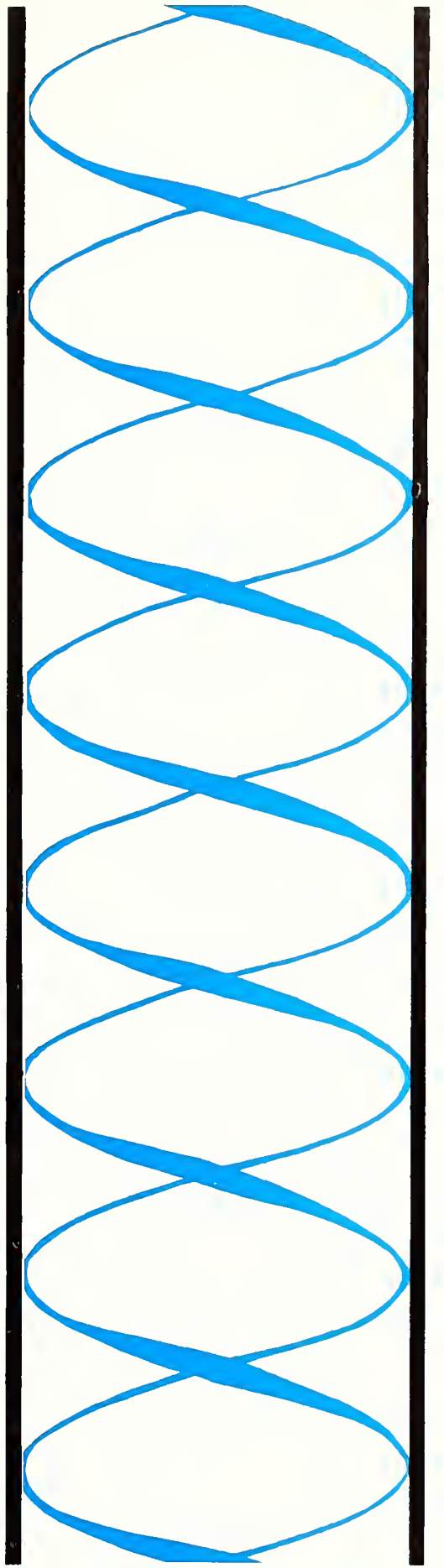

Life is found everywhere in this college. Arlington State College begins its day when five thousand cars surge onto the campus. From the parking lots and from the dorms, a mass of people begins to move through the campus. Each person is a part of the college and each has a particular task. Administrators look through the day's appointments, professors record last-minute grades from yesterday's quiz, and students fill the classrooms, the library and the student center.

As the day progresses, activities increase. Throughout the day, each building hums with its own particular noises. Science Hall bubbles and hisses quietly. College Hall resounds with the sound of practice pianos, the tuning of horns, the blare of the lab band, and the quiet business of the administrative offices. Unusual lectures float into the halls of the Engineering Building — a discussion of differential equations, an explanation of electrical circuits, a recitation in one of four or five languages, or a speech on marketing research.

The heart of the campus is the student center. It is a mixture of all emotions — panic before a quiz, intense concentration on a bridge game, or interest in a special lecture. The student center is also the battleground of an idealistic war between organizations and the masses. The newly formed Rebel Rousers and the Student Government try to destroy apathy. Non-joiners argue that none of the organizations are important.

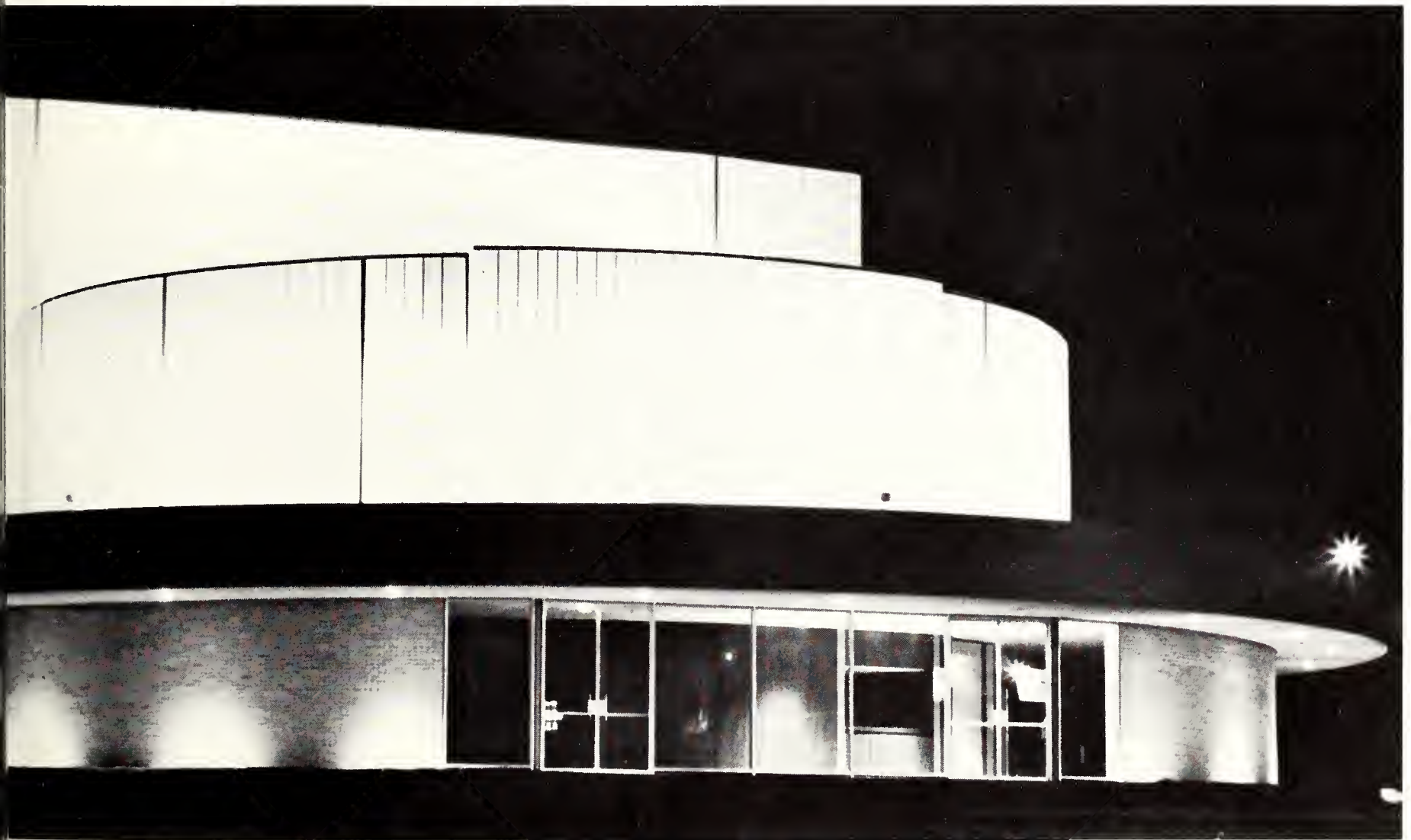
Thus life fills the campus until late at night when the last car leaves and the last dorm light is clicked off.

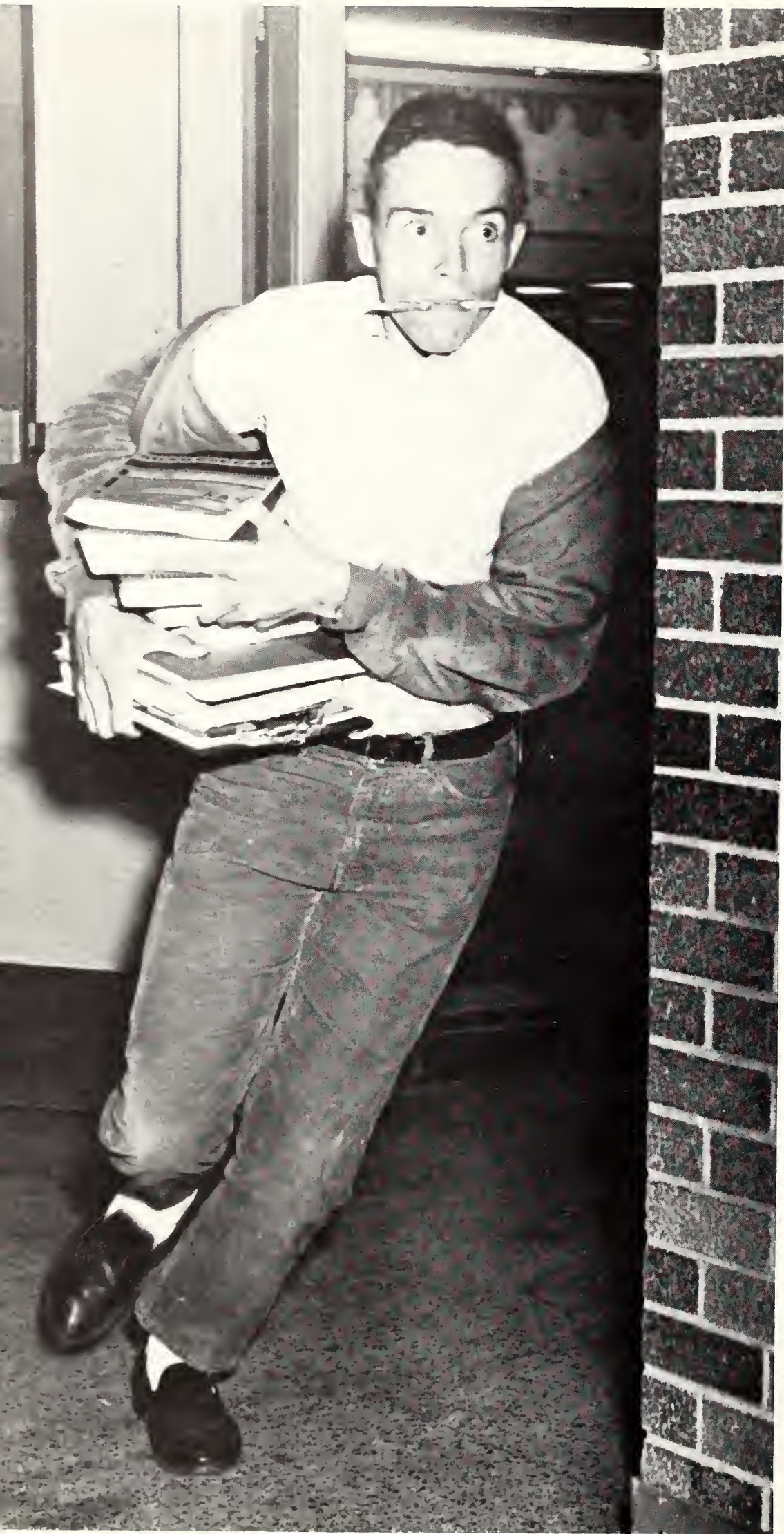




Form is the product of a definite design. Architects at ASC have been striving to give the campus a sense of unity. The master plan for the campus is coming to life, instead of being a distant goal. The campus is achieving symmetry. Definite plans for structure and similar designs are being used in the new buildings.

The forward progress of the campus is marked as each proposed change becomes a reality. Our growing campus has attained beauty with a definite character of its own. Form and structure are the physical properties that make the campus real and tangible. They are the only properties by which a campus visitor can judge ASC. Although additions will be made modern, many of the present structures will remain the same and will link the future college to the past college. In the fast-moving pace at ASC, the student can cling to the physical structures that tie in and make forward progress more acceptable.





Composition

is a requirement that any organization must have in order to function as a complete unit. Arlington State satisfies all the necessary demands of being a complete institution; but it also contains some outstanding attributes. Forty-one per cent of the entire faculty hold doctoral degrees and a majority of these are in the field of science. Students have created a composite of campus government, extracurricular activities, and academic responsibility. The enrollment indicates that approximately one-third of the students major in Business Administration, and one-fourth major in Engineering. Together, the students, faculty, and campus of Arlington State form a composition indicative of a growing college.

Movement

reflects the progress of an organism's growth. At first, slight and undetailed motions occur; but with maturity, dynamic gestures result. Arlington State College is following this same pattern of movement in becoming one of the largest colleges in Texas. The student body appears as the major portion of Arlington State's movement. Each dissected part of the campus functions with delicate and intense movement. Sometimes slow, sometimes tedious, sometimes rapid, and sometimes fun, the movement all has one result — a progressive college. Other activities such as dances, rush parties, bonfires, and social entertainment provide for the survival of movement. Each student activity appears as a basic part of the developing movement, while the campus as a whole performs the vivid and exact motions of a college on the move.



Growth

at ASC has been fantastic, among the fastest of any school in Texas. The college was founded in 1895 as Arlington College, a private institution, and had a succession of names until 1917 when it became state supported. ASC acquired senior college status in 1959.

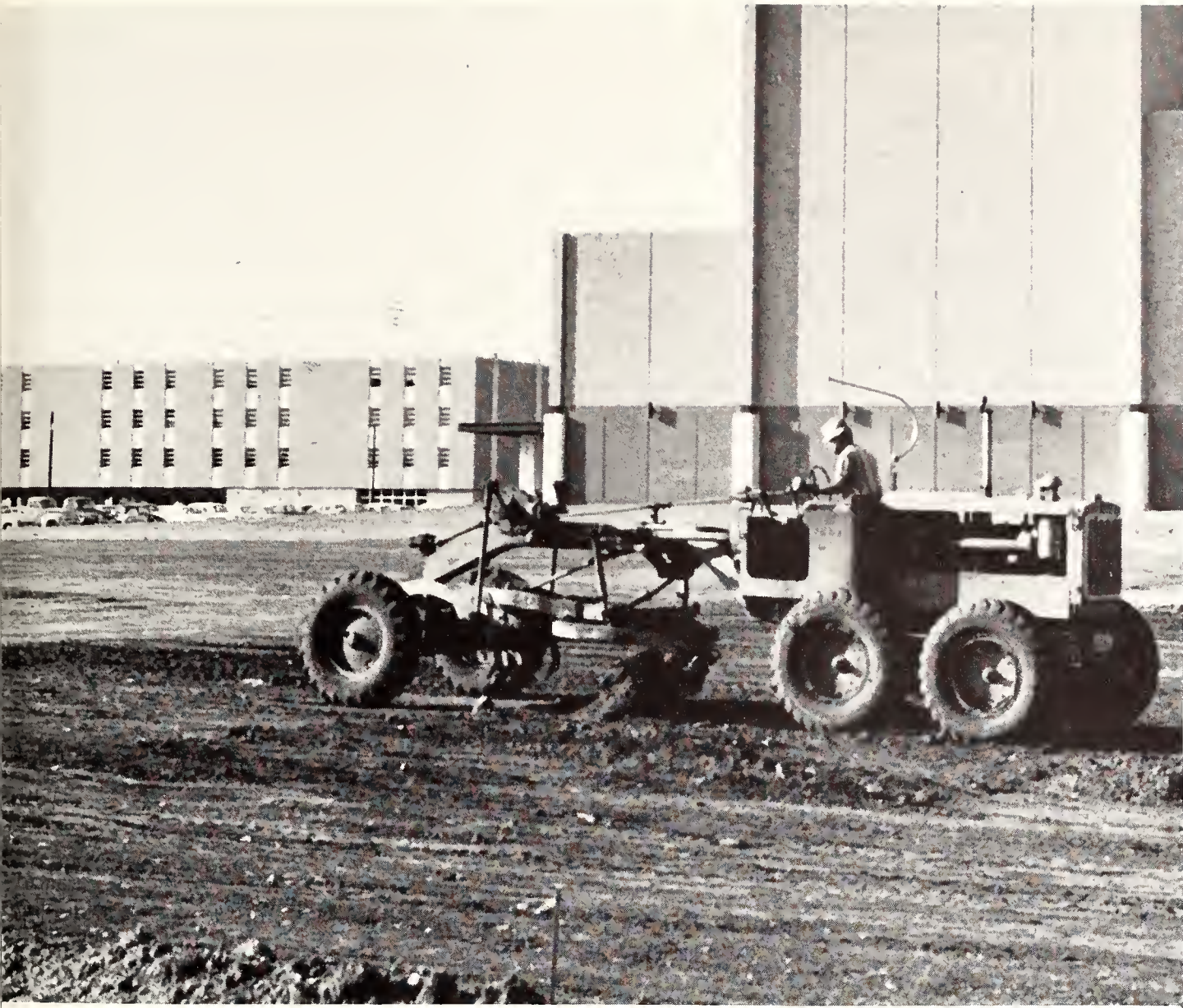
The government of the college was vested in the Texas A&M University System board of directors from 1923 to 1965. ASC finally severed its ties with Texas A&M in the spring of 1965 and became a member of the University of Texas System. This link has made Arlington State a part of a system regarded as one of the best in the nation.

Increasing prestige has resulted in greater enrollment. Soaring to 11,849 for the fall semester, the number of students this year has almost quadrupled that of a decade ago. The size of the faculty has

more than doubled since that time and now numbers over 350. A massive building program has been necessary to meet the needs of the exploding campus population. The campus now covers 200 acres of land. Facilities costing nearly \$3.5 million were completed in 1965 alone, bringing the total assets to over \$24 million. Included in these new projects were the multipurpose auditorium, a theater, a health center, an outdoor swimming pool, an athletic track and a building to serve as dressing rooms for athletic teams.

Expansion will be even greater in the future. Among the major projects planned, or already under construction, are a four-story addition to the library costing \$2.1 million, a \$1.4 million class-room building, a \$250,000 addition to the men's physical education building and a \$325,000 expansion of the campus power plant.







Energy is the force that activates students. Energy is displayed by individual students and by the entire college. Although academic pursuits consume much of the students' energy, the excess is devoted to a variety of activities including such special events as Homecoming, and day-to-day recreation in the student center. Participation by the whole student body in pep rallies and sports events provides an outlet for the energy of the group. The energy of ASC students is directed toward obtaining an education and building their college into one of spirit and movement.



Response is a reaction to stimulus. Instant response is the massing of ten thousand voices to a last-minute, game-winning touchdown, or the silence of sadness at the passing of a great man. It may be a sly whistle at a pretty girl or a thundering groan at the announcement of a pop quiz. Total response, however, is not as easily accomplished because it requires a unified effort. But once a college responds, it responds with body and spirit, sparing no energy. ASC exemplified this in the forming of the SOS Committee to separate Arlington from the Texas A&M System. Again the students responded, this time joyously, when their college became a part of the University of Texas System.



A Living College . . .

Arlington State College lives as a school with a spirit and a soul. As a relatively new school, it is startling people throughout the state with its rapid growth and its determination to overcome impending problems. The spirit of adventure and a feeling of vitality permeate every facet of ASC. No goal seems too great, no standard too high, no tradition too ambitious as Arlington State College, alert and responsive, moves toward the future.

The campus is an impressive symbol of the past and the future. Seemingly overnight, vacant lots are turned into new structures devoted to pursuit of the sciences and the arts. Some of the older buildings remain, but behind their aged facades there are new classrooms, new machinery — and that indefinable something, a new outlook, fresh ideas, and a new spirit of youth.

But the most impressive manifestation of the vitality and spirit of Arlington State College is the student body. Each student soon becomes aware of the ambitious goals of ASC and becomes aggressive himself. Each student realizes that progress is being made, and is himself overcome with the idea of progress. Each student is alert and responsive to the new adventure on the ASC campus. He willingly undertakes as his own goal the building of an institution that will present to future generations the image that it presents to this generation — that of a living college.

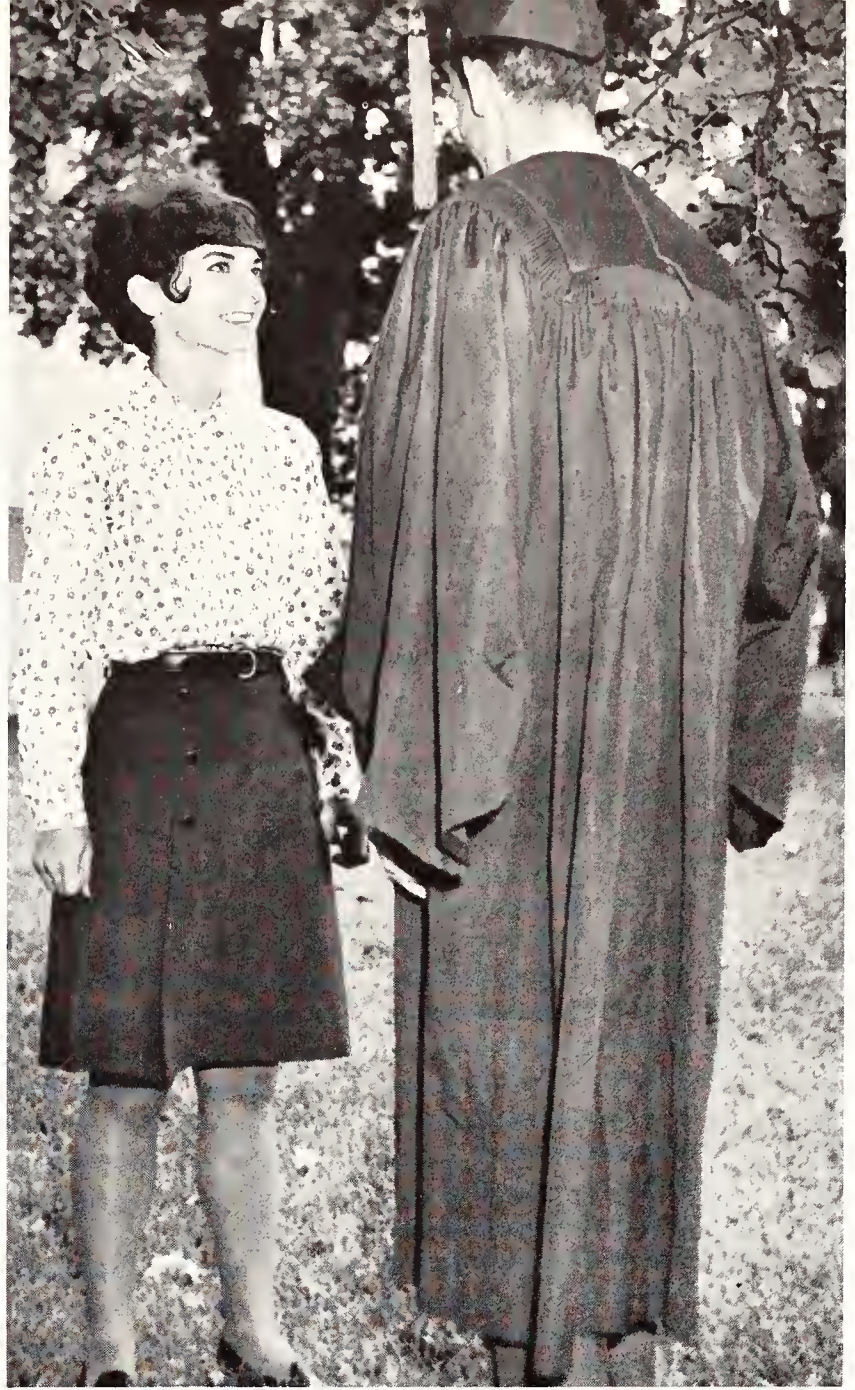
Diversified Forces Combine to Characterize a World In Itself

