## Joe Bailey - Tribute to College, Community

Every accredited college has its leaders. These are the administrators or educators whose contributions to the school and their community have made a notable impression. These personalities will be remembered long after the college has become a university.

Such a leader is Joe Bailey, business manager at the college since 1939. He came to the school as a bookkeeper in 1926 when the college was known as North Texas Agricultural College.

A native of Arlington, Mr. Bailey was graduated from Arlington High School and attended National Business College in Fort Worth. He married another Arlington native, the former Lillie Ditto. The Baileys have one daughter, Mrs. James Banowsky, and three grandchildren.

Sometime next year ground will be broken for the Joe Bailey Junior High School, the first air-conditioned
junior high in Arlington. The school's namesake was recognized for his outstanding service to his community. He served as secretary on the Board of Trustees for Arlington Independent School District for 19 years. Mr. Bailey is past president of Rotary Club and has worked diligently in the organization for 25 years. He was also instrumental in acquiring four-year status for the college. He worked toward this goal for eight years with some of his closest friends and colleagues, including Mayor Tom Vandergriff, Professor Duncan Robinson, Dr. H. A. D. Dunsworth, B. C. Barnes, and Professor C. D. Richards.

Joe Bailey is quieter and more inconscipuous than most of his friends. A mild, even-tempered man, he has literally grown up with the University. The dedicatee of the 1967 Reveille has worked tirelessly to help the school attain prestige and its ultimate goals.


Active in civic and academic affairs for more than 40 years, Joe Bailey worked closely with Professor H. A. D. Dunsworth, head of the mathematics department, in attempts to achieve senior status for Arlington State

Through the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps program instituted at ASC, students are provided military leadedship training and an opportunity to earn commissions as Army officers. Representing ASC in various smallbore pistol and rifle competitions are the 25 members of the Pistol and Rifle Teams.
Shooting with five boys to a team, the Rifle Team entered two Fourth Army Area competitions and seven Postal Matches this year. From the Oklahoma State University Invitational Rifle Match on October 18, the team returned with a third place trophy and an individual who fired the highest score in the match to set a new national record. Lanny Bassham's score of 1158 of a possible 1200 points is the highest score ever fired by a civilian in an International Shooting Union Match modified by National Rifleman's Association Rules. Arlington State's inexperienced young Rebels opened the 1966 football season with a trip to Canyon, Texas, on September 17. The trip really wasn't worth it, though, as the Buffaloes of West Texas State shocked the Rebs 38-6.

The Buffs racked up 557 yards against a young ASC defense that found out the hard way college football is a big boy's game, and that its lessons are often learned the hard way.

The only Rebel score came late in the first half when sophomore quarterback Carl Williams passed to wingback Raymond Matthews on a 12-yard play.

Pleasant surprises in this opening game disaster were freshmen Skipper Butler from Gladewater and Danny Griffin from Cleburne. Butler punted eight times for a fantastic 47.8 yard per kick average, while Griffin, a 200-pound fullback, was the leading rusher with 53 yards in 11 attempts.

RESEARCH

## Engineering Profs Conduct Research Projects

DR. KENT L. LAWRENCE, an assistant professor in the engineering mechanics department, is utilizing a digital computer to examine the numerical solutions to the equations of structural dynamics. Previous work in this field includes his doctoral dissertation and a study conducted under a research grant from the Bell Helicopter Company in the summer of 1966.

DR. JAMES E. CAFFEY, assistant professor in the civil engineering department, is investigating the regional correlations in precipitation and runoff in his research of hydrology and hydraulics. Continuing his work from year to year, Dr. Caffey proposes to study the Texas area to see if relations hold over greater distances and how they may vary through the seasons. His method involves applied statistics and probability using precipitation records published by the U.S. Weather Bureau and runoff information reported by the U.S. Geological Survey. The data already collected is so voluminous that computer storage has become a problem. Past research shows that factors such as river basin characteristics tend to cause the regional patterns for the annual river flow to differ from those observed for the annual precipitation. Explaining the practical results of his study, Dr. Caffey says, "Applications of knowledge gained should lead to more efficient distribution of gauging stations."

DR. RICHARD TUCKER, an associate professor in the civil enginering department, is analyzing highway bridge girder and diaphragm systems in his study of the interaction of soils and structures. He has previously completed five years of work in this area, and has authored several publications, two of them on the international level. Working with a high speed digital computer, he is making possible better and more realistic designs of many types of structures.

