Five years of Database News

Five years have passed since *News You Can Use* began. The amount of online material available to UTA users has grown immensely since the time when databases were only available on the second floor of the Central Library; users now logon from home 24 hours a day. Electronic journals and databases arrive in our library through many conduits, and while most of our offerings are cataloged in [PULSe](#), not everything is there right away. New journals discussed here have been tested, including directions for finding the journals if they aren't in PULSe, but this editor is pausing to reflect on the process of research in this e-information environment. Finding journals and citations is easier, but diligence still pays off richly.

A logical first step if you know what you're looking for is to go to the UTA Libraries' online catalog PULSe, or if you are unsure, visit the pages assembled by the [subject librarians](#). Don't confine your search to just your subject area, because there is a lot of data overlap. For example, the journal *French History* is new this summer and cataloged as in [ingenta](#), but it is also available from the [Oxford University Press](#). If you are researching French philosophers, you will want to search, at the very least, both vendors for citations, because they don't offer an identical set of journals, just occasional serendipitous intersections. They may each provide unique citations.

There are other places to learn about new library offerings. The librarians link to sites from their [web pages](#), and to the [Research Resources page](#). Visit [this page](#) for a list of the various providers of e-journals. There is also the more general [Library News and Events page](#). For those just starting out or wanting a research refresher, the library offers a seven-step "[Getting started](#)" page. My personal favorites when I'm looking for new resources are the [All Databases page](#) and the [Trial Database page](#). It's amazing what librarians can do when helping you with your research, but you can also boldly explore the resources in our Library pages on your own.

This database supports a broad range of subject areas: arts, media and popular culture, education, environment and ecology, history, journalism, etc.

§ [Eco-Portal](#) – Ecological Enterprises is proud to present the "Eco-Portal – the Environmental Sustainability Info Source." "The Eco-portal is the Internet's most comprehensive environmental resource ever, linking and providing full text search capabilities for the entire contents of over 3,000 reviewed Internet sites related to environmental sustainability. The site tracks the latest environmental news stories which are updated several times daily."

§ [Xrefer](#) Mentioned in Virtual Acquisitions Shelf. This is a strong electronic resource for many subjects, but strongest in humanities, which is unusual. Change the Select a topic line to Philosophy, or whatever, put in a term or phrase, and you get long, authoritative definitions, from Oxford Companions, etc. It has some hidden gems in it. For instance, under dictionaries if you search a word, one of the answers will be rhymes for that word from the Penguin Rhyming Dictionary. Find a review [here](#).

§ [Atomica](#) Originally called "Gurunet," the reconfigured company is now know as "Atomica." This search engine involves installing the company's free software. Then as you work, if you have questions, you put your mouse pointer over any word on your screen (in any program), hold the Alt key, and click. A popup window allows the user to use a dictionary, generate links, even find a pronunciation for the word in question. Atomica need not be used as a popup; it also has an answer bar where a word can be entered and the results appear. The Atomica answer appears, along with an automatic search in Google. (*Editor's note: In my limited trial of this program, I found the Google search the program conducts to be more useful that the initial Atomica information.*)

According to an Atomica press release:

It is sold mainly to corporate customers, but there's still an excellent free personal version for Windows that you can download at www.atomica.com. Once you install it, Atomica sits in the background, running quietly, represented only by a small bar or icon at the lower right of your screen. When you see a word or phrase that you want to learn more about, you just put your cursor on it, hold down the ALT key, and click. In seconds, a small Atomica window pops up with a definition and other relevant information, from well-known reference books.

Trial Databases

During June the libraries conducted a trial of the *American Chemical Society Journal Archives* from the UTA Libraries Online [trial databases page](#). 1879-present. Full text (and image) access to most of the entire runs of ACS journals back to 1879. Articles are still being added during the trial, but tables of contents are available now. Full-text articles are delivered in HTML and Adobe Acrobat format. Trial ended June 30. If you tried it and liked this page, please let your subject librarian know.

Also on trial in June was *CSA Sociological Abstracts*: Abstracts and indexes the international literature in sociology and related disciplines in the social and behavioral sciences. The database provides abstracts of journal articles and citations to book reviews drawn from over 1,700 serials publications, and also provides abstracts of books, book chapters, dissertations, and conference papers. Coverage begins in 1963 and is updated monthly. Records added after 1974 contain in-depth and nonevaluative abstracts of journal articles. This trial also includes access to Social Services Abstracts, ERIC and Physical Education Index, allowing one search across all of these databases.

The Directory no longer is available in print, so the electronic version as part of your MLA Bibliography subscription is the only way you'll be able to access this important resource.