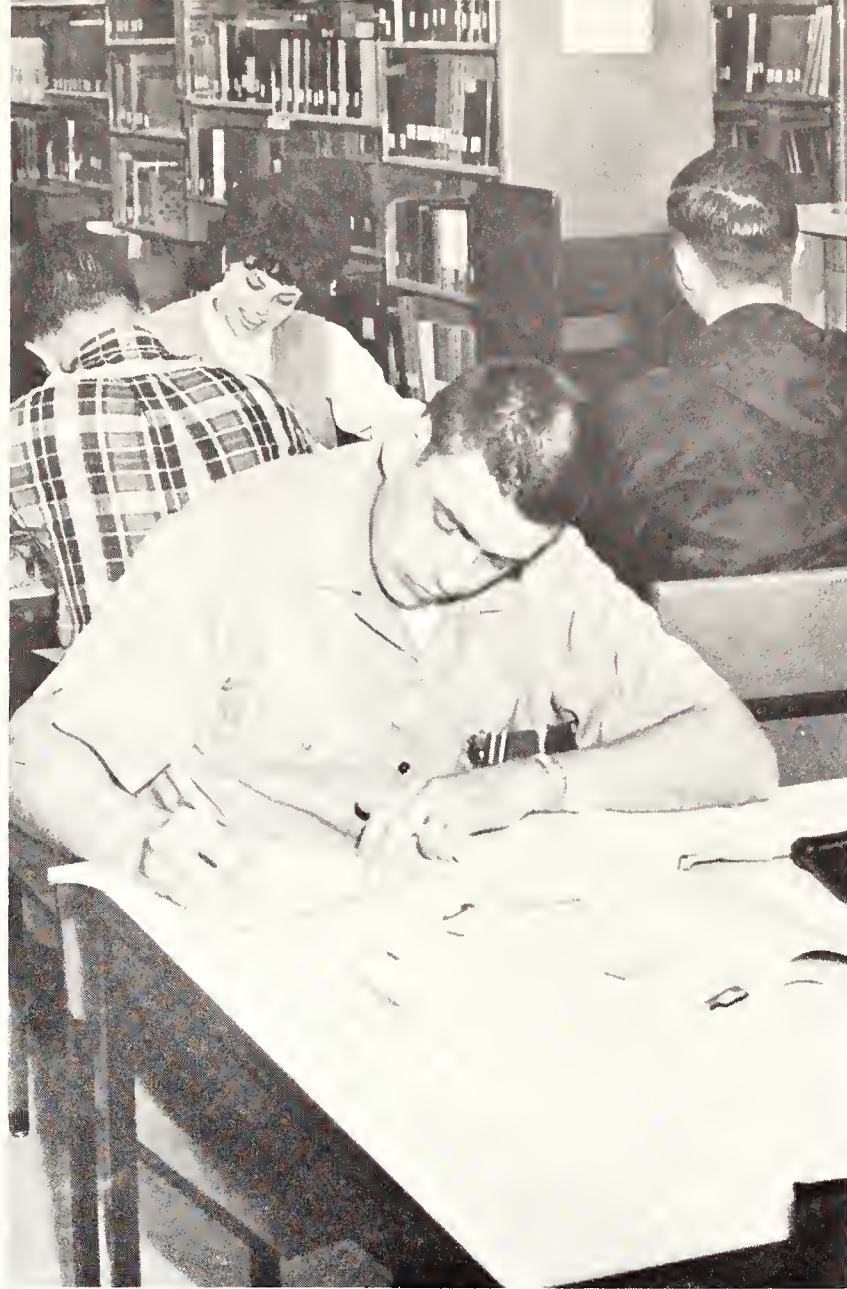




Progressive Changes Achieved In Library and IBM Processing

Library study and reference work will become more pleasant with the addition of four stories to the present building. Work began this year on the library, and the building should be completed before September, 1967. Three elevators will be installed for student use in the seven story structure. Library space has been a big problem at ASC, but with the new addition, ample space will be provided. The ground floor will be reorganized to include technical processes, a browsing area where the reserve room was, a larger reserve room, the circulation desk, and the card catalogue. Reference material and documents will be located on the second floor. Periodicals, study areas, and general reading will compose the third, fourth, and fifth floors. The sixth floor will contain special collections, archives, displays, and a large lecture room seating 100 persons. Audio-visual aids and possibly a snack bar will fill the basement. This addition, which will more than double the book capacity, is subsequent to last year's scrapping of the Dewey Decimal System for filing books. Under the new Library of Congress System, a letter rather than a number is used to signify the book's subject matter.

Another progressive change has taken place in the Data Processing Department. IBM computers process the records of almost 12,000 Arlington State College students each semester. Data Processing maintains the addresses of all students and produces all class rolls and teacher, student, and class schedules. It also processes the annual budget and a fee audit and runs a special report on student credit hours. During the fall a new IBM academic process was developed whereby the student's standing is evaluated on his overall academic performance.





Commuters and Night Students Comprise Majority of Enrollment

Commuters from Dallas, Fort Worth, Arlington and surrounding areas constitute about 89 per cent of the students at Arlington State. Since such a vast majority of students are commuters, they play a large part in determining the atmosphere of the college. Students find it less expensive to attend college while living at home. The parking facilities that surround the campus are a characteristic of ASC. Approximately 8,000 parking permits were issued for the fall semester to students who commute.

Equally important to ASC are the night students, who number 2,868. Most of the students work during the day. Many are married. Ling-Temco-Vought employs math, science, and engineering students in their co-op program, and these young men and women take night courses at ASC. Most are serious-minded students striving to achieve an academic goal.

Commuters and night students play a major role in ASC, and they will continue to do so. ASC fills their needs and provides the opportunity for education to many who would not have the opportunity otherwise. The college is the unifying factor for these people of diverse backgrounds; it draws them together in their struggle to comply with the high standards set by ASC.



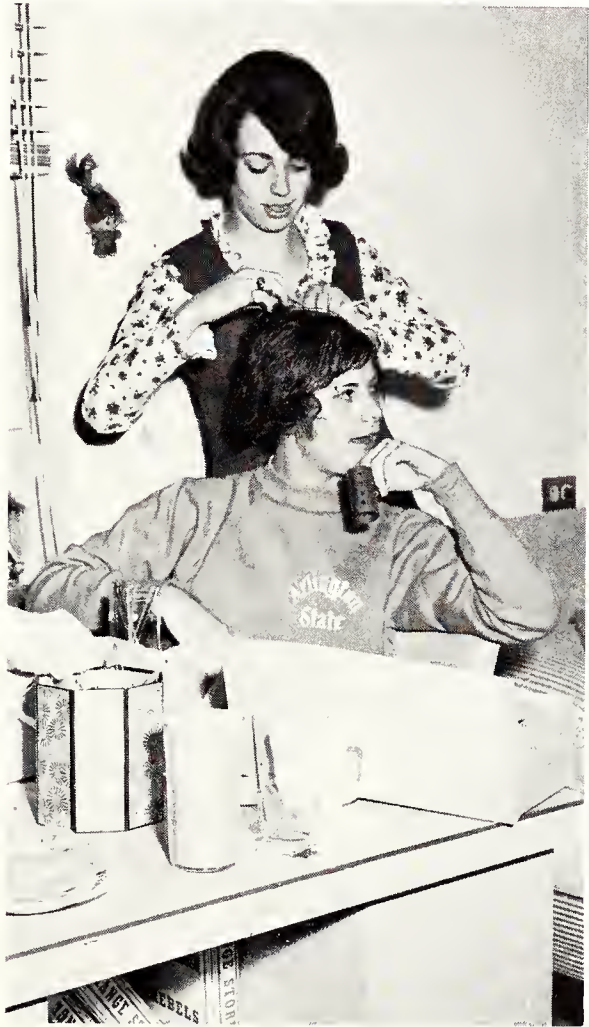
Dormitories Provide On-Campus Housing for 871 ASC Students

Dorm life at Arlington State involves 871 students. The girl's dormitory, Lipscomb Hall, houses approximately 340 women. Mrs. Lera Hancock, Dean of Women, is director of women's residence affairs.

Pachl Hall, Davis Hall, and Trinity House, the three men's dorms, house approximately 531 men. Marion Jacob is director of men's residence affairs. The dormitory directors are aided by dorm mothers and by student counselors.

Dormitory rooms are well-lighted and provide adequate study facilities. Space for group study is also provided. Snack bars as well as TV and lounge areas are located in the dorms.





ASC Complements Opportunities Of Fort Worth - Dallas Region

Arlington is the focal point of a great metropolitan area which includes Dallas and Fort Worth.

ASC satisfies the need of this great industrial area for a progressive college. Graduates of ASC find many job opportunities awaiting them. Industrial firms in the area have programs enabling men and women to work and attend school either alternately or simultaneously. ASC and the Dallas-Fort Worth area greatly complement each other. ASC provides a continual flow of well-trained individuals who are prepared to enter the professional world. Both cities make use of the college; and the opportunities afforded students, both occupationally and socially, are greatly increased by the cities.

Dallas and Fort Worth provide many social activities which are enjoyed by ASC students. Casa Manana and the Dallas Theatre Center are cultural centers for residents of Dallas, Fort Worth, and Arlington. The Dallas Symphony Orchestra is a nationally prominent organization. Arlington was chosen as the site of Turnpike Stadium, the home of the Dallas-Fort Worth Spurs. Six Flags Over Texas, a national tourist attraction, employs many ASC students and provides exciting entertainment.

Dallas and Fort Worth have shown their appreciation of ASC by giving their support to the college. The cities are a challenge to the college, which must keep pace or become useless. When progress is made by the college, the cities benefit, and achievements by the cities contribute to the college. Dallas and Fort Worth are progressive cities, and ASC is striving to maintain its position of importance in the overall picture of a modern area.

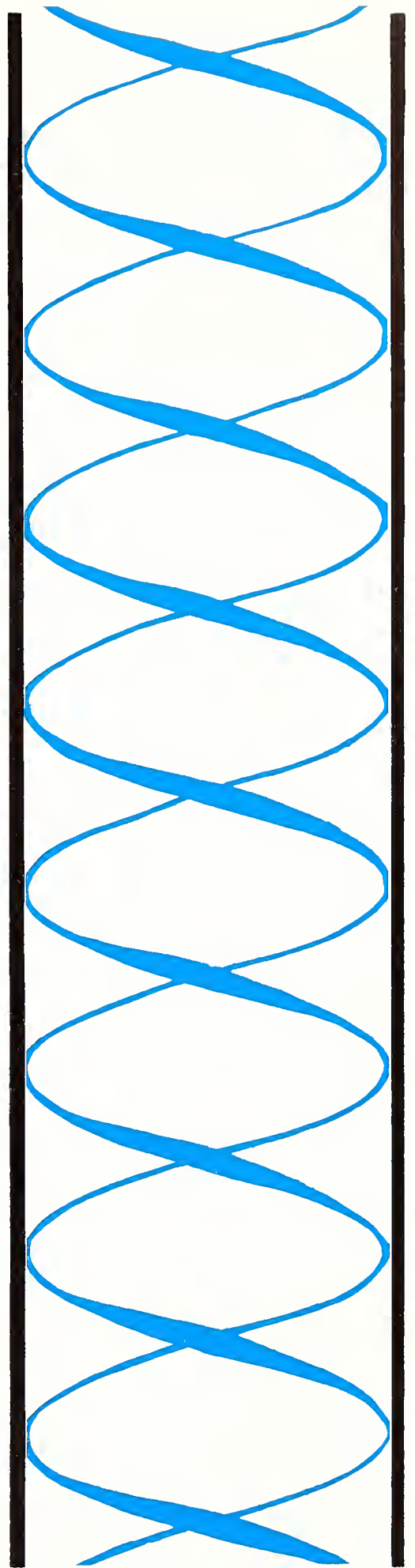

Texas System Provides Chance For Reorganization, Expansion

In addition to the enrollment and structural growth of Arlington State College, the organization of schools within the college has undergone considerable change. This revision occurred for several reasons. First, it resulted from the growth of the School of Liberal Arts, which has doubled over the last five years. Second, it arose from the need for a School of Business Administration to meet the requirements of students majoring in business or economics. This group involves over one-third of the students at ASC. The re-division has been triggered by the plans for a graduate school. Probably more prominent was the purpose of providing a somewhat better administrative arrangement.

Under the new system, Arlington State maintains four schools, the School of Liberal Arts, the School of Business Administration, the School of Engineering, and the School of Sciences. Former head of the Department of Business, Wallace B. Nelson, was made Dean of the School of Business Administration, which offers degrees in business and economics. Dean of Engineering is Wendle Nedderman, who has been head of that department for six years. Allen J. Herndon is acting Dean of both Liberal Arts and Sciences until a permanent dean for each of these divisions is selected. The School of Liberal Arts now includes the departments of English, Education, Foreign Language, History, Government, Sociology, Art, Music, Psychology, Physical Education, and Military Science. The School of Sciences is made up of the Biology, Chemistry, Geology, Mathematics, and Physics Departments.





President Jack R. Woolf

Dr. Jack R. Woolf is serving his fifth year as president of Arlington State College. Before coming to ASC, he served as Assistant to the Dean of Engineering at Texas A&M. The President left his duties at A&M in 1957 and came to ASC as a dean of the college. Inaugurated on February 27, 1960, Dr. Woolf had been acting in the president's capacity since November, 1958.

As director of ASC's policy, he is responsible for the operations and activities of the school. It is also his re-

sponsibility to determine policy within the college and to formulate the annual budget. Dr. Woolf is chairman of both the College Executive Committee and the Academic Council.

Dr. Woolf reflects the progressive movement of Arlington State College. He was named "Young Man of the Year" for 1960 by the Arlington Junior Chamber of Commerce and "Engineer of the Year" for 1961 by the Tarrant County Chapter of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers.

Board of Regents Coordinates University of Texas System

Second-largest school in the University of Texas System is Arlington State College. As the youngest member in the system, ASC was new to be governed by the nine-member Board of Regents. The board members, nominated by the governor with the advice and consent of the Texas Senate, serve six-year terms. Their staggered terms allow three new members to be nominated every two years.

Heading the Board in his second term as Chairman was W. W. Heath of Austin; vice chairman was Frank C. Erwin, Jr. of Waco. Walter P. Brenan of San Antonio was chairman of the Executive Committee; Mrs. J. Lee Johnson III of Fort Worth, chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee; Dr. H. F. Connally, Jr. of Waco, chairman of the Medical Affairs Committee; Mr. Erwin, chairman of the Land and Investment Committee; Rabbi Levi A. Olan of Dallas, chairman of the Academic and Development Committee. Other regents were Frank Ikard of Wichita Falls, Jack S. Josey of Houston, and William H. Bauer of Port Lavaca.

This Board is responsible for spending over \$100 million each year for the operation of the UT System. They determine all policies of the system, ranging from equipment purchases to curriculum decisions.

RESEARCH

Research

MRS. SIMONE TURBEVILLE and MRS. BOBBIE SIMMS of the English Department are cooperating in the translation of an Italian novel, *Paolo Il Caldo*. This novel by Vitaliano Brancati was first published in 1956 in Italian and has never been translated to English.

Mrs. Turbeville is translating the work from Italian to English and Mrs. Simms is rewriting in order to preserve the style of the author. They plan to finish the translation before the end of the spring semester. The pair would like to publish this work and continue to translate contemporary Italian novels and other relatively important prose.

DR. J. J. HAYNES of the Civil Engineering Department is involved in research concerning the digital computer simulation of traffic flow. Many specific problems involving traffic operations may be studied by means of this simulation program that could not be studied by any other means. DR. JAMES CAFEY is studying the development of adequate historic records of precipitation, river-flows, evaporation and other hydrologic variables, necessary for subsequent hydrology research. It is proposed that this data will be assembled for the five states of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, and New Mexico. This data will be ultimately stored on an IBM disc storage pack for more efficient use of the digital computer in future hydrologic analysis. The aim of the initial analysis will be to determine the character of interstation correlations between annual precipitation and annual river flows.

DR. CLIFFORD W. RANDALL of the Civil Engineering Department is doing research into the pathogenic micro-organisms emitted from activated sludge units, particularly viruses. It is further to be extended to a study of respiratory diseases among waste water treatment plant operators. The cities of Austin and San Antonio are of prime interest because correlations can be made with experimental work already being conducted in these two cities.

DR. RICHARD TUCKER of the Department of Civil Engineering has been researching since 1962 in the fields of foundations and structures, utilizing principles of numerical analysis and computer techniques. His research has included five projects. The first of these has been the development of a digital computer program for the solution of beam-columns under dynamic conditions such as those due to earthquakes or nuclear blasts. Second is the establishment of techniques for the preparation of large saturated homogeneous soil samples suitable for closely controlled model studies. Third is the creation of an interactive procedure for analysis of fabric wings for re-entry vehicles. A fourth area concerns the development of a direct numerical procedure for solving highway bridge girder-diaphragm systems. His fifth project, sponsored by General Dynamics and almost completed, is a study of three-dimensional solid structure analysis techniques, using physical element concepts.

Dr. Tucker is assisted in his present research efforts by four undergraduate students. The experience gained from this research provides these aides with a useful background for both graduate work and practical application. Student assistants have been highly sought after by graduate schools and have received teaching assistantships, research assistantships, and fellowships, due partly to the research experience gained as undergraduates.

DR. JOHN A. STUART, Associate Professor of French, is preparing an edition of the correspondence of the French painter and writer Emile Bernard with Milos Martin, literary critic. Emile Bernard was a close friend of Vincent Van Gogh, Paul Gauguin, Paul Cezanne, and Toulouse-Lautrec. Having arranged the first exhibit of Van Gogh's paintings, Bernard was partially responsible for world recognition of the Dutch artist. He was himself considered one of the founders of the modern trend of symbolism in painting.

Containing some 100 pieces of Bernard-Marten correspondence, the edition covers the period of 1908-1914. Dr. Stuart corresponded with Bernard's son-in-law and the widow of Marten to obtain the valuable letters and notes needed for his book. The edition, under the supervision of the University of Paris, will be fully commentated and annotated and will include reproductions of many of the paintings mentioned in the letters and notes of the two men. Dr. Stuart, in fact, has three of Bernard's original wood cuts and several reproductions of his paintings.

DR. JAMES L. WYATT is currently involved in comparing English and Portuguese syntax, making use of an electronic computer located at Texas A&M. The computer provides him with sentences for study and analysis in Portuguese and English. The electronic device is able to randomly produce simple and complicated sentences in the two languages by means of a descriptive grammar programmed for the computer. The computer's output is used to validate the descriptive grammar. The purpose of Dr. Wyatt's research is to devise an essentially complete and valid bi-lingual generative-transformational grammar which could be used as a basis of an automatic machine translation program or for the production of pedagogical materials.

Dr. Wyatt has been working on this project for four years and expects to continue his research and programming for an additional two years. He has already put in about 4,500 hours on this project. Dr. Wyatt became interested in this material because of his residence in Brazil, where he was Assistant Cultural Attaché to the American Embassy in Rio de Janeiro. A book manuscript is now being studied by a publisher, and several papers have been derived from his research.

MRS. BERTIE ACKARD, Assistant Professor of Spanish, is preparing a dissertation dealing with the contemporary Mexican short story. The research involves exploring the new trends in Spanish prose by analyzing the works of current leading Spanish writers such as Juan Rose Arreola, Juan Rulfo, Carlos Fuentes, Guadalupe Amor, Guadalupe Duenas, Emma Dourjanoff, Rosario Castellanos, and Juan de la Cabada.

BLAINE T. WILLIAMS of the Sociology Department is involved in a research project entitled "Why Dallas: The Origin of a City." His book will explain the phenomenal growth of Dallas, a city which has defied all the standard explanations of urban location. According to Mr. Williams, there are three standard reasons for any city's growth into a metropolis: (1) a break in transportation, (2) natural resources, or (3) a cultural capacity. The fact that Dallas had none of these specifications and is still one of the 34 leading metropolises of the world has compelled Mr. Williams to write this comprehensive study of urban sociology.

Mr. Williams maintains that the key to the growth of Dallas lies in its leadership. After searching through record after record and transferring the data to IBM cards, the sociology professor has found that Dallas' first settlers were men of means, courage, and experience in municipal government. Through the years, the continued leadership affected the city's growth. A&M has offered the services of its 7070 computer to Mr. Williams for the completion of his data from which he will draw his final conclusions. The professor hopes to finish his 200-page book by the end of this semester after three years of research.

DR. CARTER E. BOREN of the History, Government, and Sociology Department is engaged in several research efforts. He has just recently completed a four-year project entitled *The Democracy of Religion in Texas*. His manuscript shows the relationship of the Texas frontier to the development of religious thought and practices in the American religious movement. Dr. Boren maintains that the frontier was a major force in shaping radical religious doctrines. The account is written against the background of national issues and thought, and the color, character, and social patterns of the Texas-Southwest environment. Acknowledgment has already been given by scholars in

this field that the manuscript is "a model for future historians."

In connection with his second book, concerning the lives and thoughts of philosophers, Dr. Boren traveled to Greece this past summer and did special research at an archaeological museum in Corinth. His trip and subsequent research was sponsored by the University of Chicago. Dr. Boren also published two articles in *ERA*, a journal of philosophical and intellectual ideas: "The Greek Ethic" in the December, 1965, issue and "Aristippus: The Philosophy of Pleasure" in the January, 1966, issue.

Several other members of the Department of History, Government, and Sociology are currently engaged in research. DR. W. H. DROZE, Assistant Professor of History, has just published a book entitled *High Dams and Slack Waters: TVA Rebuilds a River* (Baton Rouge, LSU Press, 1965.) and is writing another dealing with the TVA flood control program. DR. EGAL FIELDMAN, Assistant Professor of History, is completing a book entitled *Anti-nativism in American Life* dealing with the attitude of progressives toward minority groups. DR. WILL HOLMES, Assistant Professor of History, is completing a biography of James K. Vardaman of Mississippi. DR. ROY N. LOKKEN, Assistant Professor of History, is writing a biography of James Logan, a leading Pennsylvania Quaker during the colonial period, part of which will appear in print as an essay shortly. STEPHEN B. OATES, Instructor of History, is preparing a narrative history of the Southwest and editing the diaries of William Pitt Balinger. Mr. Oates has published numerous articles dealing with the Southwest and the Civil War. DR. GEORGE WOLFSKILL, Professor of History, has just completed *All But the People: Franklin Roosevelt and His Critics, 1933-1939*, and is awaiting a publishers contract. He has also begun a new book, to be entitled *The New Deal and the South*.