DR. CLIFFORD W. RANDALL from the civil engineering department is conducting laboratory research in two areas. The first involves investigation of the effects of certain insecticides on aquatic micro-organisms. Using an activated sludge unit, employed for waste treatment by many large cities, he concluded that micro-organisms actually can metabolize insecticides. His second project, researching air pollution from sewage processing, uses a rotating drum device for keeping airosols suspended. The drum, located at the Southwestern Medical School, is one of five in the United States. Observations of disease incidence among employees at sewage treatment facilities are being conducted to determine whether or not such units should be modified.

DR. JOHN J. HAYNES, professor and head of the civil engineering department, is researching in a field which may have a direct effect upon the city of Arlington and surrounding areas. The research involves computer simulation of vehicular traffic flow. His particular area of interest is the simulation of an intersection similar to that at Park Row and Cooper Streets. Dr. Haynes is attacking the problems of a signalized traffic intersection, studying its various signal phases and traffic volumes. The professor and his two research assistants, Robert Cagley and Stanley Reed, are using a digital computer programmed to "move" vehicles through an intersection. The stimulations of the vehicle characteristics and driver decisions form the basis of the program. An event recorder with 30 channels is used at the intersection to record the situation as it happens; this data will be compared to the IBM 1620 II Digital Computer simulation

data on the campus. Dr. Haynes hopes to employ this evaluation of signal phases as related to traffic flow towards improving general traffic movements.

DR. CARL D. WISEMAN, an associate professor in the engineering mechanics department, is studying gasmetal surface reactions. With special vacuum systems, he heats metal strips to white heat in a bell jar and then reacts them with the particular gas under investigation. He then studies the decomposition of the gas and its diffusion into the metal to form a hard inter-metallic compound.

DR. MO-SHING CHEN, an associate professor in the electrical engineering department, is conducting an analysis of the unbalanced three-phase power system. Previous work performed in this area by Dr. Chen includes his M.S. thesis, his Ph. D. dissertation, and IEEE papers. Using the eigenvectors of the impedance matrix, he establishes a generalized transformation. He is working for a simple system, and additional work is required to solve a general unbalanced system.

## Researchers Explore Mathematical Areas

DR. RICHARD MITCHELL and DR. ROGER MITCHELL, assistant professors in the mathematics department, are attempting to discover more about the structure of certain algebraic systems, specifically infinite abelian groups. They conduct their investigation by isolating properties that are common to many algebraic systems. By this method they are able to prove facts that would have otherwise been obscured by the mass of nonessential information present in each particular case. Several papers have already come from their studies of structure theorems, isomorphism theorems, and properties of neat, pure, and basic subgroups.

ROBERT G. DEAN, an assistant professor from the mathematics department, is conducting an investigation of direct and subdirect sums in semirings. Continuing work begun for his doctorate dissertation, he is trying to obtain a representation theorem for several types of semirings.

ROBERT LEE TENNISON, assistant professor of mathematics, is attempting to answer the question, "Does each measure of symmetry which possesses the 'superminimality' property have the simplex as its only extrema?" His area of interest is convexity in n-dimensional Euclidean space, a field which constituted part of his Ph. D. thesis.

JOHN K. PERRYMAN, associate professor from the mathematics department, is interested in the general problem of finding a transform useful in solving certain differential equations. He is presently studying a set of polynomials which he feels will be useful in answering the problem.
D. R. STOCKS, JR., an assistant professor of the mathematics department, is doing research in the graph theory, a branch of topolory, continuing work he has been conducting during the past three years. His purpose is the discovery of relations between lattice paths and special sequences of integers. Some results of his studies were published in the April, 1965, issue of the Fibonacci Quarterly.

## Three Investigate Foreign Literature

DUANE V. KEILSTRUP, instructor of foreign language, is conducting a study of the Germanic languages and literatures entitled "Style of Old Norse Romantic Sagas". The role of the verb is of particular interest to Mr. Keilstrup. He is analyzing every verb in the representative sagas as to tense and aspect. Since the shift of tenses seems to be arbitrary, as his research has indicated thus far, Mr. Keilstrup maintains that translations should be more easily made.

