National Library Week (April 6-12)

Special film presentations and directed screenings are the highlight of the 2003 National Library Week celebration. This year the week is co-sponsored by UTA Libraries and the Department of Art and Art History. The collaboration serves to promote the medium of film as an important art form and valuable scholarly material. In time for this event the Libraries have added 100 DVD copies of films to the Libraries' collection. The movies support film classes taught in the Art and Art History Department, language classes in the Modern Languages Department (many have multiple language tracks), as well as literature, history and music courses. The Libraries owns many of the screenplays, books, and plays on which the movies are based.

Three films will be shown in their entirely in Fine Arts 148. These are Network, on Wednesday, April 2 at 2:15, Lawrence of Arabia, on Thursday, April 3 at 1:15 and A Personal Journey with Martin Scorsese through American Movies on Friday, April 4 at 1:15. The directed screenings of these films will be held the following week, capped by a keynote address by Ken Harrison on "Film and Literature: the Art of Adaptation."

Part 1: pp 1-106, "Core List," was written by Brock and Byrne and consists of 210 titles of Business Reference Sources with descriptions of authority and scope, evaluation, cost, and URLs where available. The rest of the 268-page book consists of a collection of essays related to business librarianship and was written by other contributors.

RAND Texas is now available from the UTA Libraries Online electronic resources web pages. An online source for Texas and U.S. statistics, RAND Texas contains more than 80 databases, ranging from industry employment to immigration to school test scores. Much of the data is available at the national, state, county, city, and zip code levels. All of the data is updated on a regular basis. Major categories covered include: business and economics, health and socioeconomic data, population and demographics, government finance, education, census.

ENGnetBASE and **CHEMnetBASE** are <u>new</u> databases available from the UTA Libraries Online electronic resources web pages.

ENGnetBASE Chapman & Hall/CRC handbooks in engineering disciplines. Electronic versions of over 130 books in subjects including aerospace, civil, HVAC, electrical, materials, optics, industrial/manufacturing, biomedical, and computer engineering. All books can be searched for specific terms, or handbooks can be read individually using the Adobe Acrobat® Reader.

<u>CHEMnetBASE</u> Chapman & Hall/CRC chemistry handbooks: Handbook of Chemistry & Physics, Combined Chemical Dictionary (CCD) (Dictionary of Commonly Cited Compounds, Dictionary of Drugs [formerly

Pharmasource], Dictionary of Inorganic and Organometallic Compounds, Dictionary of Natural Products, Dictionary of Organic Compounds), Polymers: A Property Database, and Properties of Organic Compounds. All books can be searched for specific terms, or handbooks can be read individually using the Adobe Acrobat® Reader.

FISonline/Moody's is now Mergent Online.

This provides access to the most up-to-date business information available, including financial reports, company news and securities data, from the world 's most credible authority on business and financial information. M/p>

Ei

The Ei Thesaurus, the essential search aid for finding citations and abstracts of engineering articles and papers in the Ei Compendex database, is now available. The Thesaurus was developed in response to requests from users of Compendex for an access tool that would make searching easier and more reliable. The revised fourth edition has a total of over 18,000 terms, almost equally divided between descriptors (preferred terms) and entry (non-preferred terms). Over 220 new descriptors and close to 200 new entry terms are in this latest edition.

Current Index to Statistics Extended Database (CIS-ED) is now available from the UTA Libraries Online electronic resources web pages. The CIS-ED is a bibliographic index to publications in statistics and related fields. Core journals include: Journal of Applied Statistics, Journal of Business and Economic Statistics, Journal of the Royal Statistical Society, Series A-D, Statistica Nerlandica, Sociological Methods and Research, Statistics in Medicine, Probability in the Engineering and Information Sciences, and many more. This database is a joint venture of the American Statistical Association and the Institute of Mathematical Statistics.

Dow Jones + Reuters = Factiva.com

Factiva.com is now available from the UTA Libraries Online electronic resources web pages. Factiva.com combines the Dow Jones Interactive and Reuters Business Briefing databases, offering the latest news from these leading business resources. Business and finance are covered in over 8,000+ sources from 118 countries and 22 languages. And with more than 120 continuously updated newswires, Key newspapers include: *The Wall Street Journal, New York Times, Washington Post, The Globe and Mail, Financial Times, Handelsblatt, Les Echos, South China Morning Post, Australian Financial Review*, etc.

Business magazines include: *The Economist, Forbes, Fortune, Time, Newsweek, Finanz & Wirtschaft, Satellite News, Business Week,* and more.