DUANE R. MARTIN, Psychology instructor, is presently engaged in research in the area of verbal behavior and psycholinguistics. He is interested in how people learn and utilize the grammar of their language and how grammatical patterns help people understand things they have never heard before and generate sentences never spoken before.

Mr. Martin's research will include grammar development in children and experiences that produce grammatical behavior. By setting up analogical forms of language with grammatical bases he tries to see what subjects will generate. In doing this he hopes to gain information about how grammatical placement of new vocabulary words is determined by a person.

MR. DAVID R. FALCONER, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, is conducting an investigation of methods for generating random matrices in the field of statistics and numerical analysis. He is programming the computer at ASC with his research. With the completion of his effort, experiments in genetics, electrical engineering, and other fields, may be simulated that would otherwise take years to complete by standard laboratory methods. His research and programming, which has taken him more than a year to finish, is an extension of his work for a Ph.D. to be awarded in June.

Several other members of the Mathematics Department are currently engaged in research. LARRY HEATH is doing research in non-rational meromorphic functions in the plane with particular interest in improving Hayman work. C. W. LEININGER is engaged in three projects, including extensions of Hausdorff Summability, properties of ordered sets, and ordered semigroups with zero elements. RICHARD MITCHELL and ROGER MITCHELL are both investigating infinite Abelian groups. ROBERT TENNISON is investigating the conjecture, "Can a semi-circle of diameter be inscribed in every curve of constant width d ?" D. R. STOCKS is doing research in fundamental graph theory.

DR. I. I. GHURANI, Assistant Professor of Economics, is now preparing a proposal for three case studies involving the United Arab Republic, Iraq, and Kuwait.

The purpose is to examine the effectiveness of manpower programs in these three Middle Eastern countries, as is evidenced by the substantive provisions of the laws of these countries, and by their recent practices and experiences in the field of economic development.

Dr. Ghurani hopes to spend some time in these three countries in order to collect the necessary data.

Several other members of the School of Business are presently engaged in research. DR. S. COMITINI is writing a manuscript for an article analyzing cost and earning in the Pacific Halibut Fishery. DR. L. H. SMITH is working on a manuscript for an article entitled "Application of Linear Estimation of Activation Analysis, A Chemical Mixture Problem." A conceptual analysis of accounting's basic postulates is the subject of a manuscript being written by MR. H. J. SNAVELY.

DR. FLOYD L. CASH has been collaborating with DR. A. E. SALIS, head of the Department of Electrical Engineering, on the development of an antenna and reflectivity range located on a 40-acre track of the old ASC farm just west of the main campus. Although the range is used for laboratory instruction, research projects by departmental faculty members share the facility and its equipment. Because of the similar nature of the equipment requirements, experimental studies in such fields as radio wave propagation, radar reflection measurements, and antenna characteristics can all be undertaken at the new range. At present the range is being used as the location of receiving antennas to allow the study of the characteristics of radio waves that have been propagated over various types of atmospheric paths.

Dr. Salis started the program while at Texas A&M correlating studies between the strengths of radio signals received from very distant radio stations and observable meteorological occurrences. With the development of the antenna and reflectivity range at ASC, the two professors are attempting to extend the original work to higher frequencies and to increase the scope of the investigation by recording the signals received both from fixed location transmitters and from transmitters located on moving platforms such as aircraft, missiles, or satellites.

DR. MO-SHING CHEN of the Department of Electrical Engineering is involved in research vitally connected with the power failure of the New England area. His project is concerned with transient phenomena in electrical power systems. Because a big electric system has many generators and covers a very large area, it is not uncommon for natural interferences to produce transient problems. Dr. Chen is trying to develop some kind of method to study more accurately these natural factors and their results on the power systems. Then, with his research data, he is designing generators and transmission lines which will automatically control these phenomena.

A member of Eta Kappa Nu, IEEE, and Tau Beta Pi, Dr. Chen is working as a consultant to the United States Bureau of Reclamation in this effort. The Bureau is trying to develop an extra high voltage system and later unite the area from New York to Los Angeles under the Inter-Connected System. Three articles related to his research have been published on the *IEEE Transactions*, and an additional three in the *Southwest Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers Conference*. Dr. Chen is writing a proposal to the National Science Foundation in the hope that it will provide him with a research grant.

DR. JOHN McCONNELL, also of the Electrical Engineering Department, has been working with Texas Instruments in the Semiconductor-Components Division. He has designed and built a pattern classifier which utilizes a new adaptive weight element. The new semiconductor element has been recently developed and is thought to have widespread potential use in various types of adaptive electrical systems in the future. Dr. McConnell began this project in the early part of last summer.

DR. THOMAS R. HELLIER, Assistant Professor of Biology, is conducting research on native fish population such as laboratory studies of growth rate related to food intake. He intends to compare this data with information concerning the growth of fishes and available food in area lakes. In addition, Dr. Hellier is developing closely inbred strains of a small native fish called the "mosquitofish" (similar to the guppy) for later studies in fish genetics. Laboratory research in cooperation with Dr. Robert Boley, a bacteriologist in the Department, is being conducted on bacterial parasites of native fishes in an effort to discover the incidence of these parasites in natural fish stocks. Dr. Hellier has published several papers on his previous work with fishes.

DR. WILLIAM B. McCRADY, Assistant Professor of Biology, is conducting research with carbon dioxide sensitivity in the fruit fly. He is principally interested in a virus which proves fatal to its carrier when exposed to carbon dioxide. While researching for his doctorate at the University of Nebraska, Dr. McCrady discovered that the *Drosophila melanogaster* carries a virus that causes a delayed recovery from carbon dioxide exposure. After much research, he found that the virus becomes prolific if the fly has a certain gene, the *Dey* gene. Dr. McCrady believes that there is some casual relationship in the gene and the virus. His past research has done much to affirm his hypothesis that the fruit fly's virus, which causes carbon dioxide sensitivity, and the gene are one and the same.

DR. CLARENCE C. HALL, Associate Professor of Biology, is publishing a book called *Eriophyidae of Kansas*. He began the research in 1952 on mites damaging wheat products in Kansas. Primarily interested in their life cycle, he has found that these plant feeders transmit a virus to their host. The virus disease, present in the Eriophyidae's digestive system, is spread by three species of mites: wheat streak, peach mosiac, and fig mosiac. Dr. Hall has described 50 new species. To do this, he had to first catalog all 25,000 known species of mites, including 1,000 Eriophyid mites.

A 10-year effort, *Eriophyidae of Kansas* will be completed within three months. Dr. Hall's project is a revision of the research conducted for his Doctor's degree received from the University of Kansas. Aside from his book manuscript, Dr. Hall has also published an article in the *Kansas Science Bulletin* regarding the Eriophyidae family of mites.

Several other members of the Biology Department are currently engaged in research. DR. LOUIS H. BRAGG is investigating chromatographic patterns of phenolic and amino acid compounds in selected grass taxa and in *Prosopis* species. DR. JAMES K. BUTLER is doing research in the minute structure and chemical composition of various cells in pill bugs and robber flies. DR. THOMAS E. KENNERLY is researching the moult pattern in *Perognathus* and the homing instinct and new burrow construction in *Geomys*. DR. W. F. PYBURN is studying the behavior, development, and taxonomic relationships of Mexican hyloid frogs.