DUANE A. ADAMS and ALAN A. STEINECKE, assistant professors from the foreign languages department are jointly carrying out a project to study French language and literature. To investigate the composition and style found in the literature of the late nineteenth and twentieth centuries, they are selecting a large number of paragraphs from the best French authors of this period. Their work involves the use of programming and a computer. Possible implications for further research are centered in a study of the basic French program at ASC and the development of a text for teaching advanced French composition.

## Faculty Members Test Aspects of Business

JERRY C. WOFFORD, an assistant professor from the ousiness administration department, is conducting two esearch projects. The first, developing a method of neasuring behavior patterns for personnel, is being investigated by administering questionnaires in a company and comparing the scores with performance results. Data rom this study would be useful in personnel selection and development. His second field of interest concerns est construction methods. Tests were administered to 200 students, and information is being analyzed to de:ermine the reliability and validity of the test.
H. M. HELM, JR., an assistant professor from the business administration department, is centering his study of finance on the stock market and its influences. With experience as a stock trader and as a doctoral candidate, he is attempting to correlate market participant activity and common stock price movement with particular emohasis on the timing of common stock purchases. His study is part of a broad investigation of common stock orice determinants.

CLiRTIS G. GRAHAM, an assistant professor from the accounting department, is emphasizing control of overhead costs in his study of the applications of the applications of correlation techniques in accounting. With a $\$ 500$ research grant from the School of Business, he is investigating the field using complex multiple curvilinear correlation computer programs. "Practical applications," says Professor Graham, "are unlimited in developing information for business management."

HOWARD J. SNAVELY of the accounting department is doing research for his doctoral dissertation. He is studying criteria for selecting financial accounting practices. Aware that present criteria are not explicitly defined and convinced that there is a need for such, he is attempting to determine which criteria to use and why. By library research and personal evaluation, he is identifying specific standards by which the value of a given accounting practice can be determined.

WALTER G. AUSTIN, assistant professor of accounting, investigated financial reporting by commerial banks. The study involved the comparison of principles used by banks with those of regular commercial firms. A paper written by Professor Austin appeared in the April, 1967 issue of The Texas Certified Public Accountant.

RALPH ESTES, assistant professor from the accounting department, is engaged in a research project to determine, describe, and evaluate international financial reporting principles and practices. He is using a variety of techniques, including analysis of financial statements from various countries, communication with foreign accountants, visits to a number of countries, and attendance at the International Congress of Accountants including the Ninth International Congress of Accountants to be held in Paris in September. The results of his research will be published as a book tentatively titled International Accounting: Principles and Practices, as well as in articles and papers.

## Faculty Researches Government, History

DR. FRANK BAIRD, assistant professor in the government department, is conducting research in two fields. Through an analysis of government documents, Dr. Baird is continuing his previous study of the Federal Communications Commission and Congress in the field of radio and television program content from 1934 through the Kennedy administration. A second field of interest is the political behavior of the Great Plains area. By surveys and interviews, he is studying the causes for conservatism in the Texas Panhandle.

ARPAD J. NEGYESSY, instructor of government, is utilizing a chronological and interpretive approach to study the law-making process in the Communist orbit. In attacking the root of tradition and nationalism versus imposed outside revolutions, he is continuing his previous work in the method of Communist take-over. He has been assigned to write book reviews and two articles on his study.

ALAN A. SAXE, instructor of government, is examining the early development of state policy on desegregation of Oklahoma's public schools. His central concern is to relate the starting points of the innovation, the succession of ideas and techniques used to bring about the transition and dynamics of this transition. As a result of this study, Mr. Saxe has reached the conclusion that Oklahoma adjusted the operations of a public school system to constitutional requirements because the state's leaders were effective politicians and bureaucrats.

LUTHER W. ODOM, instructor of government, is doing research in the area of public law, American government and politics. His study is classified into two groups. The first, entitled "Judicial Review in Massachusetts, 18821902", determines the extent of judicial activism in decisions by the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court during the stated period. The second, "Function of Legislative Committees in Texas'", examines the influence of standing committees on legislation in Texas. Both are being studied for their comparative value with other states. The latter is seen as a prelude to a more extensive look at the whole legislative process.

HUBERT L. C. MATTHIAS, an assistant professor in the history, sociology, and philosophy department, is researching comparative political behavior and acquiring a two-foot file of information on the unconscious elements retarding democratization among Germans.

