The N.T.A.C.'s Livestock Judging Team last Tuesday won the plaque in Fort Worth at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show for judging best in their division, the junior and teacher's college, livestock.

Members of the team are Buster Gentry, Clifford Powell, Preston Pratt, and James Bond, all Agricultural students, and L. I. Samuels, coach. Pratt won a \$10 award for judging best on hogs. He made a score of 150 out of a possible 150. Both breeding and fat classes in beef cattle, sheep, swine, and dairy cattle had to be judged. Points were awarded on the basis of the teams' estimation of four animals in each of the four divisions. They had to judge the animals, for instance, in the beef breeding class, according to their superiority, as first, second, third, and fourth.

Judging was done last Tuesday morning, starting at 8:00 A. M. and continuing until 12:00. That evening, the team, which was composed of three regulars and one alternate, had to appear before the judges. Each man of the team was graded on a two minute speech according to the way he made his delivery, or public speaking, his accuracy, and his reasons for classifying the