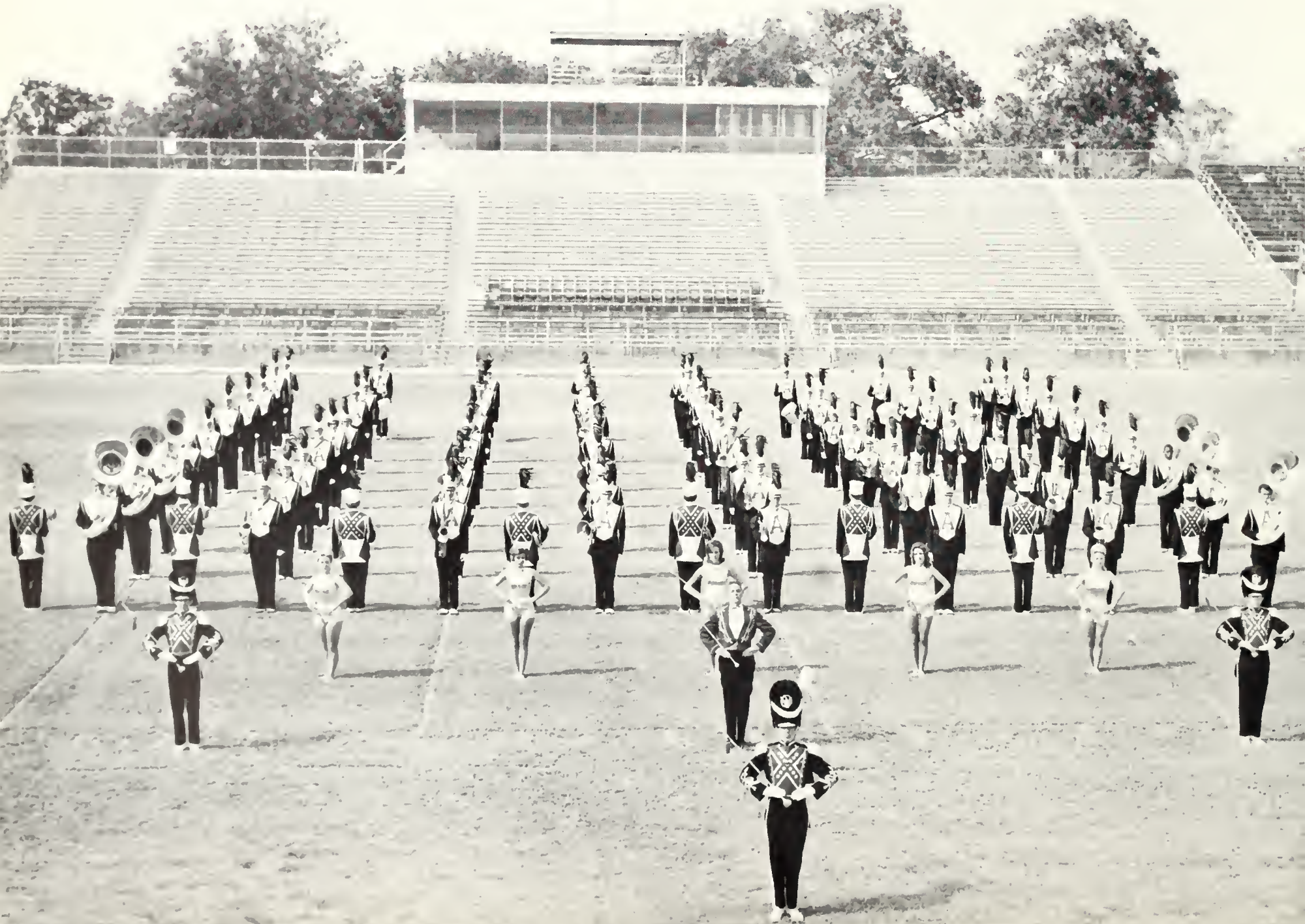

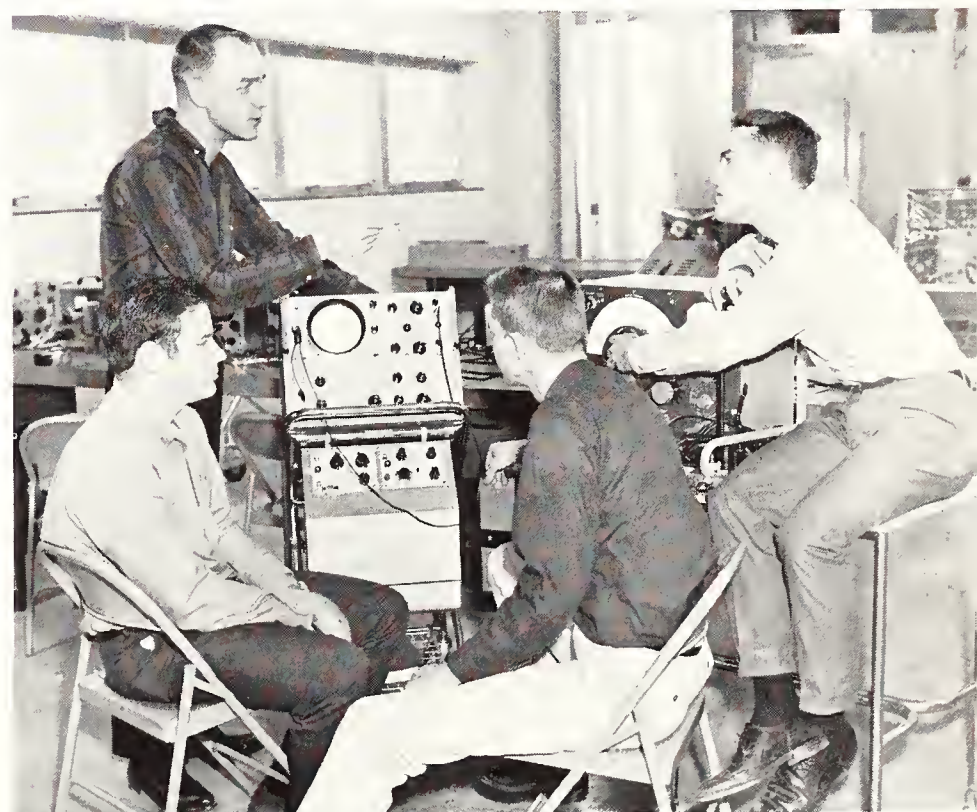

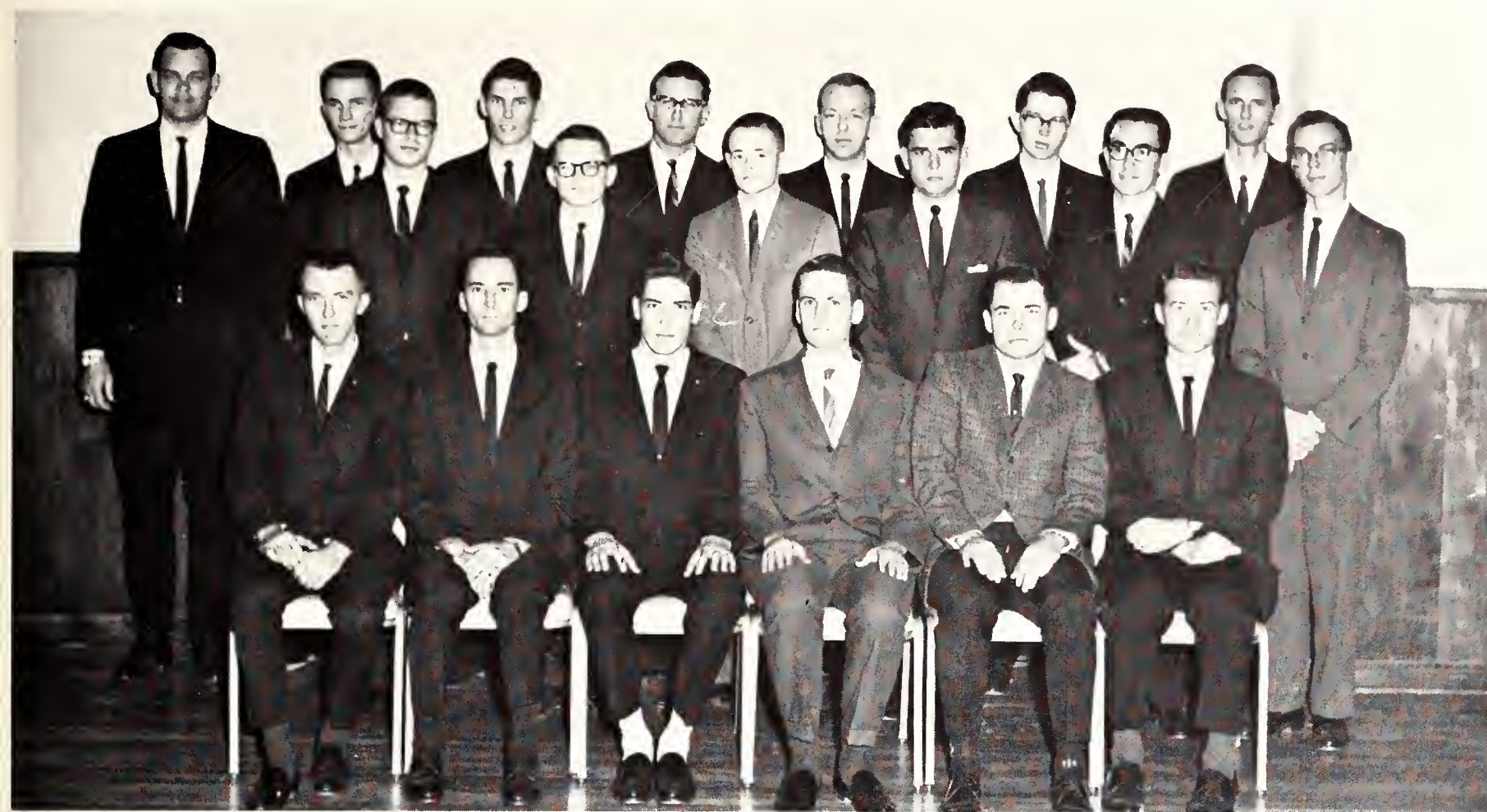

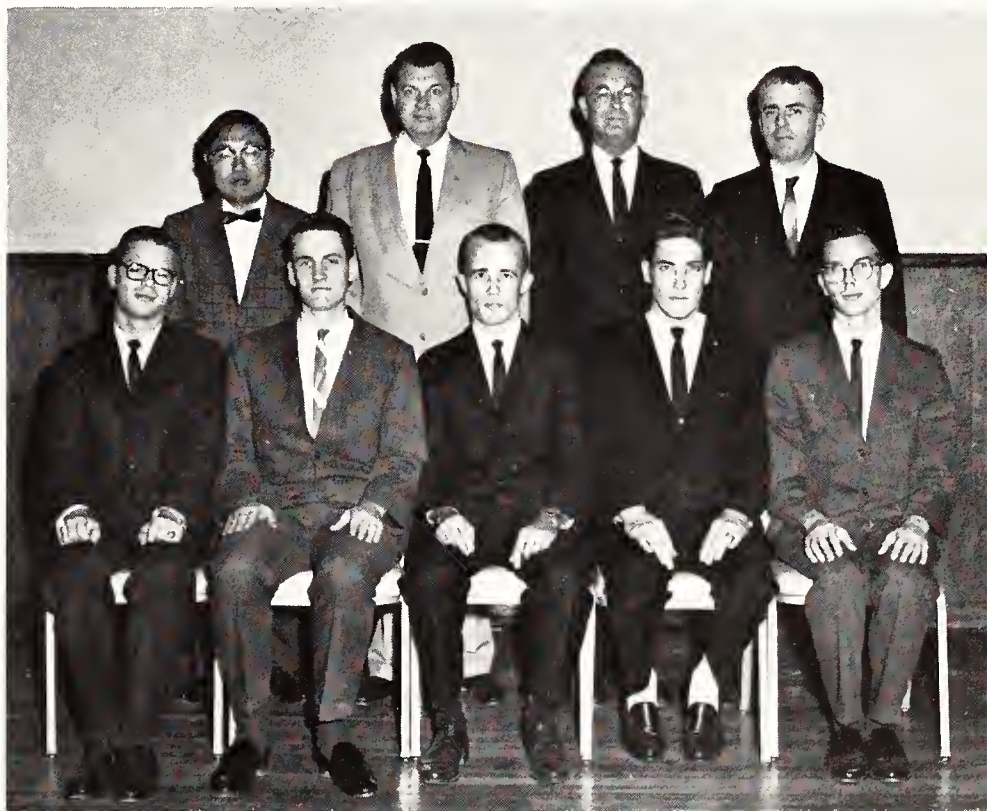

Delta Sigma Pi

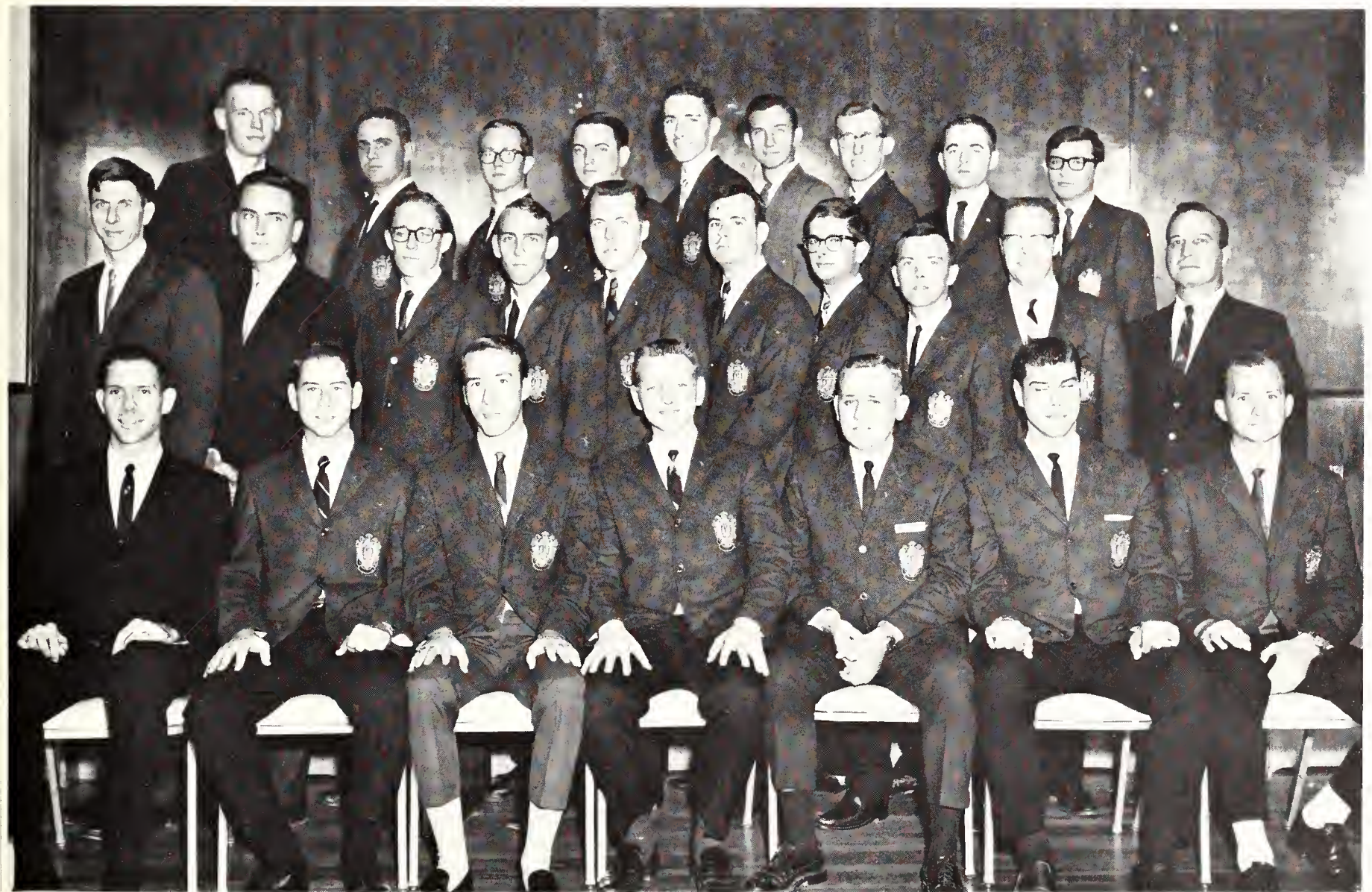

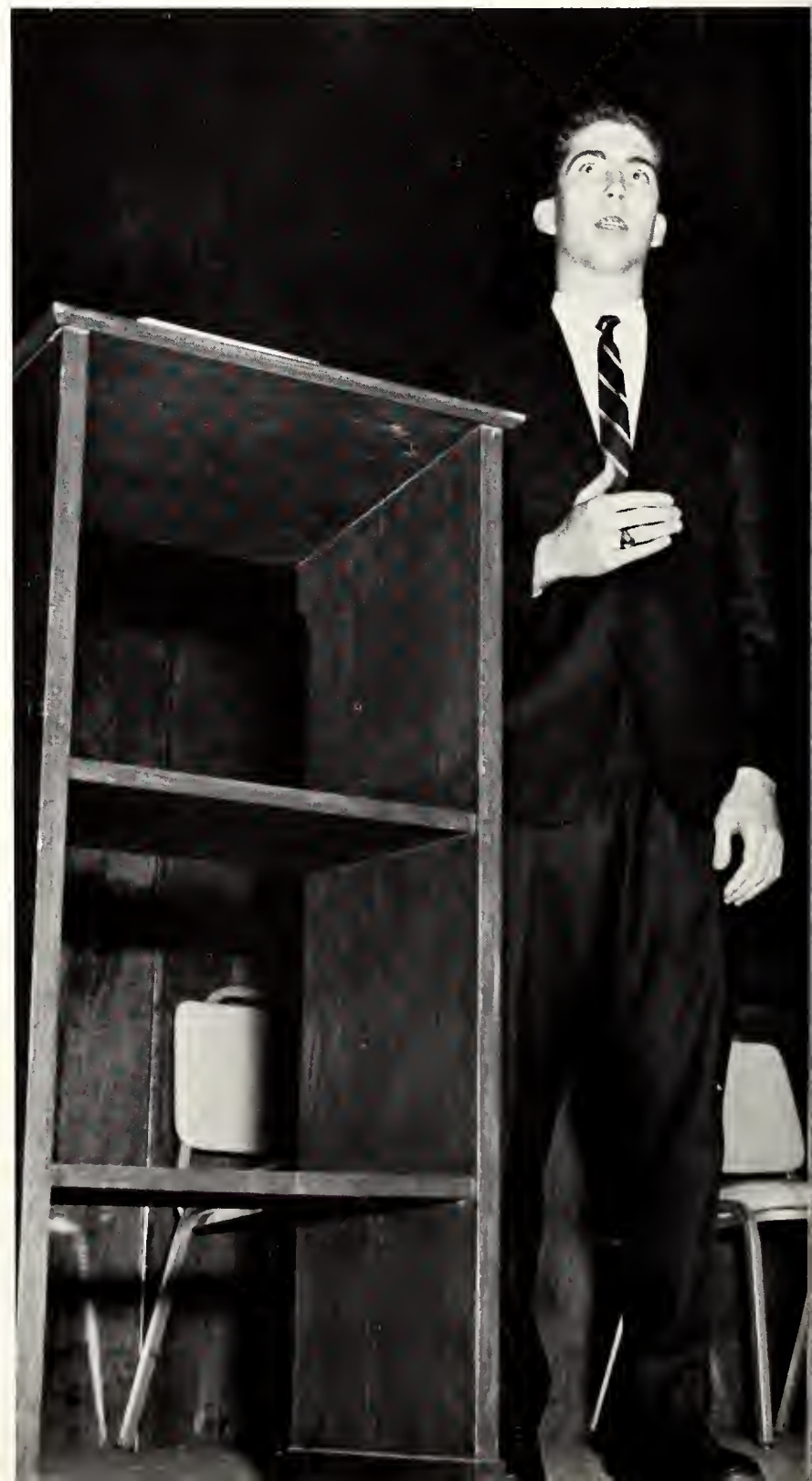

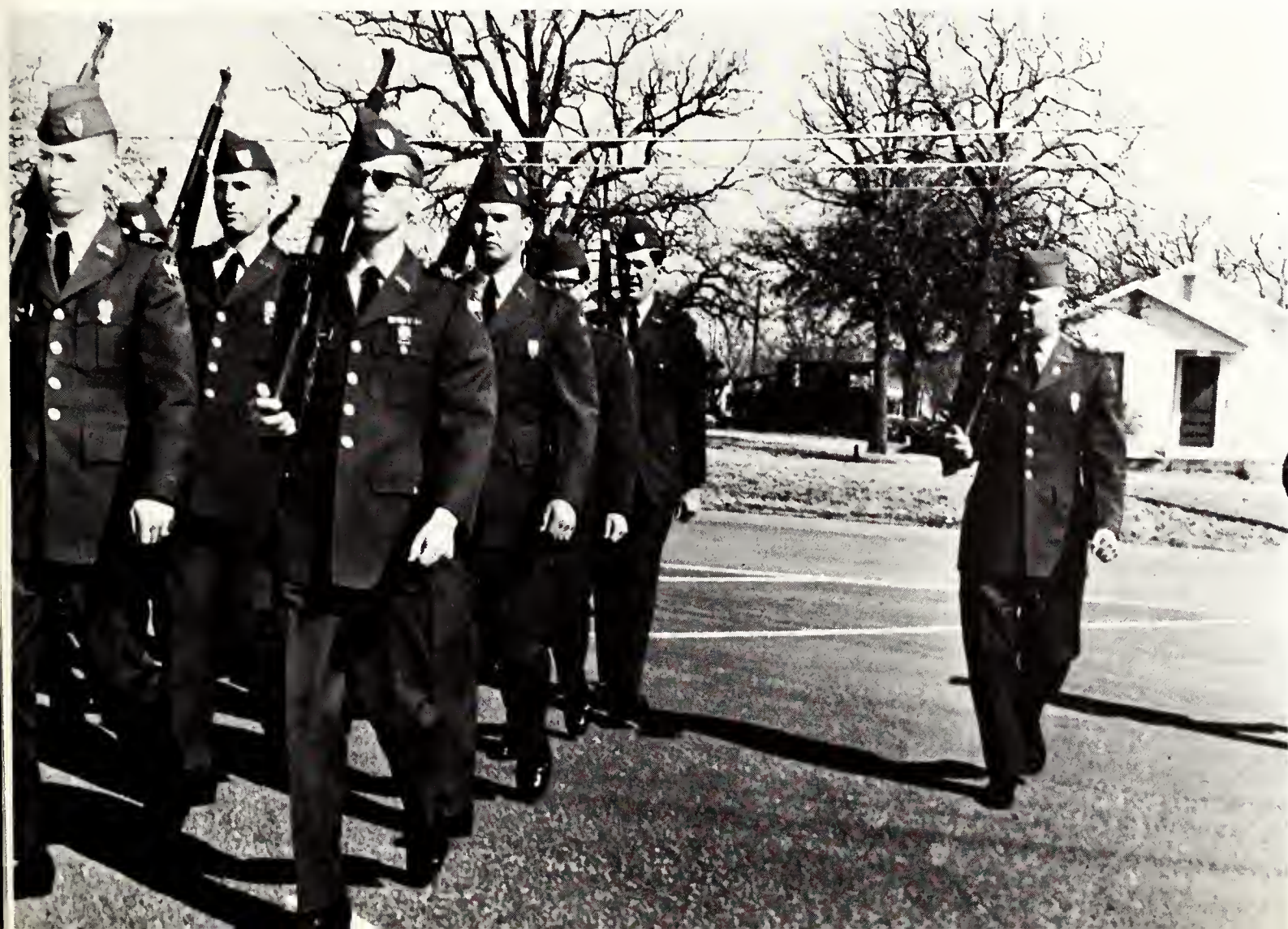
Military Science

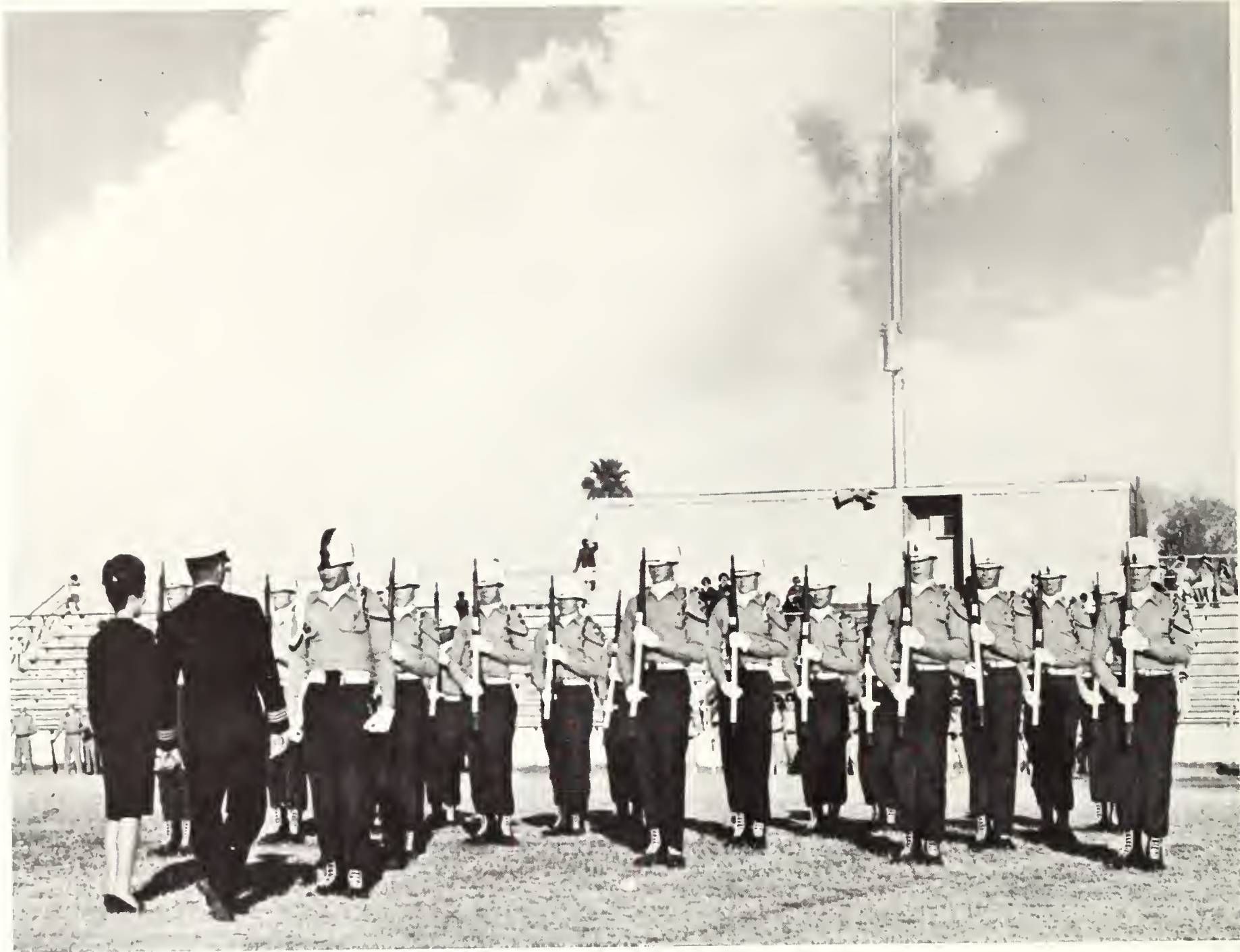
The ROTC program at Arlington State College consists of both classroom instruction and experience in actual military situations. Through this program, the student is prepared to be a lieutenant in the U.S. Army upon graduation.

In the classroom the cadet is instructed in such subjects as military history, the organization of the army, administration, military law, and logistics. While he is in the classroom, the cadet is expected to conduct himself in a military manner.

Then, for one hour per week, the cadet attends Leadership Laboratory which is designed to acquaint him with an actual military situation. During this time, he participates in active drill and training exercises.

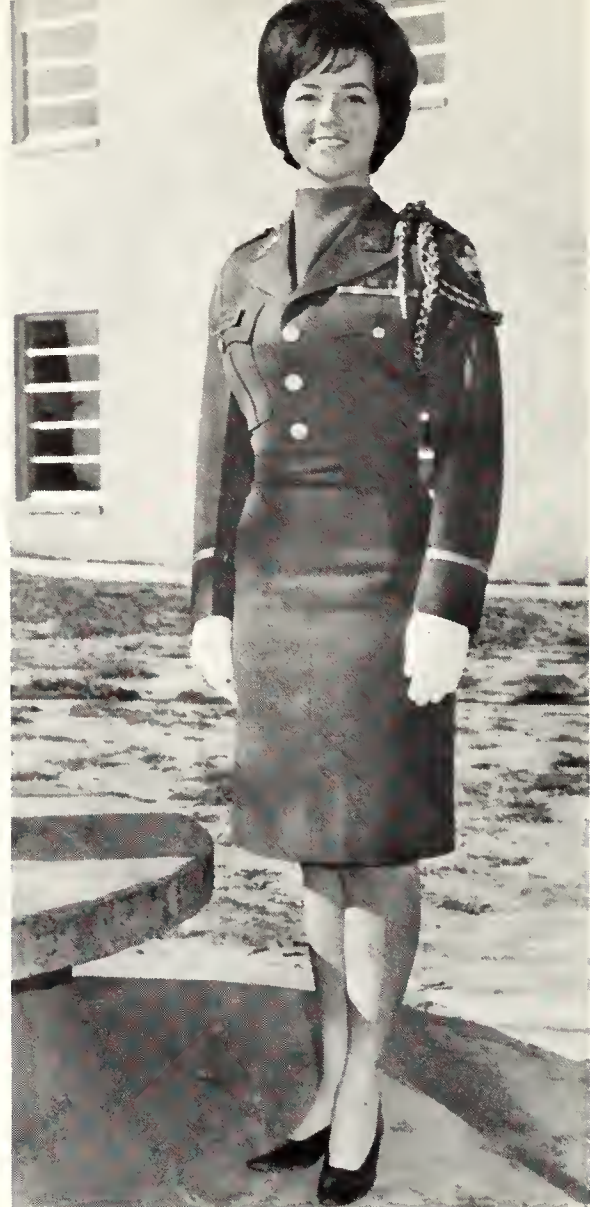


Rifle and Pistol Teams

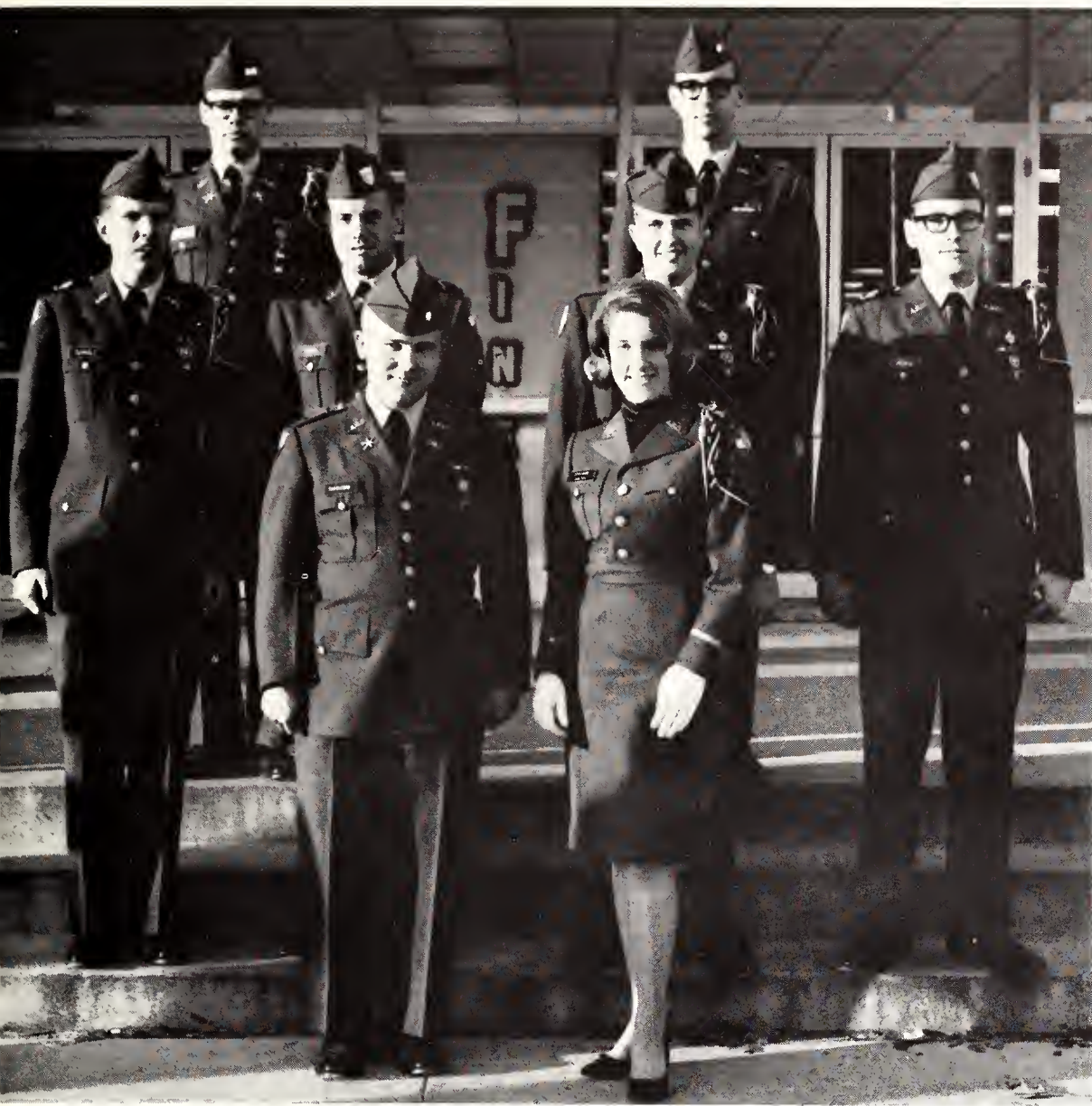

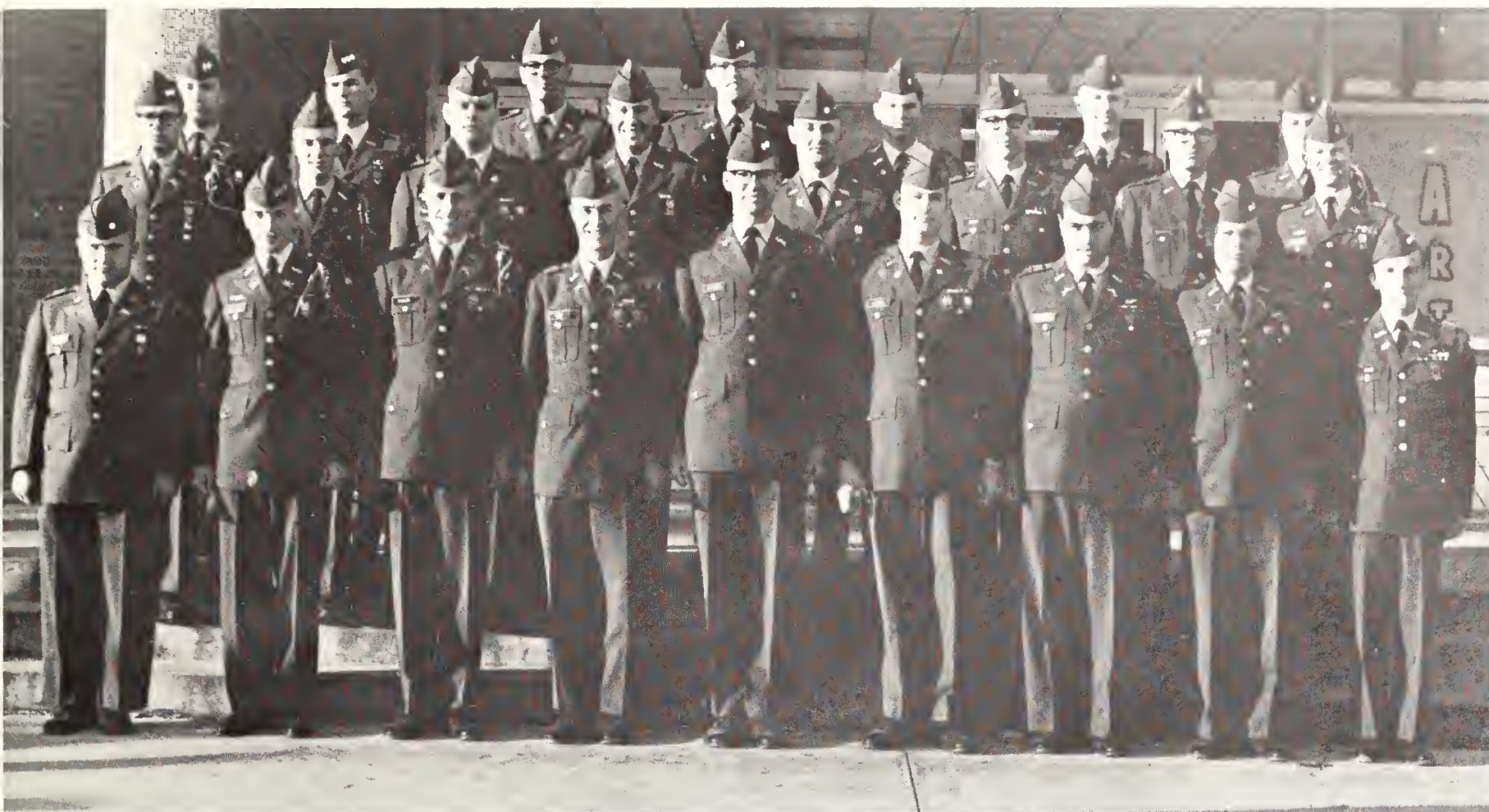

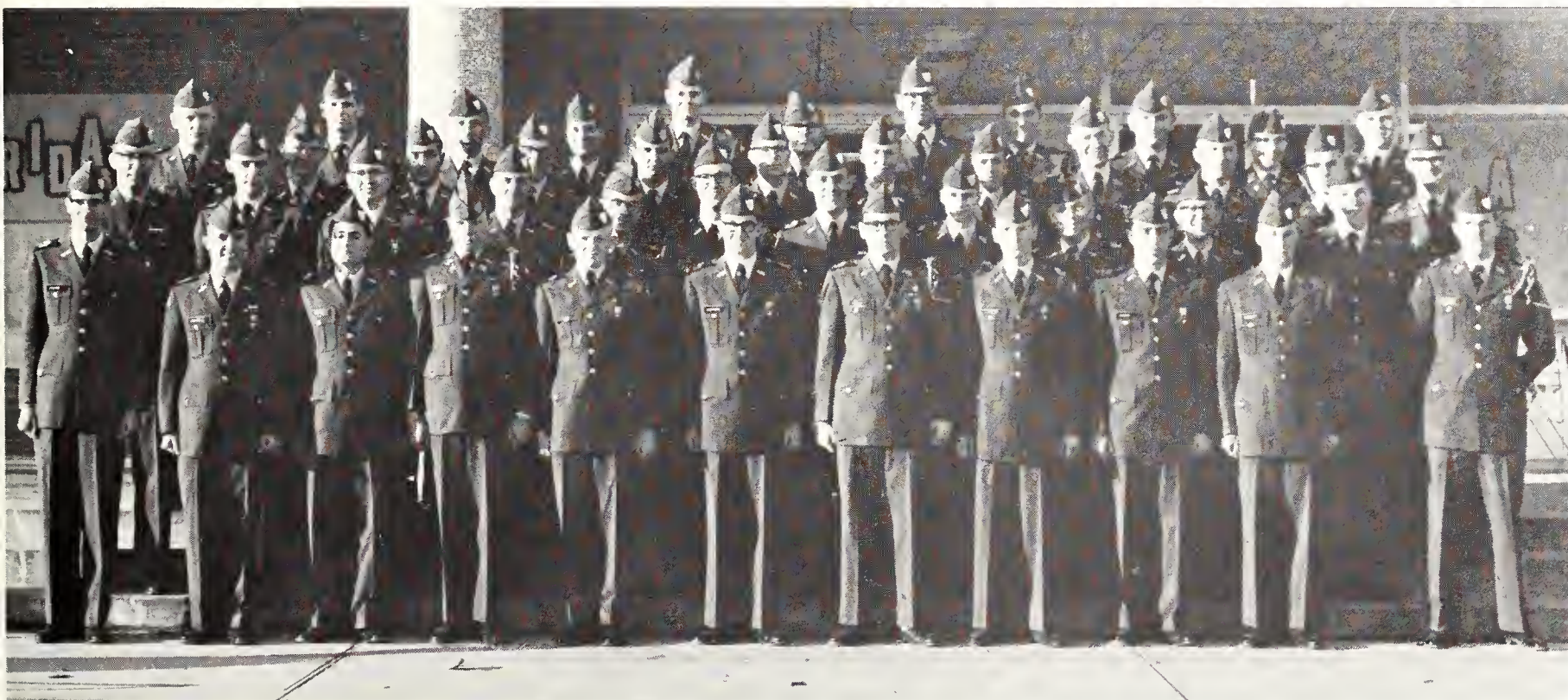

The Arlington Review Displays Creative Talents of Students

The *Arlington Review*, the ASC campus magazine, is designed as a showcase for student work in various fields.