Through collecting and classifying material, he is finding a basic element to be the structuredness of German life in general, the slowness of any social evolving. Other diverse factors included the grammar content of German, the history of Roman law, and feudalism.

DR. LUTHER G. HAGARD, JR., associate professor of government, is involved in three separate research endeavors. The first is an annotated bibliography of the United States Constitution. It will contain an anticipated amount of from 25,000 to 35,000 entries of Constitutional matter which will be of bibliographical interest to students of government. His second area of research is entitled "A New Dimension in Legislative Gerrymandering". Dr. Hagard is writing a paper that explicates his assumption that gerrymandering is not restricted solely to politics, a theory that places the burden of proof on those who draw the district lines. A study of interstate compacts involving Texas is Dr. Hagard's third research project. In this he is determining the scope and extent of activities that involves interstate relations.

## Experimental Study Interests Scientists

DR. PETER R. GIRARDOT, Dean of Science, is centering his study of Mossbauer spectroscopy on the structural problems in iron compounds. In his investigation, he is using radioactive sources, a multichannel analyzer, punched tape data output, and high vacuum systems. From his preliminary results, further research is implied in the fields of corrosion, blood chemistry and chemical bonding.

DR. TRUMAN D. BLACK, assistant professor of Physics, is conducting a study of spin-lattice interactions in crystalline materials. He is interested in the magnetic properties of materials and their coupling with the structural properties of materials. The main objectives of his research are to understand how crystals are put together and to explore the inner molecular environment of crystals. An electron paramagnetic resonance spectrometer is used to measure the spin-lattice interactions.

WILLIAM B. SELF, an instructor in the physics department, is studying the interactions between atoms of iron whiskers, hair-like crystals approximately .0004 inches in diameter. After magnetizing the iron with a coil about the size of a pinhead, he uses another coil to measure the current required to reverse the poles. Research in this area is valuable, because the iron whiskers can withstand millions of pounds of pressure per square inch and are important for use in developing strong materials.

CHARLES F. DODGE, assistant professor from the geology department, secured a $\$ 5,000$ research grant from the American Petroleum Institute to study the homogeneities of clastic reservoir rock. Using a special design diamond core rig, he sampled sandstones to measure sedimentary parameters and correlate this with reservoir parameters. Investigation in this field may make possible increased oil recovery from certain types of reservoirs.

DR. JAMES K. BUTLER, an associate professor of biology, is conducting a study of spermatogenisis in the isopod Armadillium vulgare. The research was begun in the summer of 1965 as a preliminary examination of the ultrastructure of the testis of Armadillium while at the Electron Microscope Lab of the Genetics Foundation at the University of Texas. The animal has a very unusual type of nonmotile sperm. Development of the sperm tail is of considerable intercst from both a physiological and evolutionary standpoint.

DR. JASON ELLIS, associate professor of physics, is publishing a journal of relativity for laymen entitled Spacetime. Co-editing the journal is his wife Katherine, who has a Ph.D. in mathematics. Spacetime grew out of a three-week conference upon the teaching of relativity, held at Arlington State College during the summer of 1965. The periodical contains articles using various approaches to relativity and other features aimed at improving the presentation of relativity at the undergraduate level. Spacetime has over 3000 subscriptions, a few of which are outside the United States. Dr. Ellis is also conducting research in the fields of relativity, electromagnetic theory and structure of space. He is aided in these endeavors by graduate student David Wedin.

## Laboratory Work Involves Chemistry Profs

DR. THOMAS J. COGDELL, a professor from the chemistry department, performed a year of research at the Bell Telephone Laboratories in New Jersey in the field of organic chemistry. Continuing an investigation in this area, he is now researching the synthesis and electron spin resonance measurements of organic molecules containing several nitroxide radical groups. The synthetic work will be done at ASC, and the spectra will be taken by his collaborator, Dr. Edel Wasserman of the Bell Telephone Laboratories. About a dozen compounds have been made and studied in the past year.

DR. G. L. JOHNSON, assistant professor of chemistry, is examining the inhibition of oxygen corrosion in salt solutions. He is determining the contribution of dissolved oxygen to metallic corrosion in salt solutions, with the object of inhibiting this corrosion chemically. Dr. Johnson exposes the iron samples in controlled-temperature salt solutions and then measures the oxygen concentration and corrosion rate. Employing an atomic absorption spectrophotometer to measure minute quantities of iron in solution, he uses iron surface potential as an indication of corrosion probability. Then, by the addition of inorganic chemical inhibitors, Dr. Johnson attempts to decrease the corrosion rate. Don L. Jernigan is the student research assistant aiding Dr. Johnson.

