vital factors in the team's success.






The Aggies opened their current season against the T. W. C. Greyhounds. Their lead was never seriously challenged as they won 43-22.

Later in the week N. T. A. C. engaged the Dr. Pepper cagers again, this time in Dallas. The Peppers won a hard-fought game 53-25.





VICTOR NIXON, a first year man, was an outstanding forward. He has a thorough knowledge of the fundamentals and used them to the best advantage.



NOLAN JACKSON, broad jumper, won 23 points throughout the season. He holds the Conference broad jumping record of 22 feet 6.5 inches.


EDWIN HAMILTON ran the half mile, mile, and medley relay to win 14% points.

At the Central Texas Conference meet, held in Hillsboro, N. T. A. C. took 54 points, finishing second only to John Tarleton.




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## **TENNIS**



Orchestral-accompanying experience has been gained by the group in working with the Choruses in oratoria, light opera, and other joint presentations. Programs of standard orchestral music have been presented at assembly and for near-by schools.

#### STRING ENSEMBLE

As added training and experience for those playing the various stringed instruments, two or three smaller chamber music groups of string quartet and trio proportions are kept in training regularly. These groups, too, have the opportunity of public appearances.