Issued two times a year, in the fall and spring, the magazine publishes non-fiction articles of general interest, as well as short stories and poetry. In addition, student art is reproduced in the magazine. In the fall, 1965, issue, full color reproductions of student oil paintings were included, marking the first time that student paintings have been reproduced in color in any ASC publication.

Reveille Competes Nationally Among Collegiate Yearbooks

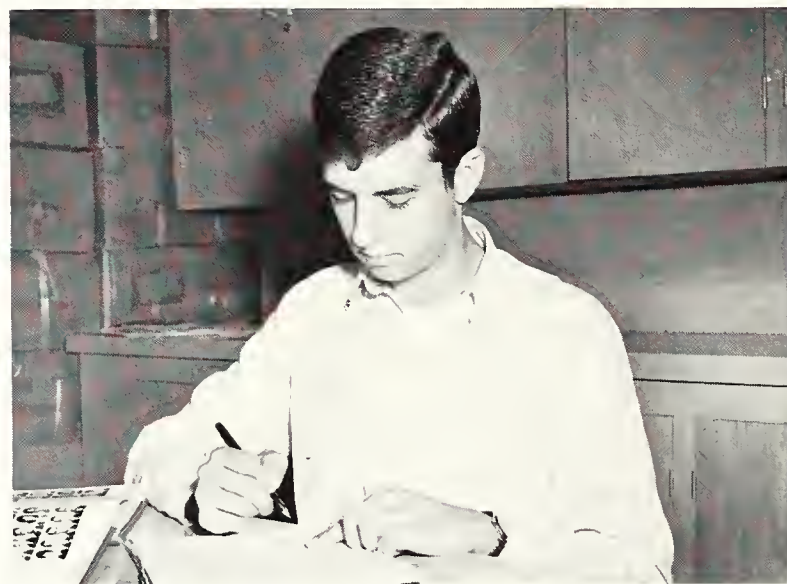

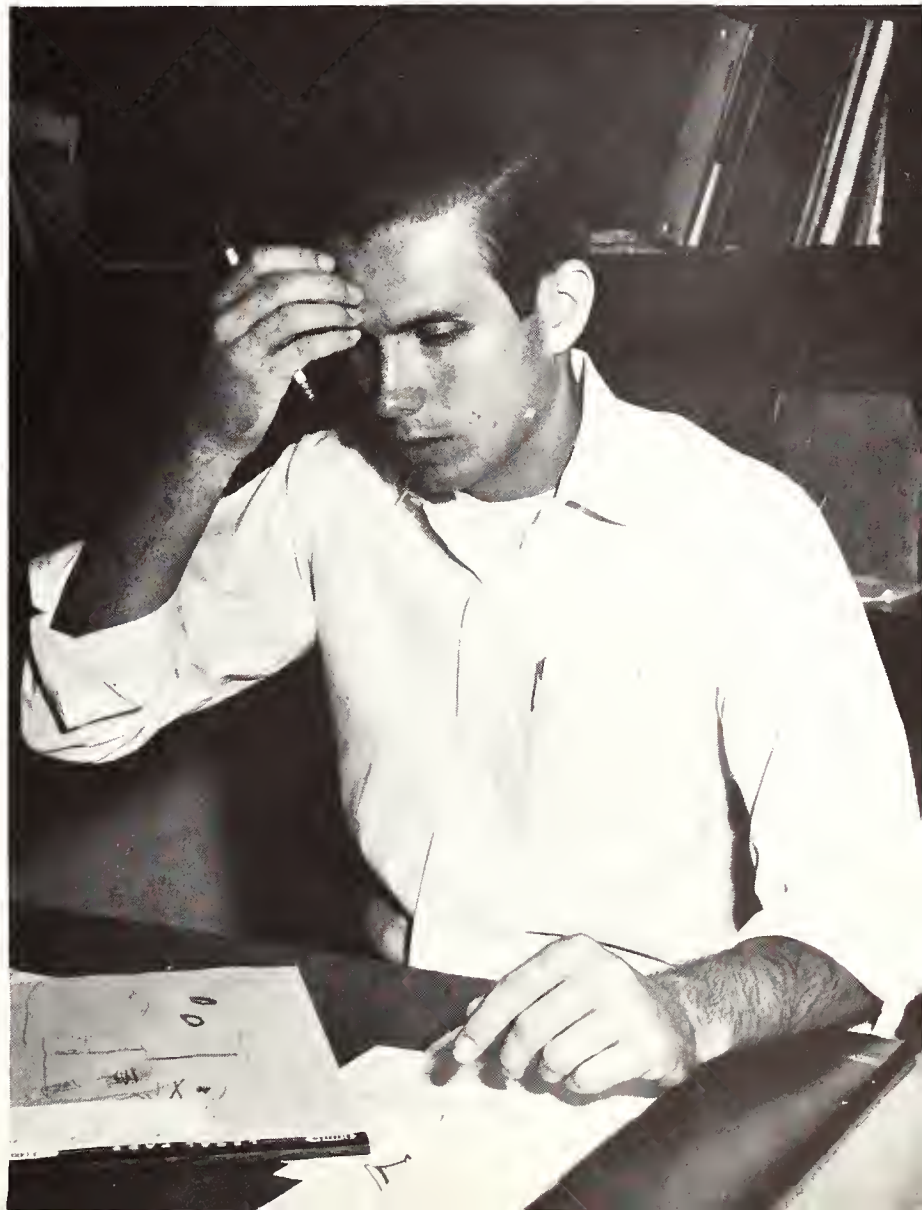
Executive Committee

The committee makes arrangements for representatives of campus organizations to participate, without vote, in council deliberations, especially when matters of particular interest to that organization are being discussed by the council.

The duties of the Executive Committee might be summed up in one general phrase as "the gear greasers of the council" since their overall responsibility is to insure the smooth functioning of the Student Government.

Communications Committee

Working to encourage communications between the various organizations on campus is the Communications Committee. This group is composed of eighteen members headed by Pierce Chandler.

The many bulletin boards throughout the student center are an evidence of this committee's work. The bulletin boards are used to relay organizational messages to students. This year the committee published the *Student Government Newsletter* and made up the section on organizations in the student directory.

Another of the Committee's projects was the President's Reception, held on October 25. Invitations were extended to the president or chairman of every group on campus, in addition to Dr. Woolf, his staff, and the academic and student deans. The purpose of this meeting was to let the various organizations become aware of their common goals so that they might work harmoniously toward the betterment of their group and their school.

Sponsoring an organizational sub-committee was also an undertaking of the Communications Committee. Composed of one representative from each organization at ASC, this sub-committee worked through the Communications Committee with the Student Government as a whole. Its purpose was to encourage cooperation and coordination among the different clubs on campus.

R. E. D. Committee

Under the leadership of Joey Sandifer, 25 students give their services to the Research, Evaluation, and Development Committee. These members work to determine the needs of the college community and conduct investigations into the best means of filling these needs. They not only recommend measures that seem advisable but also evaluate the success of these measures.

Each year they fix the policy for determining who will put out the Student Directory. The committee also chooses the members for the Student-Faculty Relations Board. The five students in the traffic court who hear campus cases are also recommended by this committee.

This year the R. E. D. Committee held an Honor Reception for the 35 finalists of the National Merit Scholarship. Planned by the committee is an Inter-School Conference in which all colleges within a 100-mile radius gather to discuss common problems and their solutions. The committee is also working to lengthen the hours which the student center is to stay open.

Rules and Finance Committee

The Student Government's Rules and Finance Committee serves a dual purpose. It handles all finances of Student Government, and it acts as arbiter in any disputes over Student Government affairs.

Don Long, Student Government Treasurer, is president of the Rules and Finance Committee. Another representative initiated into the committee is the Parliamentarian, who handles all procedural matters. Three other student government members are chosen at large to make up the remaining committee members.

Originally, there was both a Finance Committee and an Arbitration Committee, but the two were combined last year into the Rules and Finance Committee. The members meet only to either settle disputes concerning the constitution or to discuss matters of finance. No other group on campus can rule on constitutional matters.

The Rules and Finance Committee is also responsible for the Book Registration Service. The committee registers a student's book for a nickel and assists him in locating the book if it is lost. Around 4,000 books are registered each semester under this service.

Student Affairs Committee

The Student Affairs Committee is in charge of all phases of the school elections. It is also responsible for developing programs designed to promote school spirit in the social, athletic, cultural and other co-curricular activities of ASC.

Duties of the committee include providing ballots, voting areas, voting boxes or machines, and counting the votes. Revision of the election rules is a 1965-66 project for the 25-member committee.

As chairman of the Student Affairs Committee, Sylvia Sumner also heads the Rebel Rousers, a spirit organization stemming from this committee. This young organization is made up of over 100 students whose purpose is to stimulate school spirit and gain support for all Rebel functions. The members try to gather support at games, at pep rallies and in all campus activities.

Rebel Rousers formed a welcoming committee at registration and welcomed students to the campus. They were also in charge of the bonfire. They secured an approved campus site for it south of the parking lots, gathered wood, and placed a guard on it at all times. In addition, the Rebel Rousers made posters for all the games and pep rallies and, for one week, filled the student center showcases with pictures of the football team and other memorabilia.

Student Activities Committees work to bridge educational and social life on the ASC campus. Members of SAB are a part of a leadership training program designed to give students a well-rounded education. SAB is made up of nine committees, including the newly organized Council on Leadership Advancement. COLA was created to provide conferences and seminars on better leadership and to help committees in group dynamics. Organized for this year only, the Conference Committee convened to consider the LSU bid for a regional conference.

The Entertainment Committee helps select and make arrangements for all featured attractions of the Concert and Popular Artists series and also schedules the weekly film attractions. Coordinating big all-school activities such as Homecoming, Old South, and the school trip is the job of the Special Events Committee. 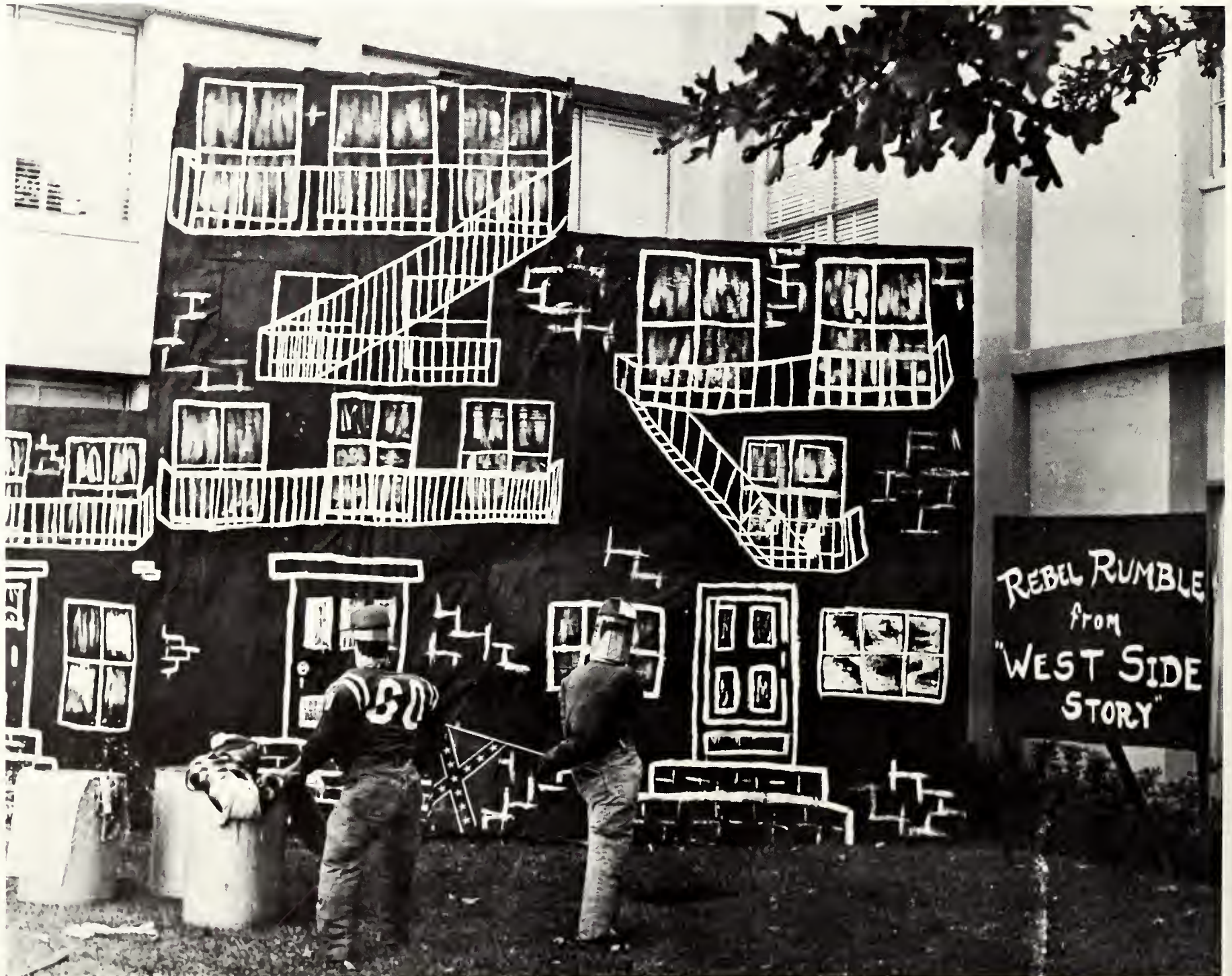

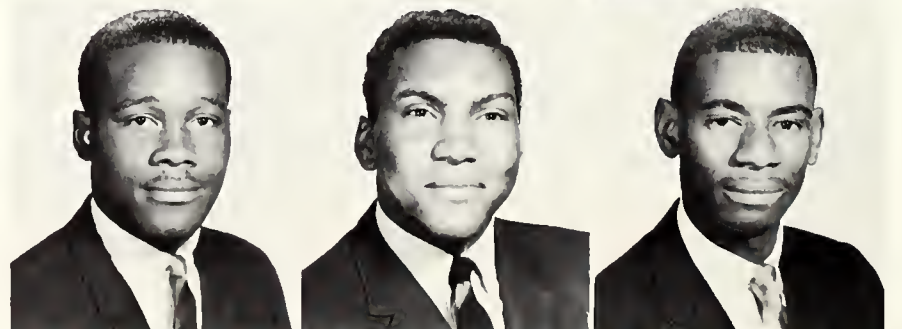

The sweetheart for this year is Connie Knight, a sophomore Spanish major from Italy, Texas.

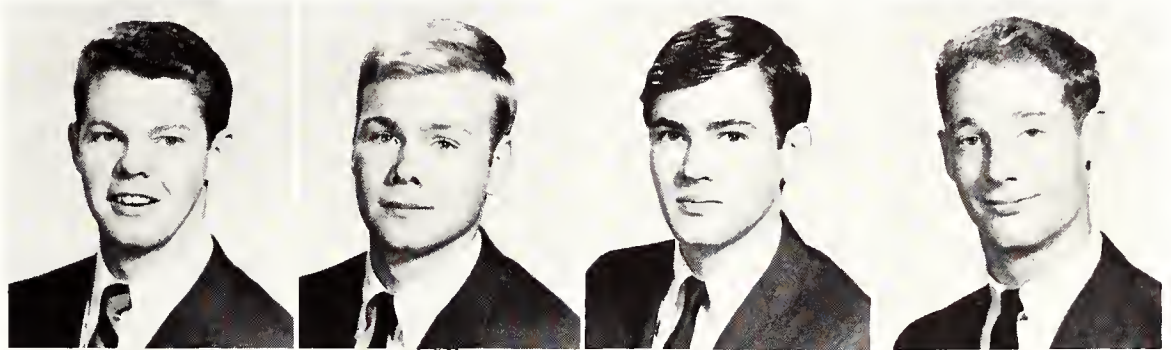

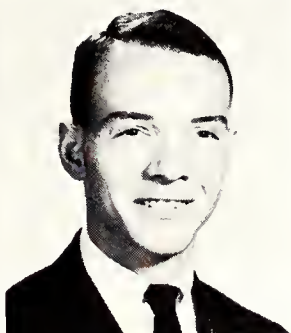


Zongola

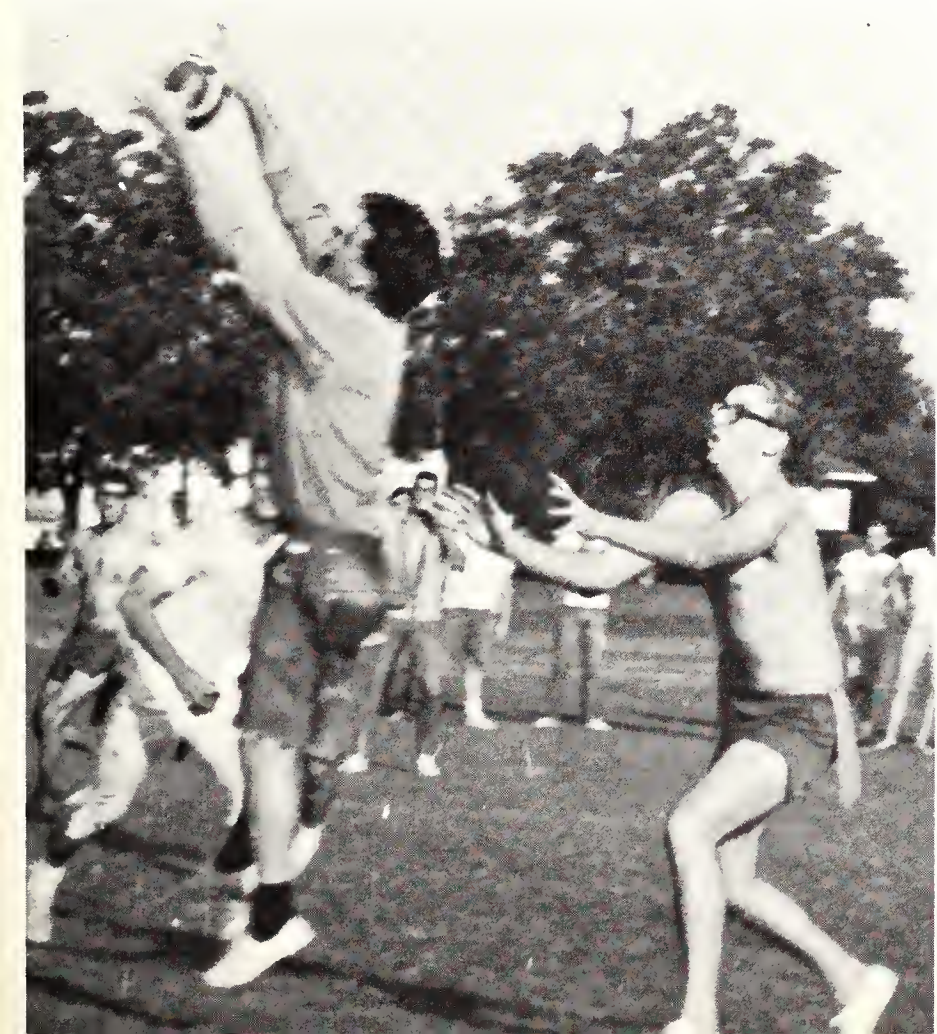

In February, ICC and Comso sponsored a Sorority and Fraternity Forum for the purpose of informing students about affiliation with national sororities and fraternities.