HUGH D. McAFEE, associate professor, and DR. JOHN T. MURCHISON, professor and head of the chemistry
department, are conducting research to determine the lead concentration in the water of Lake Arlington. The chemists are preparing solutions of lead and water with known concentrations. Then each solution is fed into an atomic absorption spectrophotometer, which sends the solution through an acetylene flame. The heated lead then gives off a spectrum of light, unique to each degree of concentration, and the results are recorded. Then samples of water from Lake Arlington are fed into the spectrophotometer. By comparing the spectra of the samples with the spectra of the control solutions, the degree of concentration of lead may be determined. As yet, there is no positive proof that a condition of lead exists in Lake Arlington; the professors are simply interested. If, however, too much lead is found in the water, they hope to find a chemical means for removal or diminution during the purification process.
DR. MARGARET C. WILLOUGHBY, an associate professor from the chemistry department, is doing research in the field of polymers, studying the effect of steroregularity on crystallinity of polymers of the covalent type. She previously conducted industrial research in protective coatings and did a doctoral thesis on surface effect measurements in coatings. Professor Willoughby has a paper in progress titled "Molecular Symmetry and Crystallinity in Polymeric Systems."

DR. RAYFORD L. HOYLE, an associate professor in the chemistry department, is using gas chromatography, an X-ray instrument, and an electron microscope in his study of the kinetics of chemical vapor deposition processes. With an $\$ 8000$ a year grant from the American Electroplaters Society, he is thermally decomposing $\mathrm{Ni}\left(\mathrm{PF}_{: 3}\right)$, and studying the structure of the deposited nickel. Special attention is being given to the possible relationship between the structure of the deposit and the kinetics of the process.

DR. ROBERT B. BOLEY, assistant professor of biology, is investigating pathogenis bacteria parasitizing certain species of small fish in Lake Arlington. The purpose of study is to isolate, characterize and identify the causal organism and to determine what microbial factors are responsible for the observed pathology. Results of the study will provide additional information relating to diseases of fish and perhaps establish a previously unreported parasitic relationship.

GARY A. SMITH, an instructor in the department of biology, is studying prairie vegetation to determine the effects of grazing and to compare an artificial undisturbed area with a native undisturbed area. By sampling 30 plots in each area, he is investigating species composition and importance and comparing the numbers of species. Thus far, he has found little variation in peren-
nials versus annuals in the grazed field, ungrazed field, and two undisturbed areas. A possible implication for further research is better management of range lands in terms of grazing and conservation.

DR. WILLIAM F. PYBURN, associate professor of biology, is conducting a study of the behavior, development and relationships of Mexican hylid frogs. In his research, he is attempting to determine the relationships of Mexican treefrogs through studies of life history, behavior, embryonic and larval development, and by experimental hybridization. Species from southern Mexico are being investigated because their great number and diversity of forms offer better opportunities for evolutionary studies than the less numerous and more uniform North American species.

THOMAS E. KENNERLY, JR., an associate professor in the biology department, is employing a soil moisture determining device and remote temperature probes in his study of the microenvironment and evolutionary statur in mammals. To decide if certain behavior patterns may be utilized as a phylogenetic characteristic, he is recording the patterns with a time-correlated code. A photographic phase of the project will also be included. Results indicate a typical sequence of patterned activity, but specific triggers initiating particular points in the sequence are not clear.





## New School Offers Graduate Degrees

For the first time in its history, ASC offered this year a master's degree program for graduate students. Plans for six master's degree programs were approved last summer by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. The board granted ASC permission to award masters degrees in electrical engineering, engineering mechanics, economics, mathematics, psychology and physics.

Advisors for the six fields, who counsel and assist graduate students as well as teach, are Dr. Theodore L. Whitesel, economics; Dr. Stephen F. Crumb, electrical engineering; Dr. Joseph W. Dalley, engineering mechanics; Dr. Basil M. Wall, mathematics; Dr. James E. Dowdey, physics; and Dr. Erwin M. Segal, psychology.