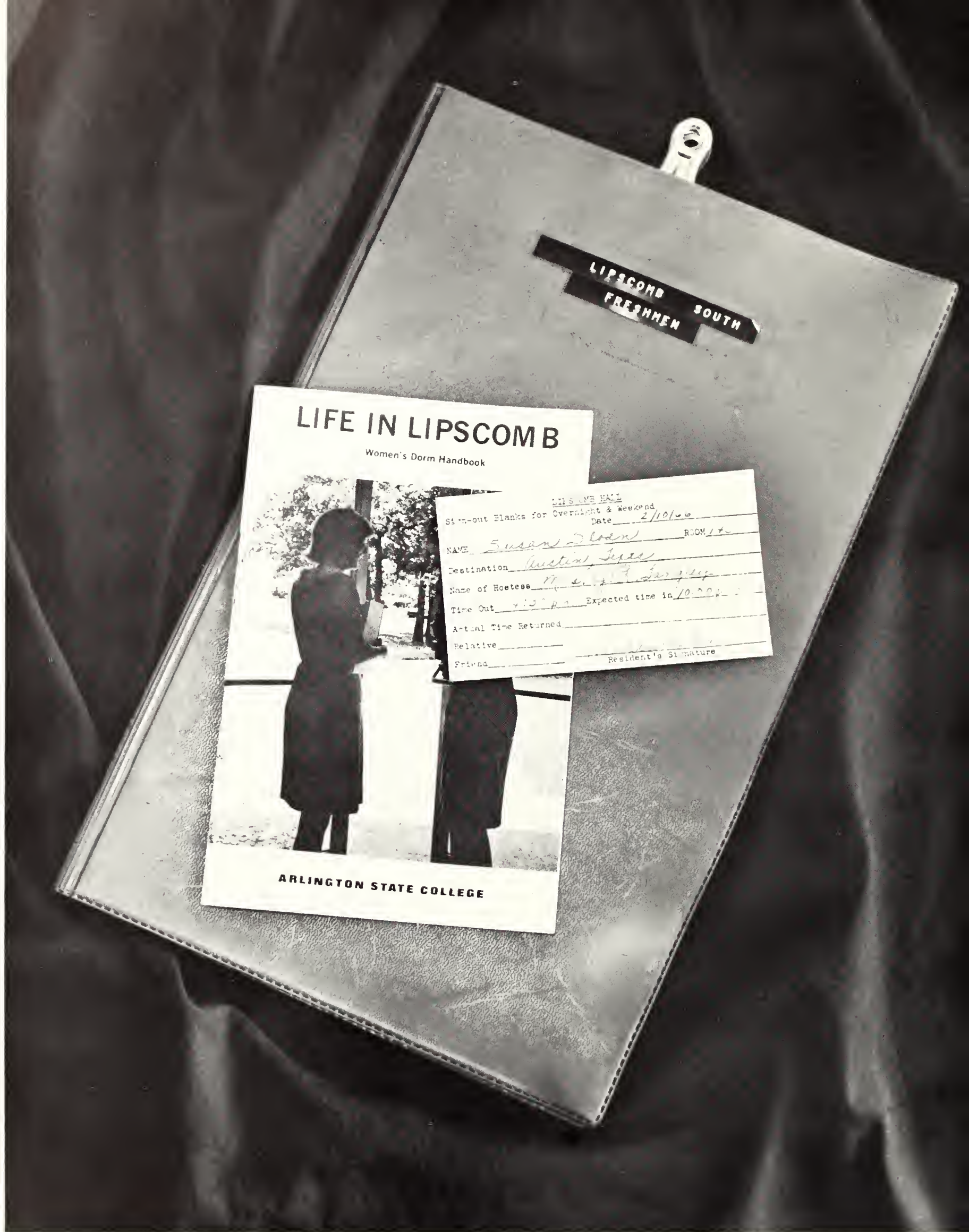

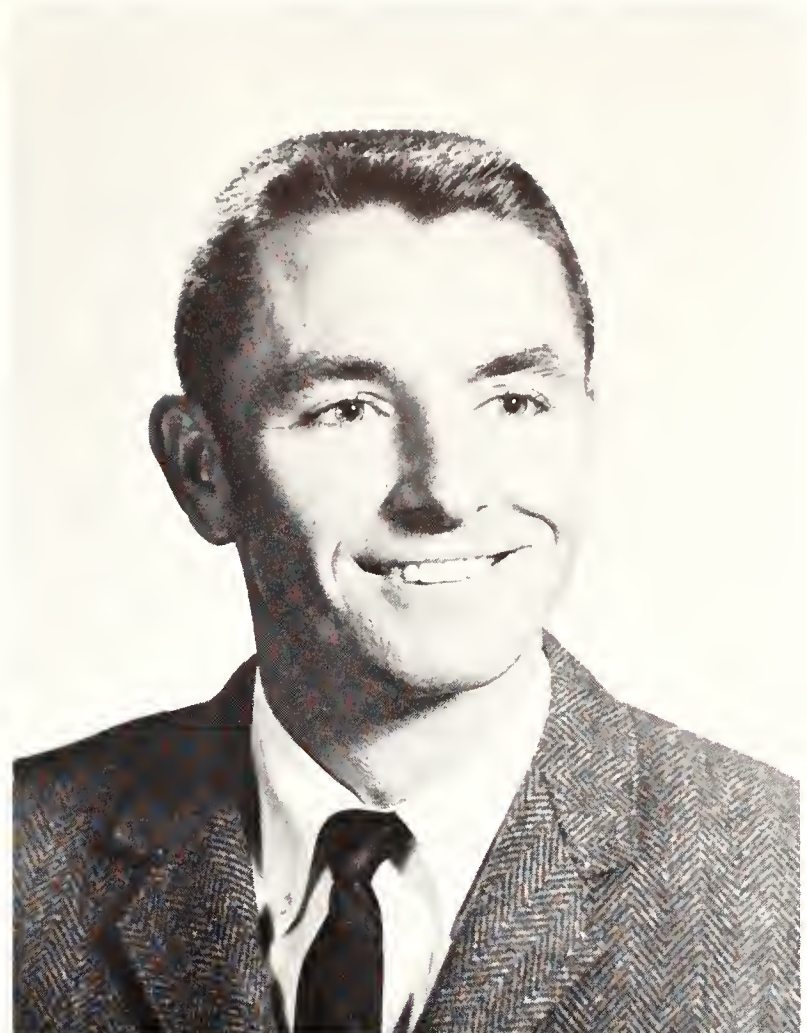

Rebel Flying Club Begun To Provide Flying Facilities

Born this semester, the Rebel Flying Club was patterned after the highly successful Longhorn Flying Club at the University of Texas. The club was organized for the purpose of providing safe and efficient flying facilities for students and faculty who wish to fly for pleasure, obtain high ratings, or merely learn to fly. Dr. Jack E. Fairchild is the faculty sponsor of the two-part club. The actual flying club handles organizational and membership details, while the second part is a non-profit organization operated under Texas state laws for corporations. It is governed by four elected officers who double as a board of directors for the corporation, and all board actions must be approved by the faculty sponsor and club members.

The Rebel Flying Club, based at Arlington's new Municipal Airport, operates only new aircraft for use by its members. The club hopes to maintain a ratio of 20 members to one plane to assure members of a reasonable availability of aircraft as well as to assure the club of sufficient utilization to operate economically. The Rebel Flying Club elected Jay Jackson president; Bill Worthington, vice-president; Don Snodgrass, secretary; and Jerry Bramlett, treasurer. Of the 25 charter members, four are ASC faculty members. Professor Don Cantwell, of the business and economics school, is assisting the club in preparing the legal papers and forms for incorporation into the non-profit group.

In the spring elections ASC students voted overwhelmingly in favor of the referendum for an FM radio on campus. Student approval of the bill was all that was needed to submit the proposal to the administration. The FM Radio referendum was the result of three months of figuring, discussing, and debating on the part of several interested radio operators. Farrell Forehand, a sophomore speech major, was the main instigator of the idea. He received a great deal of encouragement from Student Government officers Jim Justice, Pierce Chandler, and Steve Evans. Joe Goodwin, Radio-T.V. instructor, helped with the technical information, along with the TCU Radio Department. Farrell's figures set the cost of the FM Radio system at \$12,072.09. This budget includes the cost of installation, lawyer's fees, record budget, licensing fees, and all equipment. If the bill is approved, FM radio music will be played throughout the student center, in all offices, and in the dorms. Operators will be selected on a voluntary basis, using speech majors or students who want to announce. From six to ten announcers will be chosen on their ability as demonstrated in their audition.

Amateur Radio Club Provides Outlet for Study of Electronics

Many students licensed by the Federal Communications Commission have found expression for their hobby as members of the ASC Amateur Radio Club. Around 25 members meet weekly in the Art Building to operate their ham radios. Tom Bullington heads this group in its study of electronics in applied communications.

The Amateur Radio Club works in conjunction with other colleges to maintain a traffic network that could prove indispensable in the event of a commercial communications breakdown. The University of Texas, Rice University, the University of Houston, Abilene Christian College, Texas Tech, and the ASC Club could be instantly connected with each other by means of the amateur network. This year has been the most successful for the club in terms of reaching other stations and relaying messages.

The radio club meeting room in the Art Building is equipped with equipment for beginning operators as well as more complicated radio transmitters and receivers that would be used in the emergency network.

Joe C. Spradlin, Associate professor in the Electrical Engineering Department, is sponsor of the club. The Amateur Radio Club is also aided by Robert H. Lundy, who serves as station trustee.

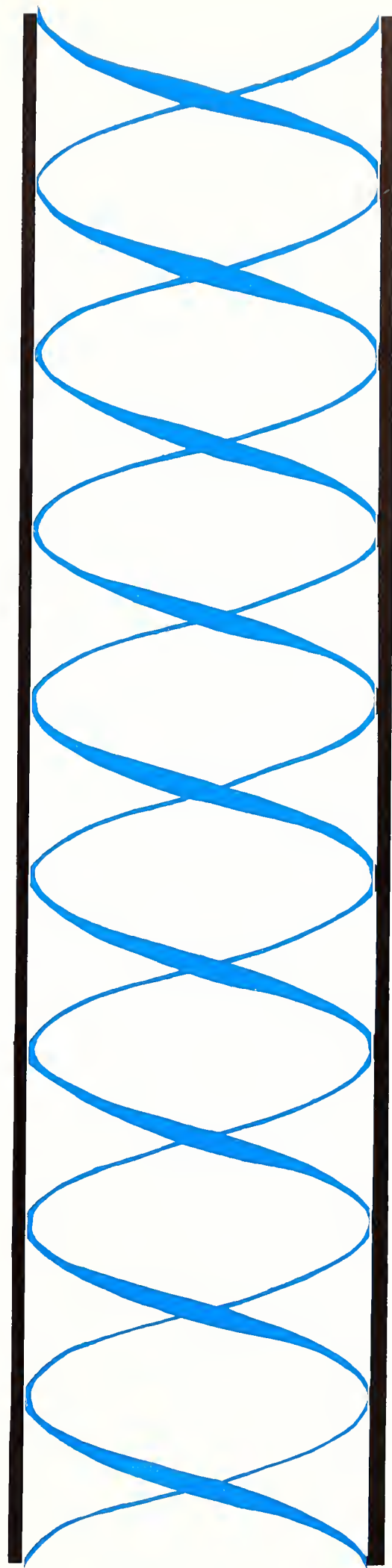

Poise and Personality Qualify Entries for Reveille Beauties

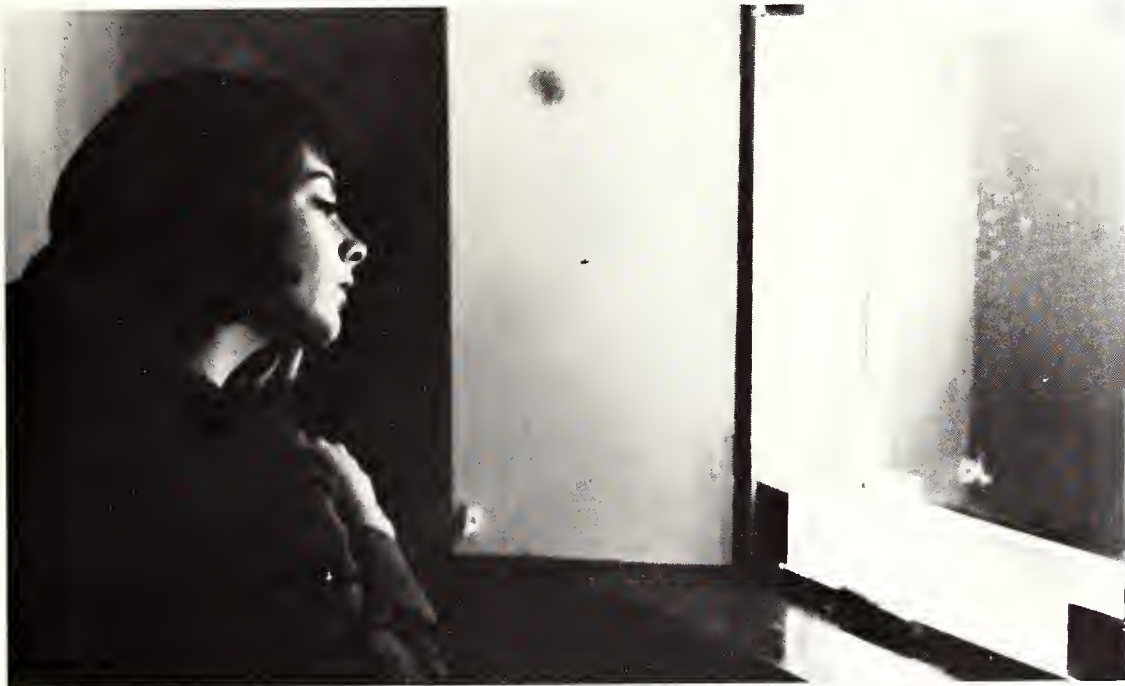

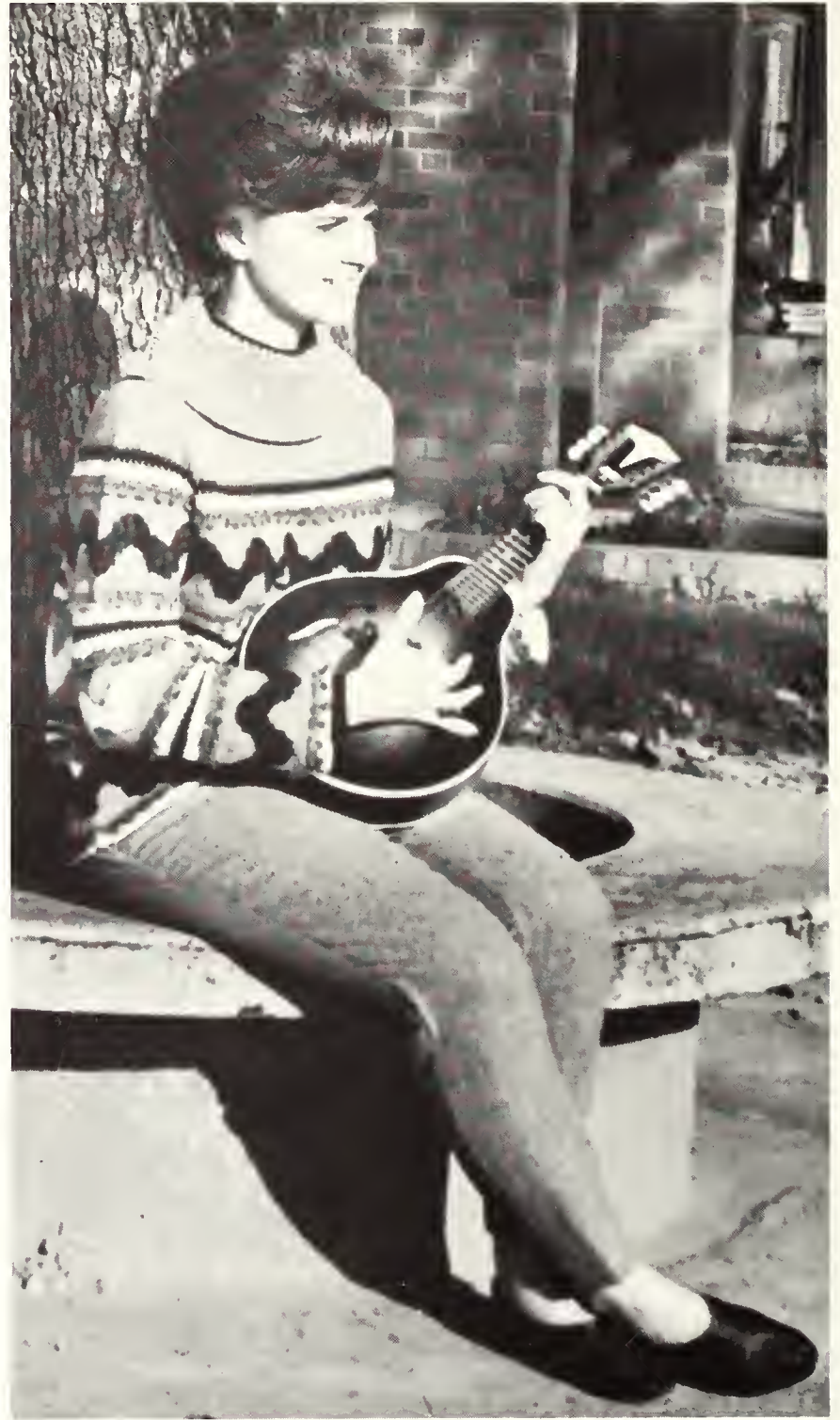

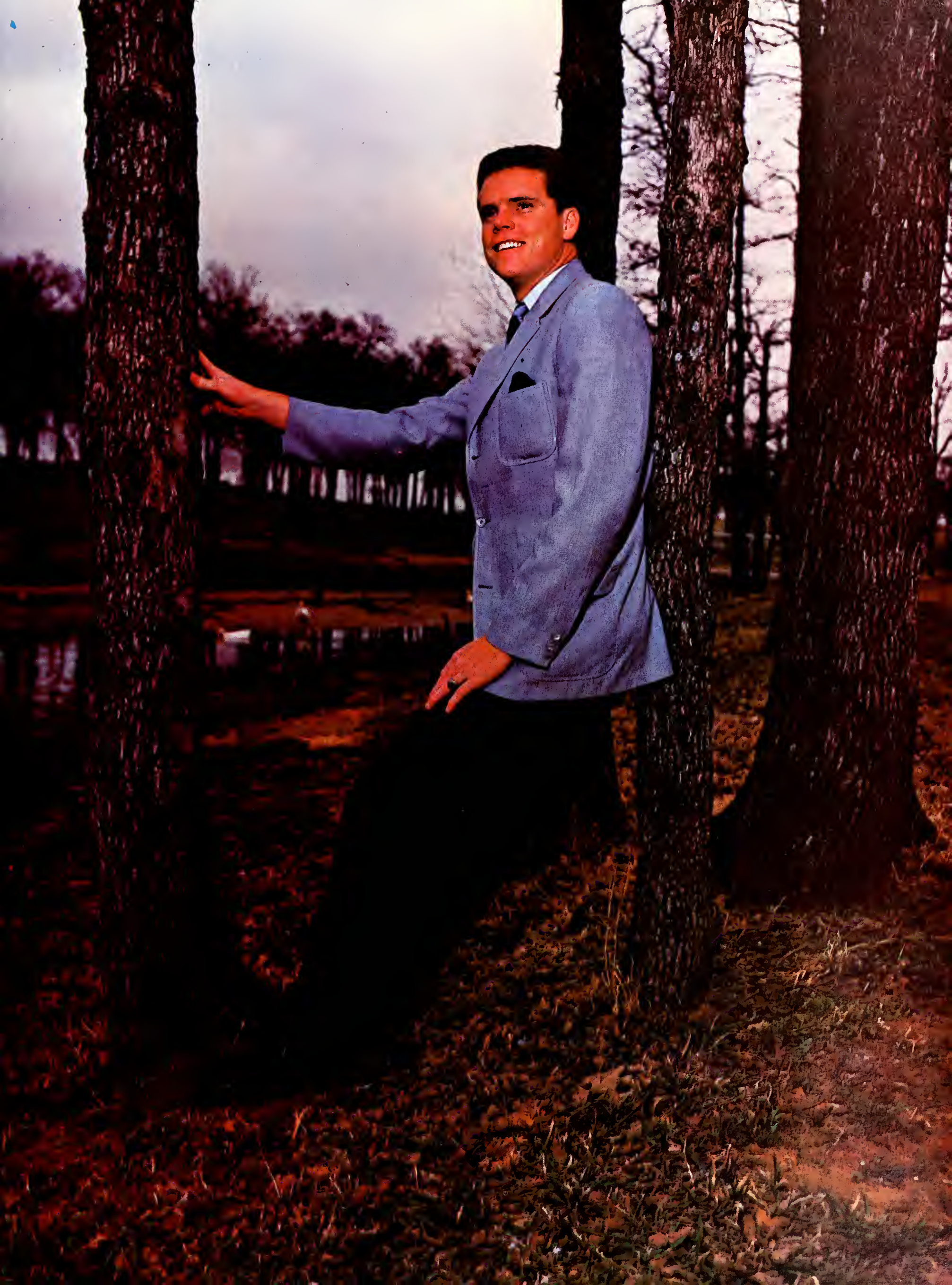

In 1965, ASC produced a surprising team. A 52-yard field goal by Faust Parker amazed everyone and captured the conference record. A 9-0 loss to Trinity University disappointed many people with visions of an invincible team. In the next game, Arlington State set a new record for total points scored by defeating McMurry College 41-16. The winning season and the 6-3 record was not surprising but the games won and lost were. After losses to Trinity University and Abilene Christian College, ASC was chosen for the bottom of the Southland Conference. Then the Rebels defeated the number two team in the conference, Arkansas State College, and finally the conference champion, Lamar Tech.

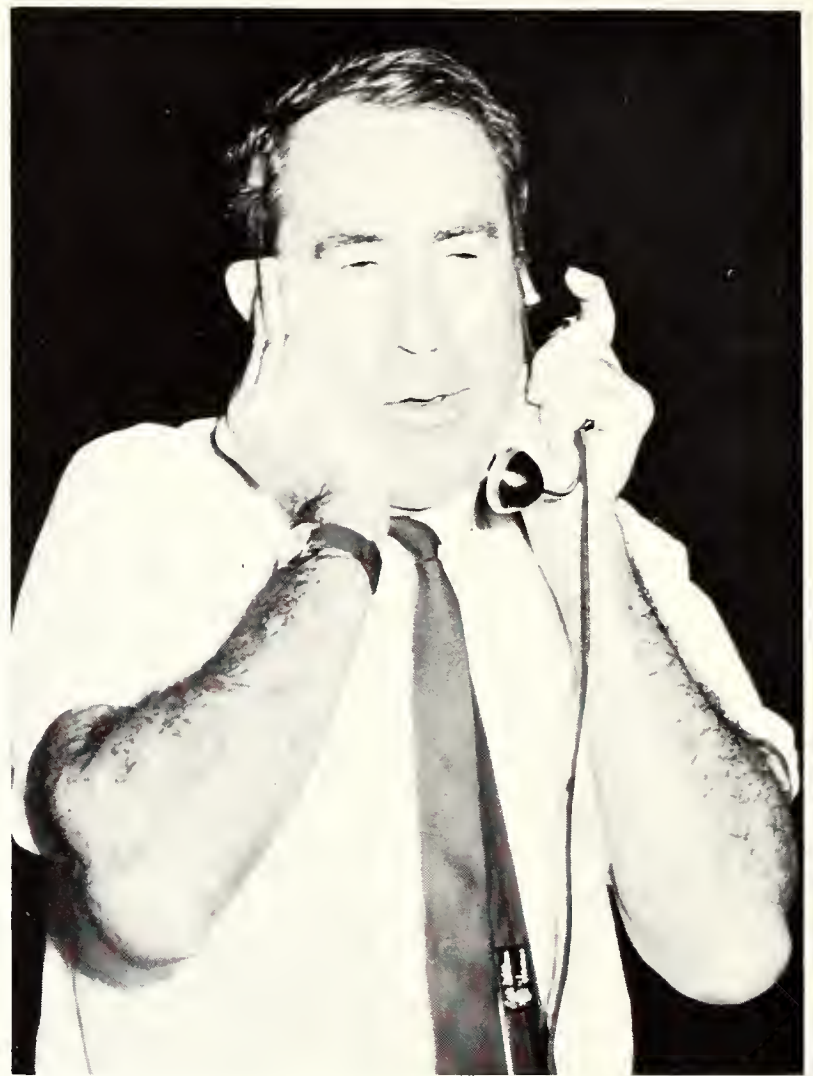
Chena Gilstrap Resigns as Head Coach to Be Athletic Director

After 13 years as head coach at Arlington State, Professor Claude R. "Chena" Gilstrap resigned to become head of the department of physical education and intercollegiate athletics at ASC. Behind Chena Gilstrap is a record of 85 wins, 40 losses and 3 ties at ASC. In 1956 and 1957 he was named Junior College Coach of the Year. In those two years Arlington State won the Junior Rose Bowl and the 1957 team was the No. 1 junior college team nationally with a 12 win and no loss record. In 1961 Gilstrap was voted District 7 Small College Coach of the Year by members of the American Football Association. In 1965, he was named Coach of the Year by the members of the Southland Conference.

Gilstrap's decision to resign was announced November 3 at a televised press conference attended by Tom Vandergriff, Mayor of Arlington; John D. Boon, ASC professor of Geology and president of the Southland Conference; and Ben Cook, assistant to the president at ASC.

Mayor Vandergriff, who announces ASC football games, said, "We in Arlington don't think of Chena just as a coach, but as a grand ambassador for Arlington. He has been named Citizen of the Year and president of the YMCA."

In 1965 Chena Gilstrap left at the end of a winning season with a 6-3 record and a team losing only nine seniors.



New Mexico State Gets Rebels Started on Wrong Foot, 27-10

Arlington State's Rebels opened the season with a home stand against a powerful New Mexico State Aggie team, and after a fine effort dropped to the Aggies, 27-10.

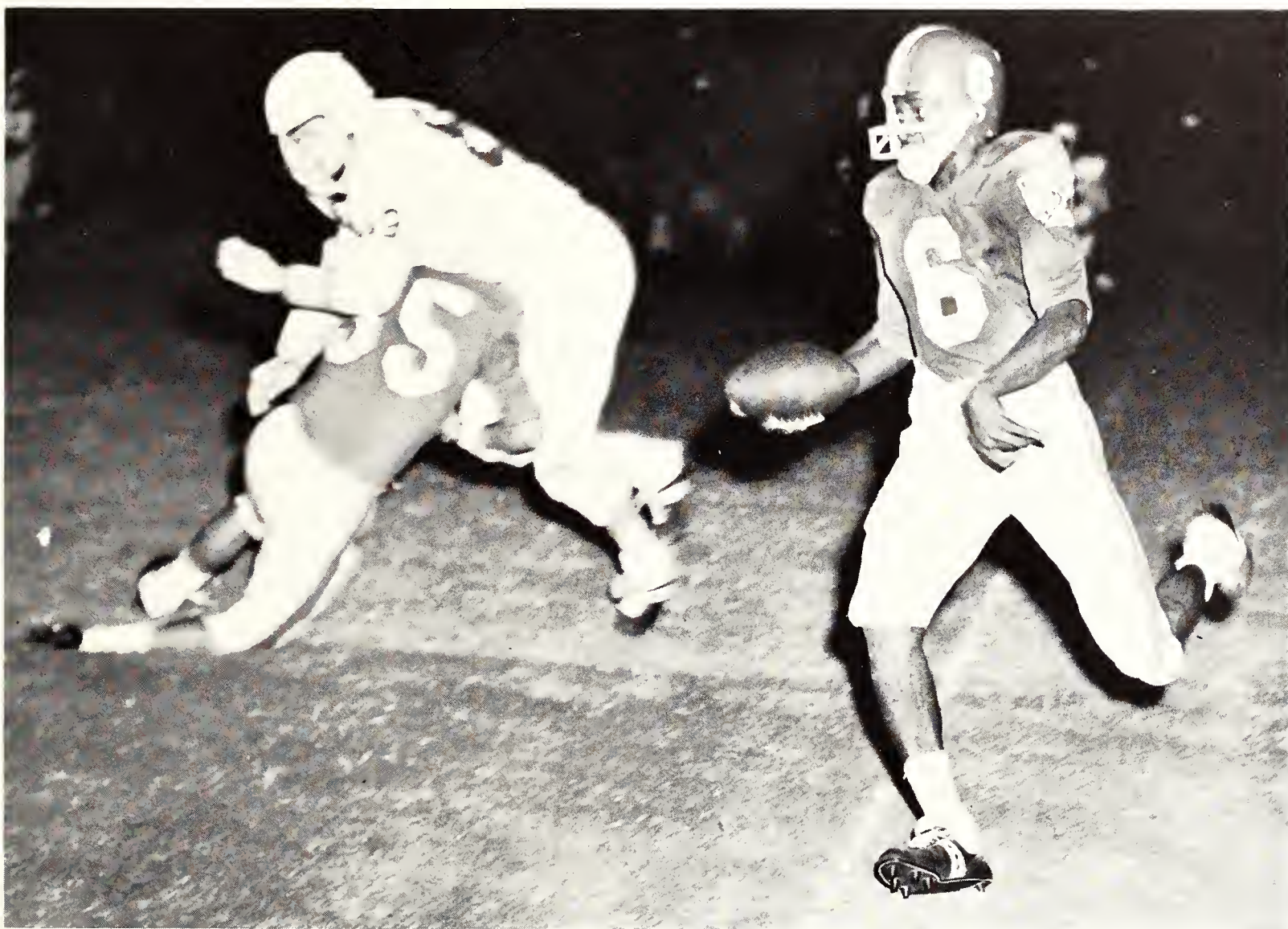
But Arlington found reason to cheer even in losing as freshman quarterback Carl Williams, starting for the Rebels before he had attended his first college class, led an offensive show which kept the Arlington State fans in the stadium until the final second.

Trailing by only ten points in the middle of the final quarter, Williams kept the game in doubt until New Mexico State returned an intercepted pass 48 yards for the deciding touchdown.

Three lost fumbles and three pass thefts proved to be the difference in this contest, but a passing attack that netted 156 yards plus a rugged defensive showing prophesized the return of winning ways for the Rebel gridders.

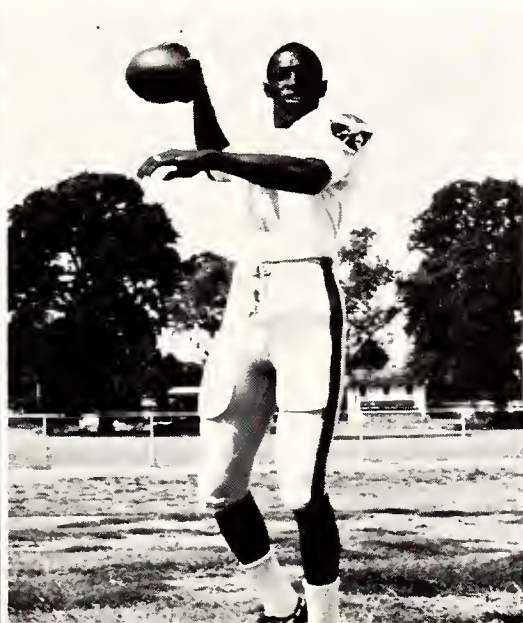

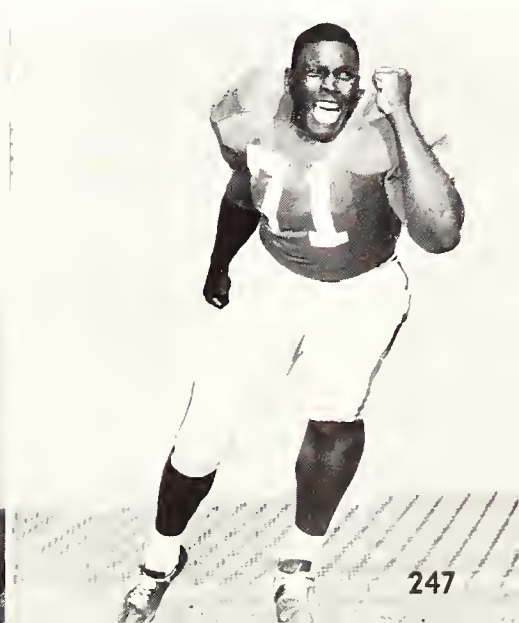

The passing and running of Carl Williams again provided the offensive punch for the Rebels, but this time he received help in the form of broken-field running by Junior Pete Estrada. The defense also played an exciting game, picking off five of heralded A&I quarterback Randy Johnson's passes.

A&I scored first, thanks to an ASC fumble on their own twelve yard line. But Arlington State came back in the second quarter with a 46 yard touchdown pass from Carl Williams to Raymond Matthews. Faust Parker added a 32 yard field goal later to give the Rebels a 9-7 halftime advantage.

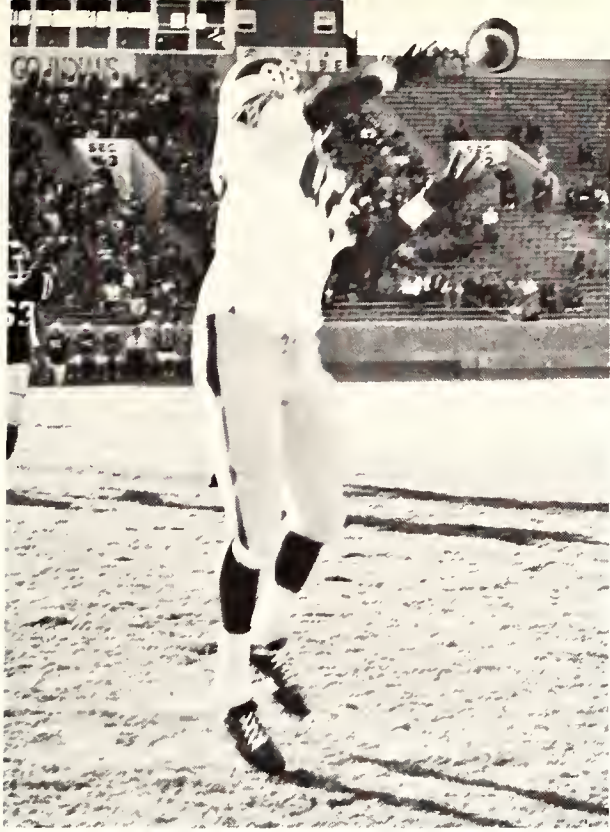

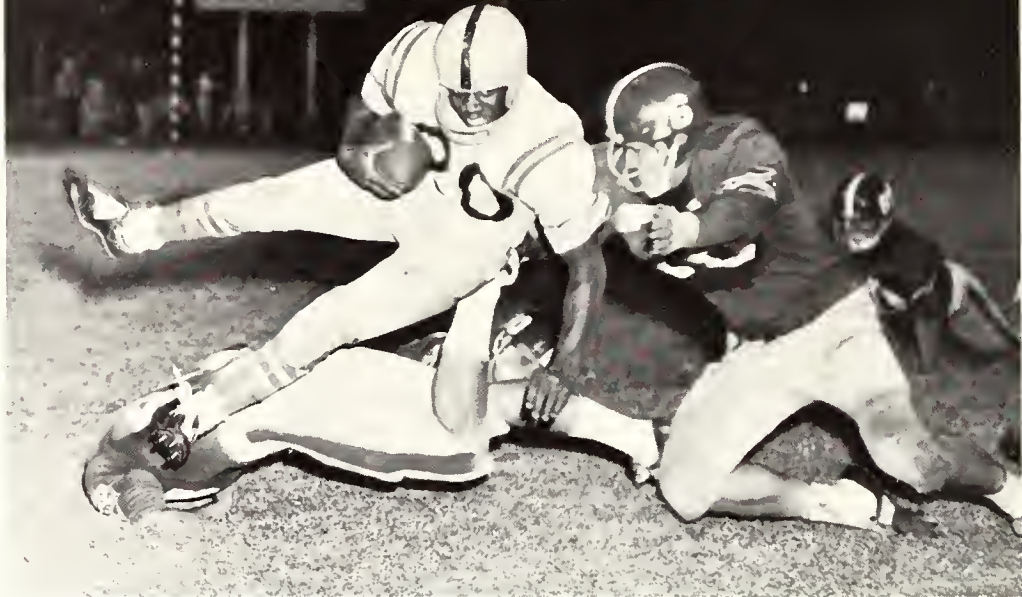

Rebs Regroup for Third Win As ASC Wins Homecoming Game

Arlington State's Rebels swept to their first Southland Conference Victory by swamping Arkansas State 27-12 in Jonesboro.

Freshmen Keith Luft and Mike Baylor, starting his first game as a Rebel, led the attack. Luft scored three touchdowns and Baylor completed 12 of 27 passes for 152 yards. Kicking specialist Faust Parker added field goals of 43 and 25 yards plus three extra points to account for the rest of the ASC score.

Miscues cost the Rebels in the first half, but Arlington State's rugged defense, headed by tackle Kenneth Ozee and linebacker Steve Jackson, staved off the Arkansas offense and left the Rebels with an advantage at the half.

Then the Rebels came back in the second half to assure their victory. ASC's defense sparkled as they held the Lumberjacks to 215 yards, while the offense rolled up a total of 310 yards against a defense which had previously allowed an average of only 200 yards per game.

A record crowd of 9,000 watched the Rebels defeat Arizona State 27-6 at Homecoming. Carl Williams, Keith Luft and Ken Bowman covered 76 yards in 11 plays for the first touchdown of the game. A fumble gave the Axers the ball on Arlington State's 18 yard line. This field position allowed Arizona its only score. Williams ran the second Rebel touchdown over and passed to Jack Miller for a third touchdown with only 24 seconds left in the first half.

At the halftime activities, Bobbie Ragatz was presented as Homecoming Queen, Miss Dixie Belle.

The second play of the third quarter sidelined Carl Williams with a shoulder injury first reported as a broken collarbone. Later it was decided that the injury was less serious.

Mike Baylor, another outstanding freshman quarterback, took over and showed a passing attack comparable to that of Williams. Sometimes not as quick as Williams, Baylor demonstrated accuracy by hitting seven of ten passes. He passed 5 yards to Joe O'Brien for another touchdown and Faust Parker kicked his third extra point for the evening.

In this game, ASC was looking for a first win in the Southland Conference. Mike Baylor led the Rebels to two touchdowns with an end zone pass to Joe O'Brien and a two yard run by Baylor behind a block by Ken La Judice. ACC's Joe Roland led their attack with passes to Joe Paty. Leading 14-12 in the fourth quarter, the Rebels drove to the Wildcat 24 yard line. Raymond Matthews collected 3 tosses for 20 yards, raising his season totals to 22 catches and 341 yards. Both of these are new marks, surpassing Kenneth Vaughn's records.



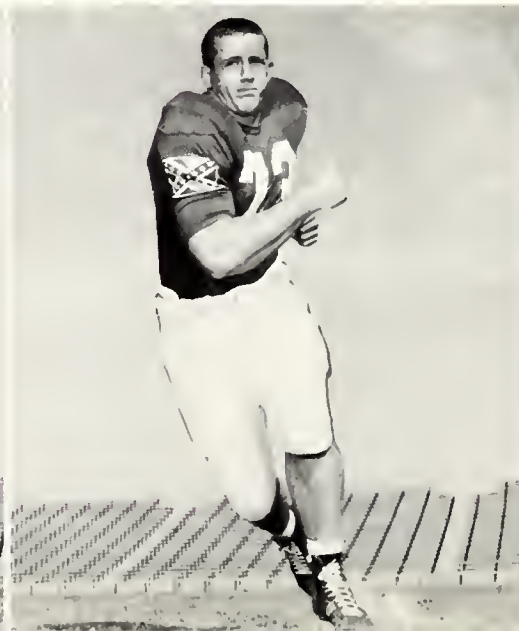

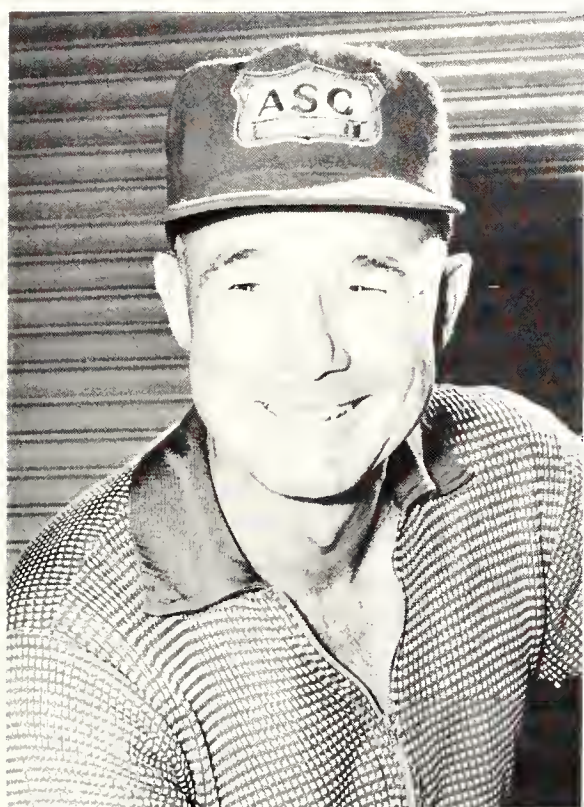

Eight Lettermen Return For 1966 Rebel Basketball Season

The eight lettermen returning this fall found a new basketball home in the multi-purpose auditorium located across from the library. Going into the first of the season, Coach Tom Tinker rated the 1965-66 Rebels as the most experienced team since ASC became a senior college. He felt that the boys had adequate shooting abilities, good balance, and above average team speed. The Rebels' weakness, however, was in rebounding: outside of Mike Nau (6'7") the team was practically devoid of height. With this shortage of height the Rebels were at a defensive disadvantage to begin with, but the outlook improved when the eight returning lettermen, five of them seniors, and the promising newcomers were considered. At the first of the season, the top outside shooters were Dink Ford, also deadly on free throws, and Jack Lynch, a good rebounder. Mike Nau, taking over rebounding and scoring chores from Rebel ex Bruce Tibbets, and John Reglin, ASC's best all-around man in 1963-64, joined David Duke in being this season's hope for inside scoring.

Rebels Drop Season Opener To Lamar in Double Overtime

The 1600 fans who attended Arlington State's season opener with Lamar Tech could scarcely have asked for a more exciting game. In the first half, ASC built up a 45-41 lead, then increased it to 59-48 with 11 minutes, 51 seconds left. With only 43 seconds remaining in the game, ASC led 77-73, but Lamar Tech put the game into overtime by scoring two quick field goals. In the first overtime period, Fred Romero scored all six points for Lamar Tech, but the Rebels matched his with six points of their own, forcing the game into a second overtime period. With only three seconds remaining in the second overtime, the score was tied 91-91, and Lamar Tech had the ball. With just one second remaining, the Cardinals shot and made it; thus making the final score 93-91.

Unfortunately, the second meeting of the two teams was not as close in the scoring department. ASC opened the scoring as John Reglin popped in a goal from the corner with 20 seconds gone in the first period. However, the Cardinals drew ahead and, at the half, they led 46-33. In the second half the scoring was exactly equal with each team scoring 36 points, making the final score Cardinals 82 and Rebels 69.

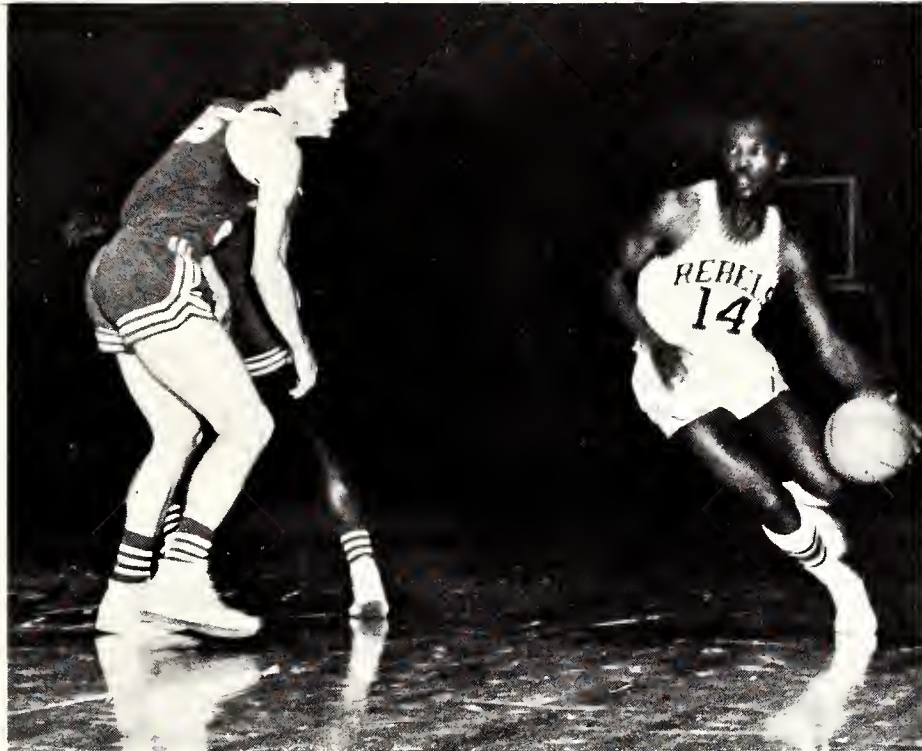
Arkansas State Team Bests Rebel Quintet in Two Games

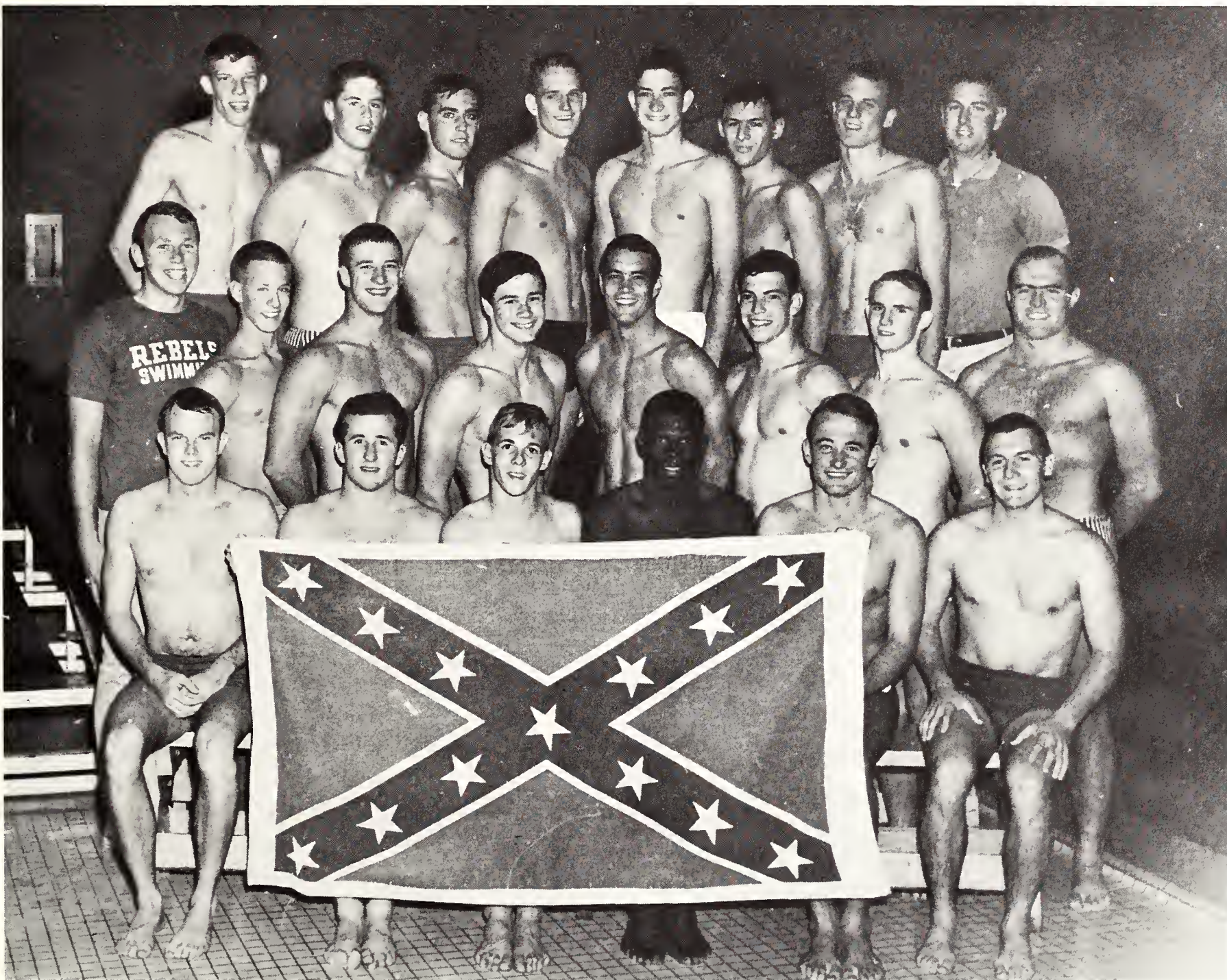

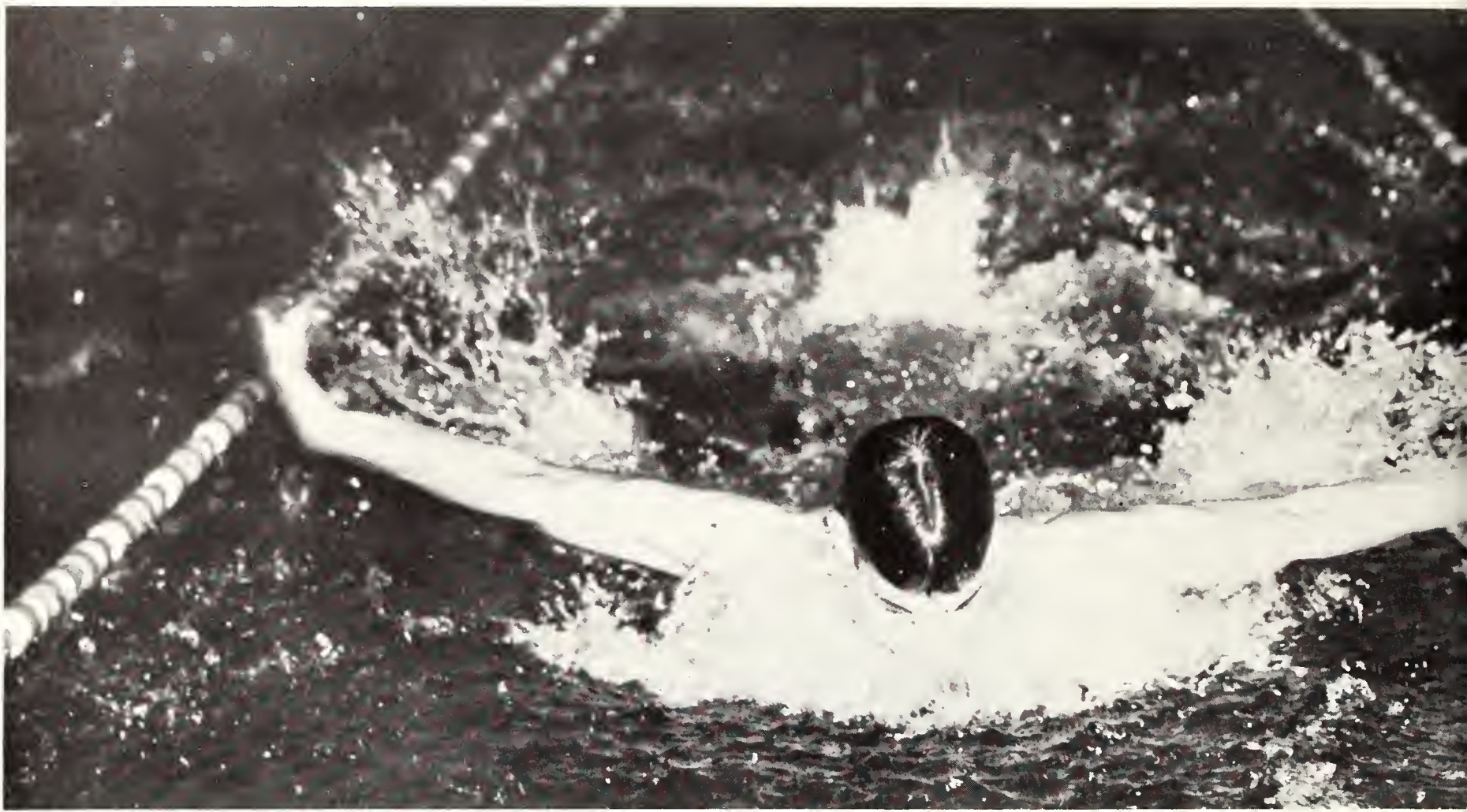

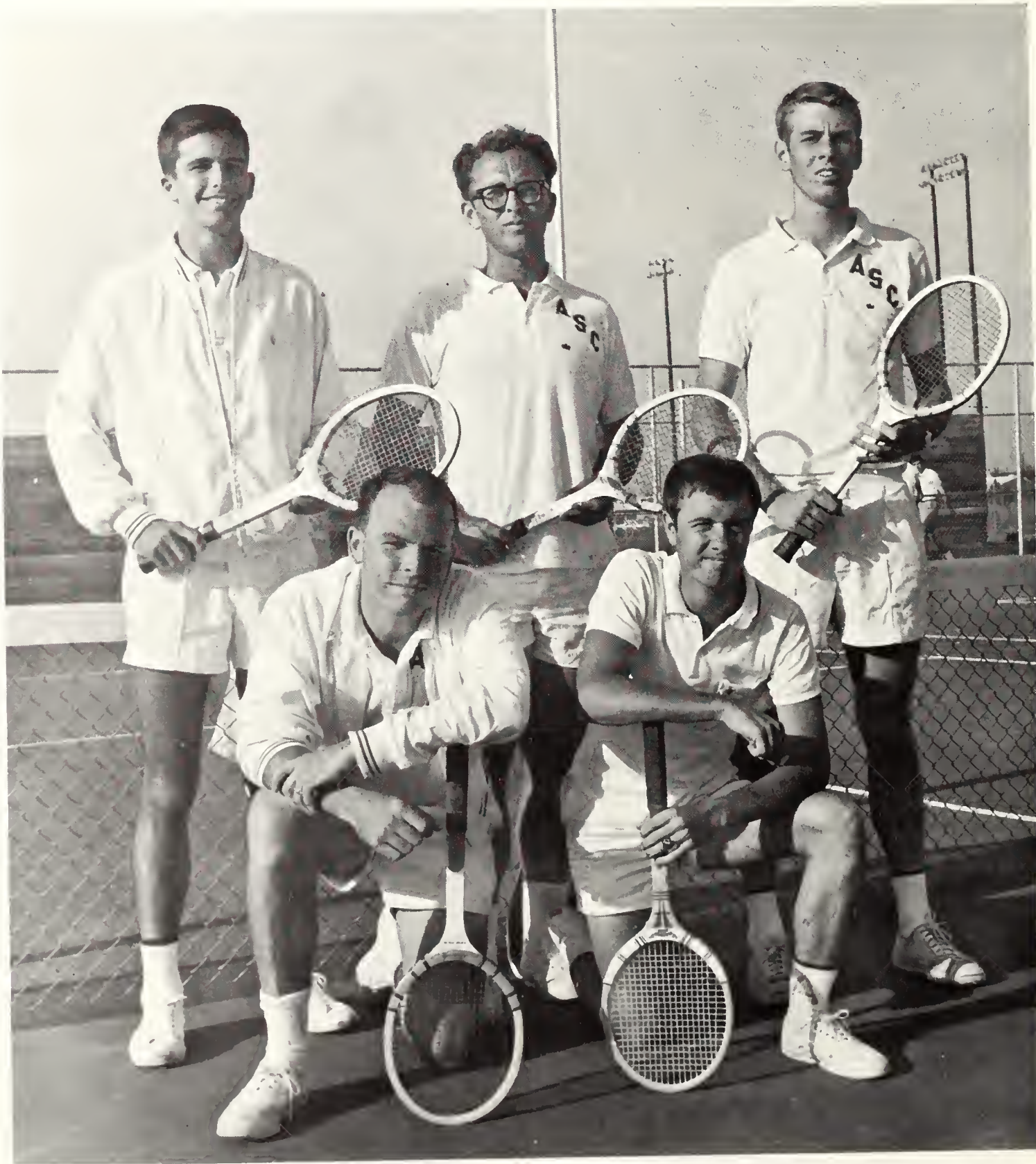
Coach Bill Roark's tennis team played a full slate of dual matches prior to the Southland Conference meet held here in Arlington at Randol Mill Park.

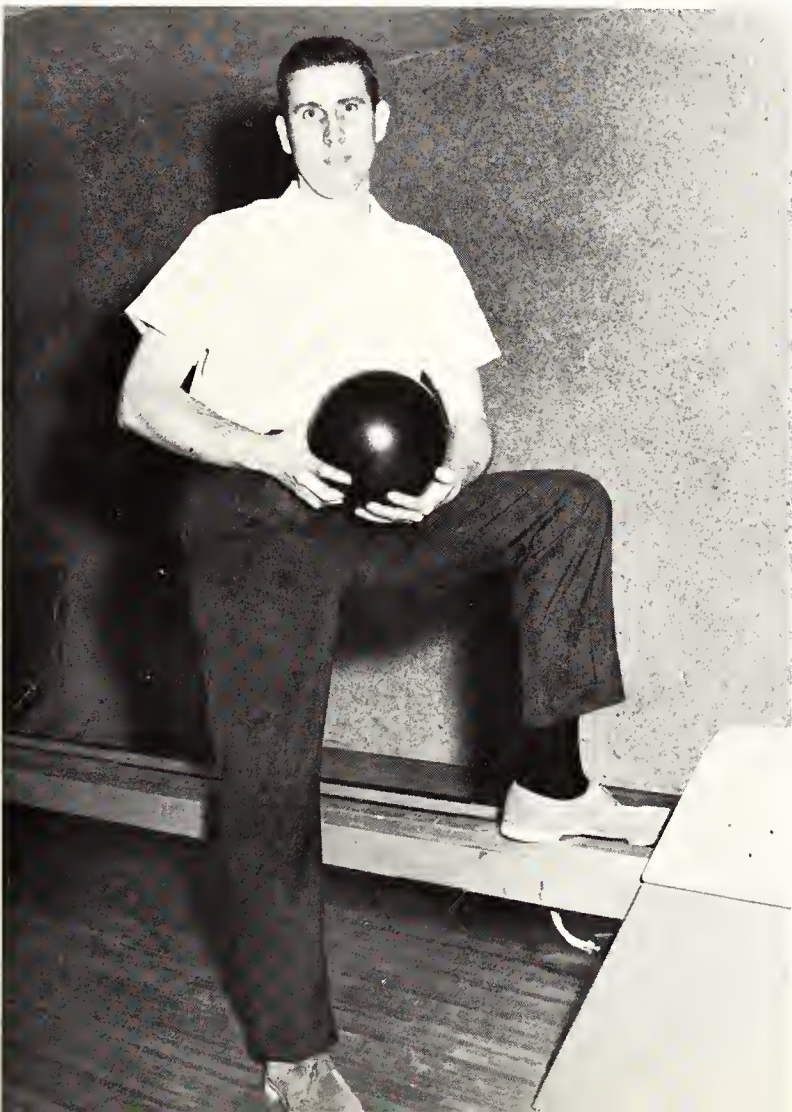

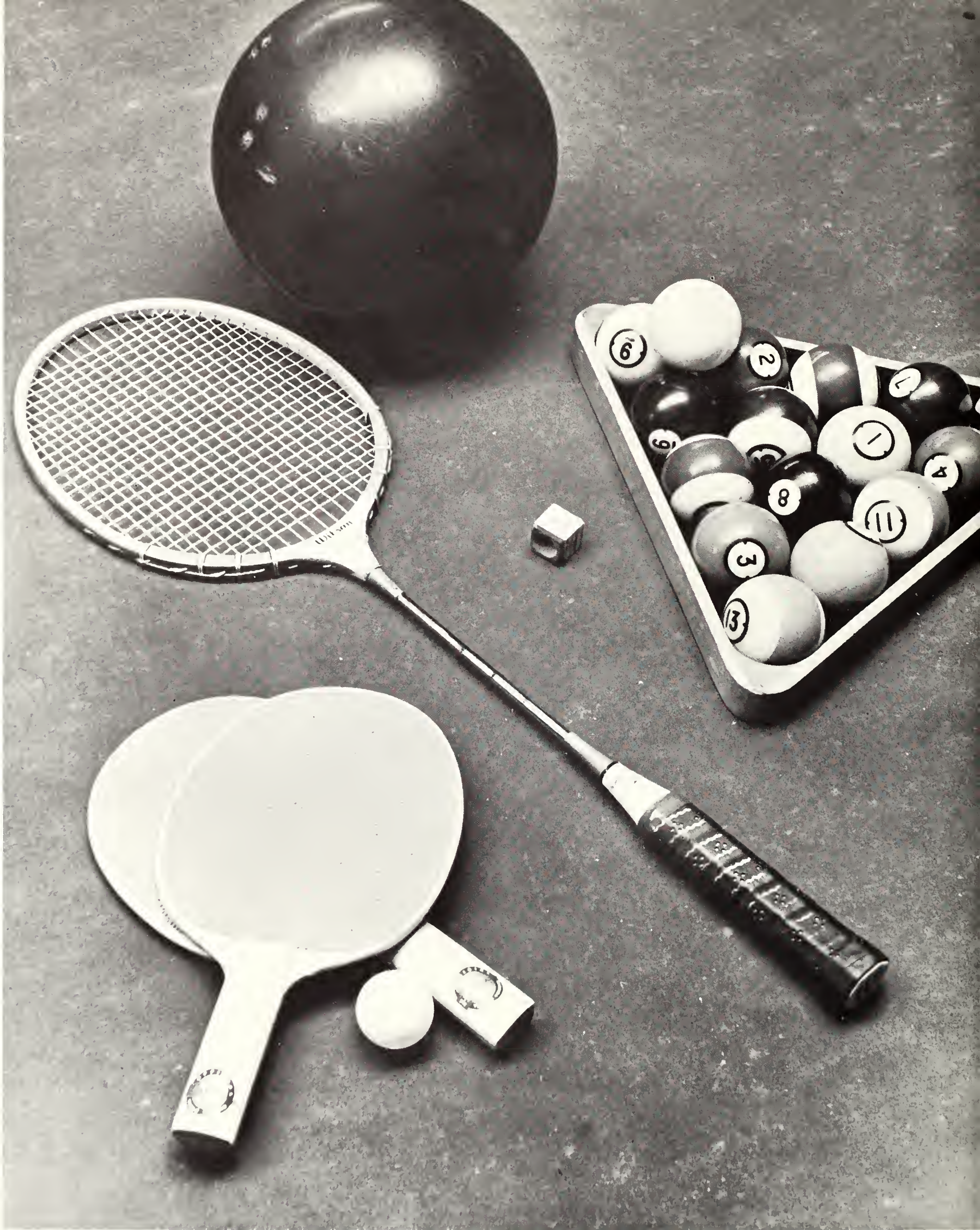

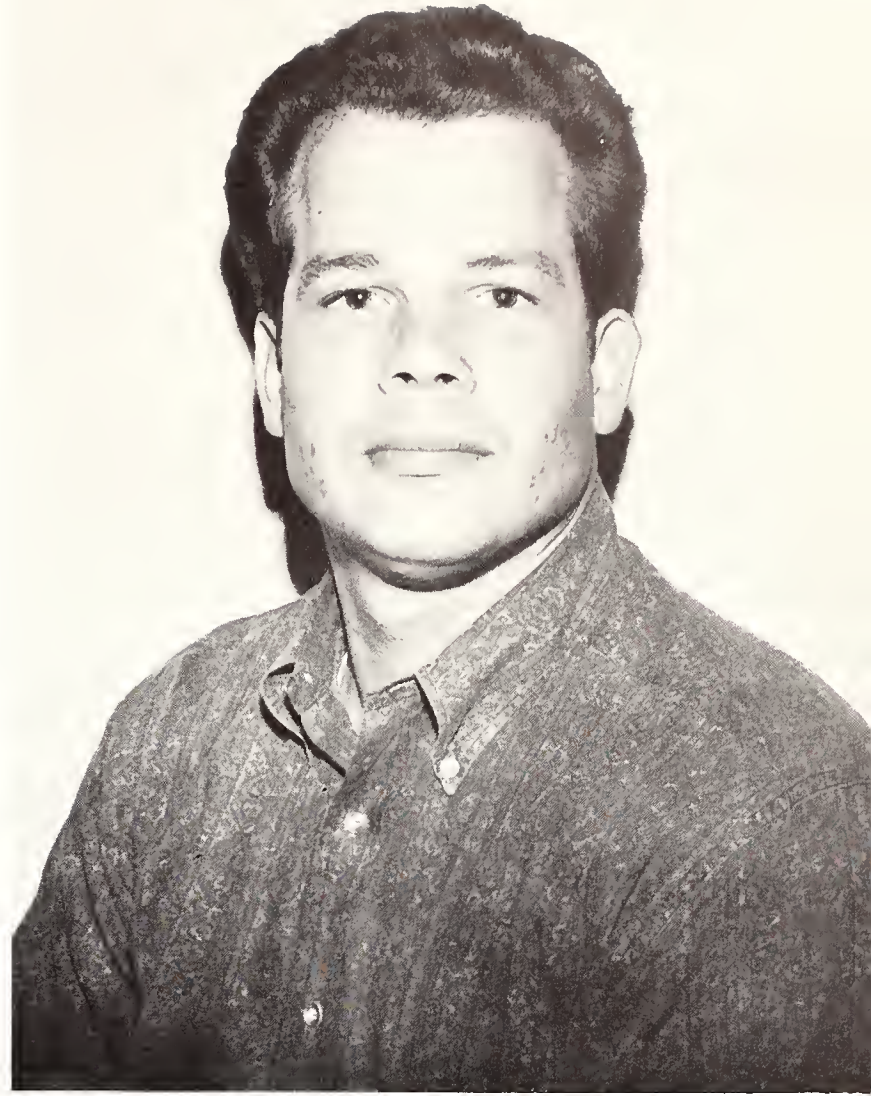
'Mural Program Growing Fast With Help From Gillespie, Rudel

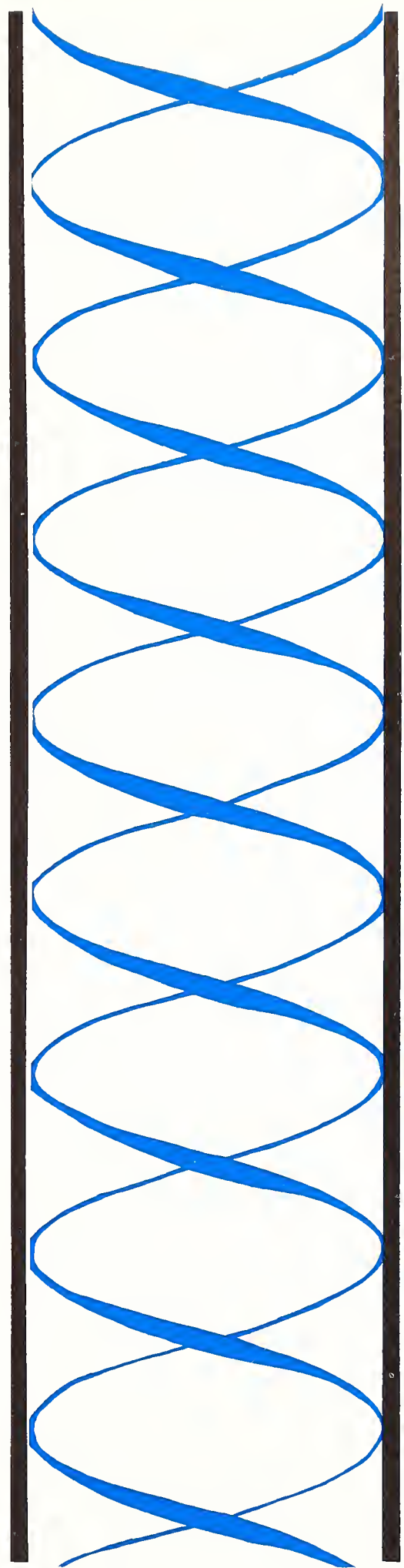
